Meanwhile, most of the day today is being spent by those attending the conference at the Douglas County Fairgrounds in hearing a series of seminars. The public is invited to attend any of these and may also visit the commercial booths this afternoon from 2 to 5 p.m. and Saturday from 7 to 10 p.m.

Saturday the breakfast session at Joseph Lane Junior High will feature Amos Reed, superintendent of MacLaren School for Boys, as speaker. The speaker at the banquet at the Umpqua Hotel will be George Beard, assistant chief engineer and manager of engineering for Pacific Power and Light.

Beard has been associated with Pacific Power since 1954 when he was named project development engineer. In his present job, he has supervision of the company's work on future power supply projects and planning for long-range power needs of the system. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan, after which he became associated with the civilian branch of the U.S. Corps of Engineers. In 1937, he was assigned to the Corps' chief engineer's office in Washington, D.C.

Sutherlin Gets Land For Street

Action taken by the Sutherlin School Board at its meeting this week included the deeding to the city of a strip of land from the West School property in order to provide a standard street bordering the property.

The city had recently constructed a sidewalk to the area along Comstock Avenue, according to Mrs. William Blakeley, correspondent.

The use of home instruction for emotionally disturbed children not capable of participating in the regular school program received attention of the board. A decision to attempt a minimal program, dependent upon current financing available, received authorization. A report of the experiment was ordered by the board at the session ending.

A report of the county level instructional materials center was heard. The Sutherlin board voiced its approval of the program. The board had previously gone on record as favoring the program on a county-wide basis.

Arrangements were made for members of the board and administration to attend the joint Oregon School Boards Association and administrative meetings in Portland on Nov. 14 and 15. At least three members of the board will attend the two-day session. Several small instructional sections are scheduled for board members, school clerks, and administrators.

FBI Probes Vandalism In Virginia

FBI agents and sheriff's officers today investigated threats and vandalism directed at officials of Virginia's Prince Edward County's integrated school system.

Sheriff James T. Clark said Thursday that an automobile owned by Dr. Neil V. Sullivan, superintendent of the system, was damaged by vandals and that several of the teachers had received telephoned threats.

The privately financed system was established this year to furnish schooling for Negro children who have been without formal education since the rural county closed its public schools four years ago to avoid desegregation.

The schools have a few white students, but most attend a white-only private system established immediately after the public school system closed.

Negroes kept up their week-old campaign against segregation at a cafeteria in New Orleans Thursday. Six sit-inners were arrested, including a 78-year-old Negro woman clad in a nun's habit, who identified herself as Sister Clara Fleming.

"I was arrested before," she said, "but I'm going to stay here."

Other developments:
CINCINNATI, Ohio: Parents of 45 Negro children filed a federal court suit Thursday charging the board of education here with promoting racial discrimination. The suit seeks an injunction against de facto segregation.

WASHINGTON: The National Women's Committee for Civil Rights has set Nov. 24 as national letter-writing day to Congress for supporters of the civil rights bill.

BOSTON: About 100 whites plan a silent "penitential procession" for racial justice today.

SUMTER, S.C.: Fifty-seven Negroes arrested during a racial demonstration were sentenced to 30 days or \$100 fines Thursday for creating a disturbance in jail.

Former Military Chaplain Is Veteran's Day Speaker

Program closes with benediction by Father De Sales Cullen of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, the playing of taps and additional band selections by the junior high band.

youth program, he directs and supervises the activities of youth groups throughout the United States. At present the denomination has more than 5,000 youth groups with a membership of approximately 100,000.

The Rev. Mr. Carr's headquarters' responsibilities include supervision of work among servicemen and college students, a youth missions project, a monthly magazine, and editing a quarterly leadership manual. He also

directs and encourages the activities of 44 district youth presidents through a monthly bulletin.

Beginning his ministry in 1942, the youth leader has held six pastorates in Kansas. He also served as youth president and Sunday school director of the Kansas District of the Assemblies of God from 1953 to 1958.

He joined the denomination's headquarters staff in 1961 as a field representative for Speed-the-Light, youth missions project. One year later he was appointed national secretary of the youth department.

Unruhs Visit Berlin Wall

Russia "falls flat on its face" when it tries to create a favorable impression in Berlin.

Such is the opinion of Dr. John William Unruh of Roseburg who, with Mrs. Unruh, presently is in Europe following attendance at a national convention of ophthalmologists in New York.

Dr. Unruh writes that he had made a tour of East Berlin and had inspected the wall built by the Russians to divide the city in two parts.

"I'm sure," he writes, "it is one of the most tragic, cruel and pathetic sights in the world. No matter how much one reads about East Berlin it is impossible to appreciate its horrors without seeing it."

He reports having visited Amsterdam, London, Paris and Frankfurt prior to going to Berlin, encountering fine weather on the trip.
