

3 Roseburg Stars Lead In League's Statistic Figures

With a three-team deadlock for midwestern league honors starting them in the face, the Roseburg Indians continued to dominate individual statistics through eight games.

The Tribe boasts three individual offensive leaders in the form of Bob (Smookey) Burgess, Jim Beamer and Gary Heeter, while Cottage Grove's Alan Richards continues to top the list in total offense.

Roseburg, the Cottage Grove Lions and the Marshfield Pirates will go into the final week deadlocked for the league lead—and all three are favored to wind-up the regular season with victories. If the three teams end tied for the District 5-A-1 crown, a meeting will be held Sunday in Cottage Grove to decide which team will represent the league in state playoffs. The representative will be decided by chance—either a toss of coins or a drawing.

The Indians will close out league play by hosting the potentially dangerous Sheldon Irish, Cottage Grove will invade Willamette to face the Wolverines and the Marshfield Pirates will entertain the arch rival North Bend Bulldogs. In other league games Friday the North and South Eugene teams will clash at Eugene's Civic Stadium and the Thurston Colts will square off against the Springfield Millers at Springfield's Silke Field. All games are set to start at 8 p.m.

Burgess, Roseburg's fleet halfback, continued to dominate the rushing stats in league play, having gained 694 yards on 69 carries. The Indian break-away threat is averaging 10.1 yards-per-carry and leads the team in scoring with 36 points.

Richards follows Burgess with an average of 7.4 yards-per-carry, having totaled 1,212 yards on 163 attempts. In addition the Lion star has passed for 44 yards for a grand total of 1,256 yards total offense, and he leads the league in scoring with 102 points.

Beamer holds a slim edge over Cottage Grove's Mark Henningsgaard in the battle for the district passing crown. Beamer has completed 39 of 67 attempts for 590 yards and eight TDs, while Henningsgaard has clicked on 44 of 78 attempts for 724 yards and 10 six-pointers. Percentage wise, Beamer has a .582 completion record and Henningsgaard stands at .579. Beamer

Injured Ducks Face Cougars

The survivors of Oregon's first seven football games of the season play Washington State at Pullman Saturday, while Oregon State reaches the hardest part of an increasingly tough schedule with a game at Indiana.

Oregon, with its Firehouse Four backfield cut down to a Well-Battered One by injuries, catches the Cougars on their Homecoming.

Coach Len Casanova, who had noted grimly earlier that the first 36 men who could pull themselves aboard Oregon's chartered plane would be his travelling squad, is set to go with sophomore Jack Sovereign at quarterback.

If he runs into trouble, fullback Lu Bain probably will take over the position. The starting halfbacks will be Dennis Keller and H. D. Murphy, in place of the injured Mel Renfro and Larry Hill. Renfro and quarterback Bob Berry will make the trip, but it isn't known whether either will play.

Hill is on the sidelines for the rest of the year, along with linebackers Don Causey and Tim Casey and tackles Milt Kanehe and Ray Johnson.

Oregon State catches Indiana when the Hoosiers are on a two-game winning streak after four early-season losses. They have one of the best fullbacks in the Big 10 in Tom Nowatzke and an offense that has scored well even in defeat this season.

The Beavers, with a 5-2 record, left Eugene this morning on a chartered flight for Indianapolis. They are at full strength except for defensive halfback Dan Sieg, who is out with a leg injury. He will be replaced by Jim Sinyard.

Chualar Is Favored

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Left-hoofing George Chualar and left-jabbing Tony Alonti, both trying to take a big step along the comeback road, meet tonight in a nationally televised 10-round match at the Miami Beach Convention Hall.

Rosburg Leads Sinatra Open

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI)—Bob Rosburg, 37-year old veteran of the golfing wars, and Frank Beard, a yearling pro, ran one-two today in the second round of the \$50,000 72-hole Frank Sinatra Open.

Rosburg, who hasn't won a tournament since 1961, grabbed a one-stroke lead in the first round Thursday when he shot a four-under par 67 on the Canyon Country Club course.

Beard, 24, in his 12th month on the pro tour, shot a 68.

The difference between the two lay in the birdies. Rosburg had four birdies and no bogeys and Beard had three birdies and no bogeys.

In the first round, only 12 pros from the field of 149 were able to break par 35-36—71 on this new course which is 7,000 yards in length. Fourteen equalled par.

At 69 behind Rosburg and Beard were: Billy Casper, Dave Hill, Dow Finsterwald, Tommy Bolt and Bobby Nichols.

Lodged at 70 were: Don Esig, the 1957 National Public Links champion from Indianapolis; Gene Littler, Terry Wilcox, Tommy Aaron; and 21-year old Ray Floyd.

Al Geiberger, one of the pre-tourney favorites because of his win last weekend in the Alameda Open, looked safe with a first round par 71 on nines of 37-34.

After the second round the field will be cut to the low 75 with ties and some well-known pros were in danger of losing out.

Fifty-one year old Sam Snead was on the shaky side with a first round 36-37-73. Bob Goalby had 35-38-73.

Lionel Hebert had 36-39-75, and Tony Lema carded 38-38-76.

Texas Takes On Baylor In Vital Game Saturday

The eyes of Texas will be focused clearly on Austin Saturday when the hometown Texas Longhorns risk life against limb in their Southwest Conference showdown struggle with Baylor.

The live involved is the No. 1 national ranking which Texas has held for a month. In addition, the winner will undoubtedly reap a Cotton Bowl bid, a fringe benefit to which the Longhorns have become accustomed — three of the past four years.

The limb in question is the fearless right arm of Baylor's Don Trull, who leads the nation in both passing and total offense. Trull, a senior who won national pitching honors last season, has thrown more passes (185) for more completions (106) and more yards (1408) than any other quarterback in the country.

The battle between the undefeated Longhorns and the one-beaten Bears takes on added significance when you consider that Texas has run with the ball more than any other major college squad and Baylor is the nation's most pass-happy team.

Top Receiver, Kicker

A hand and a foot also figure prominently in college football's feature attraction. Lawrence (Lachin) Larry Elkins, a Baylor wingback, is the leading receiver in major college competition with 44 catches and shoelace Tony Crosby of Texas has booted seven field goals and 21 of 21 extra points.

The Elliotts — Bump and Pete — stage their annual family picnic when Pete's Illinois team, No. 2 in the country, hosts brother Bump's squad from Michigan. The game could go a long way to deciding the Big Ten representative in the Rose Bowl. The Illinois haven't beaten the Wolverines in four years, are currently in a three-way tie in the conference.

Co-leader and eighth-ranked Michigan State squares off

against rugged Purdue while the third member of the trio, Ohio State, entertains Penn State in a non-conference tilt.

Fifth-ranked Auburn and unranked Princeton, who share with Texas the distinction of being the only unblemished teams in major college ranks, both face important league contests. The Plainsmen, tied with Mississippi for Southeastern Conference leadership and a Sugar Bowl invitation, take on strong Mississippi State, and Ivy leader Princeton faces runner-up Harvard.

Must Contest For Share Of League Title On Tap

Rain may have dampened the spirits of the trailer football fans and turned Finlay Field into a lo-jolly, but it didn't weaken the fighting spirit of the Roseburg Indians as they prepare for their final league encounter tonight against the Sheldon Irish.

Kickoff time at Finlay Field is scheduled for 8 p.m.

The contest will be a crucial one for the Indians, as they are fighting for their lives in the Midwestern League. Roseburg enters the game sharing the first place spot with the Cottage Grove Lions and the Marshfield Pirates. A victory for the Indians would insure them at least a tie for the championship and a fighting chance for the District 5-A-1 playoff berth.

While the Tribe gridders will be concentrating on the invading Irish, a close watch will be kept on the games at Willamette and Marshfield. The Lions will be at Willamette and the Pirates will entertain North Bend.

Roseburg boasts a 7-1 record for the season, with the lone loss being to Marshfield last week. The Indians have rolled over Willamette, 13-7, Springfield 25-7, North Bend, 27-0, North Eugene, 12-0, Thurston, 34-6, and Cottage Grove, 20-13. Sheldon, in its first year of operation, has compiled a 3-3-2 record. The Irish have topped South Eugene, 19-0, Willamette 13-7, and Thurston, 12-0, while losing games to Cottage Grove, Marshfield and North Eugene. The ties have been fought against Springfield and North Bend.
