JFK Sees Aid Bill As World Peace Key

NEW YORK (UPI) — President Kennedy urged Congress Friday night to approve his foreign aid program lest the "growing gulf between rich and poor" bring conflicts that could result in world war.

Kennedy told a group of Protestant leaders that this country, "along with its major allies, must do better — not worse — by its foreign aid program."

He said the gulf between wealthy and underdeveloped nations "which divides the family of man is an invitation to agitators, aggressors and subversives. It encourages the ambitions of those whose thirst to dominate the world threatens the peace and freedom of us all."

Holy Office May Reform Heresy-Hunting Policies

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Ecumenical Council liberals voiced hope today that the feared Holy Office, modern successor to the inquisition, will drastically reform its heresy-hunting procedures.

Those procedures were denounced publicly at Friday's council session by Joseph Cardinal Frings, archbishop of Cologne, Germany.

Cardinal Frings, a leader of the council's liberal wing, said it was unfair to Catholics and a scandal to non-Catholics for an office of the Roman Curia to have the power to "accuse, judge and condemn an individual" without giving him a chance to be heard in his own defense, or even telling him the charges against him.

Frings' blunt attack on the long-sacrosanct Holy Office created an atmosphere of electric tension in St. Peter's Basilica and brought an immediate angry rebuttal from Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani. Ottaviani heads the Holy Office and is a leader of the conservative faction at the council.

He said Cardinal Frings' criticism stemmed from ignorance "or worse." Cardinal Ottaviani said the Pope supervises the Holy Office and can always reverse its judgments if he considers them unfair.

This answer infuriated many council liberals. They told reporters that the pontiff technically is the head of all Vatican agencies but in practice cannot possibly review all of the actions they take in his name.

Stolen from the First Baptist Church was a watch and a jar of cherries. There was nothing reported stolen from the LDS Church.

sons at the annual banquet of the Protestant Council of the City of New York, which awarded him its distinguished service award. He was the first Roman Catholic to be so honored.

About 100 civil rights demonstrators picketed the New York Hilton Hotel while Kennedy was speaking there. In a scuffle with police, who were maintaining unusually tight security, six of the marchers were injured. They were treated at Roosevelt Hospital and released.

The Congress of Racial Equality said the six were hurt when police charged the picket line, which was formed across the street from the hotel. The pickets were dispersed after about two hours.

Attends Party
After the address, Kennedy attended a party at the home of his brother-in-law, Stephen Smith, and then shortly after midnight went to his hotel.

He was scheduled to leave from Idlewild Airport around 11:45 a.m., EST today, and planned to spend the weekend with his family at their new home in Atoka, Va.

In the speech, Kennedy called on Congress to adopt a non-partisan approach to his program and sharply criticized those who "find it politically convenient to denounce foreign aid with one breath and the Communist menace with another."

The House cut his original request for the foreign aid program from \$4.5 billion to \$3.5 billion. The Senate already has cut its version from \$4.2 billion to \$3.7 billion, and still is debating the program.

Threat Of Flood Believed Over
The threat of flood dissolved as quickly as it had arisen Friday.

The rains stopped in most parts of the county, the storm front passed on and streams began falling rapidly.

Areas of the Cascades still got a drenching Friday night, but the rains weren't enough to cause trouble. At Tillier a 24-hour precipitation total of 1.9 inches was recorded, and at Little River, the rainfall reading was 1.45. But indicating the sudden end of rain elsewhere in the county, Camas Mountain which had recorded 2.55 inches in the 24 hours up to Friday morning, had only .5 of an inch in the period to Saturday morning.

The U. S. Weather Bureau station in Roseburg said that no more heavy rains are imminent and streams are all falling fast.

Police Probing Theft
Roseburg city police are investigating the theft of several bottles of wine from the store room of Mark's Shopping Center grocery store early Friday night. All but a few bottles of the wine were recovered, where they had been stashed near the store.

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Five Timber Sales Bring \$304,362.95

A total of 13,932,000 board feet of Bureau of Land Management timber was sold by the Roseburg district office Friday for a total of \$304,362.95.

The timber is located on five separate sites and contains 17 per cent salvage volume as a result of the Columbus Day and subsequent wind storms.

The biggest tract was purchased by Douglas County Lum-

ber Co. of Roseburg for a total price of \$160,290.05. The tract contains 7,636,000 board feet and is located in the Yoncalla area. By species, the bid was \$22.90 per thousand for Douglas fir, \$15.75 for sugar pine, \$3.35 for grand fir, \$12.60 for western hemlock, \$5.20 for western red cedar and \$5.25 for incense cedar.

Other bidders were Fir-Ply Inc. and Olson-Lawyer Lumber Inc., both of Medford.

Roseburg Lumber Co. purchased a 1,436,000 board feet tract in the Camas Valley area for \$32,384.70. The bid included \$24.25 for Douglas fir, \$7.25 for western red cedar, \$6.15 for grand fir, \$12.50 for ponderosa pine, \$25.25 for sugar pine, \$18.45 for western hemlock and \$7.45 for incense cedar. Lumber Sales Inc. of Roseburg also bid on the tract.

Woolley Logging Co. of Drain won a tract in the Yoncalla area containing 2,880,000 board feet for the appraised price of \$62,096. Douglas fir sold for \$22.70.

Also going at the appraised price was a tract of 1,136,000 board feet on Oldham Creek. It was purchased by Martin Bros. Container and Timber Products Co. of Oakland for \$29,742.65. Douglas fir sold for \$27.05 per thousand.

The fifth tract was purchased by E. L. Paris of Roseburg. Located in the /ce Williams Mountain area, the tract contains 844,000 board feet and was sold for the appraised price of \$19,949.55. Douglas fir sold for \$25.55.

Curry Officers Hold Marial Wife For Hearing Date
Florence Ellen Frye, 50, of Marial, in Curry County was released Friday to Curry County authorities for a preliminary hearing scheduled in connection with the alleged shooting of her husband, Gerald Narvin Frye, 47, Wednesday evening.

Frye was reported still in a critical condition at a Grants Pass hospital, from a gunshot wound in his abdomen downward toward his left hip. The bullet was removed from where it was lodged just under the skin.

State Police Sgt. Robert Bouey of Roseburg, who investigated along with Douglas County Medical Examiner Dr. James K. Gray, said Mrs. Frye gave officers a statement admitting the shooting.

Mrs. Frye told officers she and her husband had quarreled when he failed to return home to assist her with canning of elk meat. She stated that during the argument she picked up a 9 mm. Luger automatic pistol and shot her husband.

The Fryes lived in a remote area across the Rogue River from Marial, about 35 miles west of Glendale toward Powers. A cousin of Frye, Norman Frye, was a witness to the shooting. He walked about five miles apparently to reach the nearest vehicle he could use at the Richard Venner home, then drove to Glendale to telephone state police.

When the officers from Roseburg arrived, Frye was taken cut part way by pickup truck, requiring chains, and the remainder of the way by ambulance. Mrs. Frye was brought to Roseburg.

Guilty Plea Entered On Check Complaint
William R. Strange, 39, of Chemult, Friday pleaded guilty to a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich deferred sentencing pending receipt of a report from the FBI as to Strange's past record.

Strange was accused of passing a worthless \$25 check at Mark's Shopping Center Oct. 23. Donald Lee Ireland, 34, Springfield, pleaded guilty to non-support of minor children. Judge Woodrich suspended imposition of sentence and placed him on probation for two years, under the custody of the state Board of Parole and Probation. Provisions are that he make \$75 monthly support payments.

David Wood, 19, Roseburg, pleaded innocent to forgery, and Judge Woodrich said trial would be set later.

Organizational Meet At Glendale Monday
An organizational meeting Monday evening at the Glendale Assembly of God Church will develop plans for a representative pastor-laymen group.

Members would meet regularly to schedule inter-church activities and programs, according to Mrs. Gerald B. Fox, correspondent. Each church in the Glendale - Azalea - Wolf Creek area is urged to have representatives present at the meeting, she said.

DC Sheriff's Officers Probe Shops Break-In
Douglas County sheriff's officers were investigating a break-in at the county shops, NE Diamond Lake Blvd. and NE Rifle Range Road, Saturday morning which resulted in the theft of about \$25 and some candy bars.

Entry into the main shop building was made through a window and about \$10 was taken from a candy machine and \$15 from a coffee kitty. The theft occurred sometime late Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 11 a.m. at the Long & Shukle Memorial Chapel, with the Rev. Raymond Estes of the Church of the Open Bible of Albany officiating. Interment will be in the Roseburg Memorial Garden, where his wife is buried.

Visiting U.S. Treasury Division Official Explains Tax Proposal

Merlyn Trued, deputy assistant secretary of the treasury for international finance, is currently spending a brief interlude away from governmental activities in Washington and visiting with two uncles, Clarence Trued of Roseburg and Carl Trued of Glendale.

He will leave here Sunday to return to the nation's capital.

Trued, in his capacity as deputy assistant secretary of the treasury division which handles international finance relations, served as a special financial adviser to the government of Vietnam in 1957 and again in 1958-60. During this time he worked closely with former vice president Nguyen Ngoc Tho, who has been named to head the new provisional government in that country.

The international finance division is responsible for handling gold exchange and foreign currency exchange for the U.S. government.

This marks the first trip to Oregon for Trued since he was graduated from the University of Oregon with a BA degree in 1950. He received his doctor's degree in economics at the University of Virginia in 1954.

After receiving his doctor's degree, he joined the staff of the Federal Reserve Bank in New York City and later became an assistant vice president. He served as a special assistant to the secretary of the treasury in 1961, and accepted the position he now holds in January of this year.

His duties require several appearances before congressional committees to explain intricate phases of the government budget, as well as testifying in special hearings. He came to the West Coast to testify for the government in a gold case (il-

legal possession of gold) in Los Angeles, then spoke to faculty members and graduate students at the University of Oregon before coming to Roseburg.

Working closely with the overall government spending program as he does, Trued gave The News-Review the following explanation of the new tax program the administration is requesting which will provide income tax reductions for U.S. workers.

"We have two interrelated problems on deficits," he said. "First, there is the domestic budget, and secondly, the balance payments (spending, lending and buying more abroad than foreign nations spend here)."

"The administration is concerned with developing an overall program that will approach a solution to both problems. The tax reduction bill is a key program in our effort to develop a balance in both departments."

"On the domestic budget, we feel it is essential to gain full employment of all our people, and that the tax rates are too high at present to encourage the businessman to expand and reach this level. With the tax cut, we believe the economy will expand more rapidly, and with this expansion and higher level of income the total government receipts will increase and we'll get the balanced budget we're aiming for."

"On the balance of payments, we believe that an expanding domestic economy will mean that more savings will be invested at home rather than abroad and this will cut down the outflow of dollars and gold."
