

Success Of Wool Pools Noted At Annual Meeting

The Douglas County Livestock Associations' wool pool accounted for sales of 28,000 fleeces, during the last year. This is about a quarter of all wool sold in the county.

The growing importance of the pool was cited as one of the major strides forward made by the association, which now ranks as the biggest county association in the state (membership 220).

At its annual meeting this week, it also pointed with pride to the fact its Fat Lamb Pool had accounted for 4,200 sales and its two feeder sales had accounted for sales of 5,000 lambs and ewes. The association also staged a Fat Lamb Show and shared sponsorship of the Southwestern Oregon Ram and Ewe sale.

The association members attending the meeting in the Roseburg Woman's Clubhouse also heard several discussions on subjects involving livestock.

The two major speakers were Marion Thomas, extension economist from Oregon State University, and Ralph Arensmeier, manager of Southern Oregon Production Credit Association. Thomas reported on marketing trends and sources of livestock market information, and Arensmeier of Roseburg, discussed working capital sources and

uses. Later, the five veterinarians of the county staged a panel discussion on livestock diseases.

During the business session, nine directors were named. They are Darley Ware, Bob Hall, Louis Kohlhaugen and Curtis Barker, all of Roseburg; Ed West of Oakland; Ab Rice Jr. of Dillard; Mervin Rydell of Drain; Lewis Brady of Winston.

The band "battle" is an annual pre-Christmas event sponsored as a benefit by the musician's union of Roseburg, according to Wayne Wagner, secretary of the local.

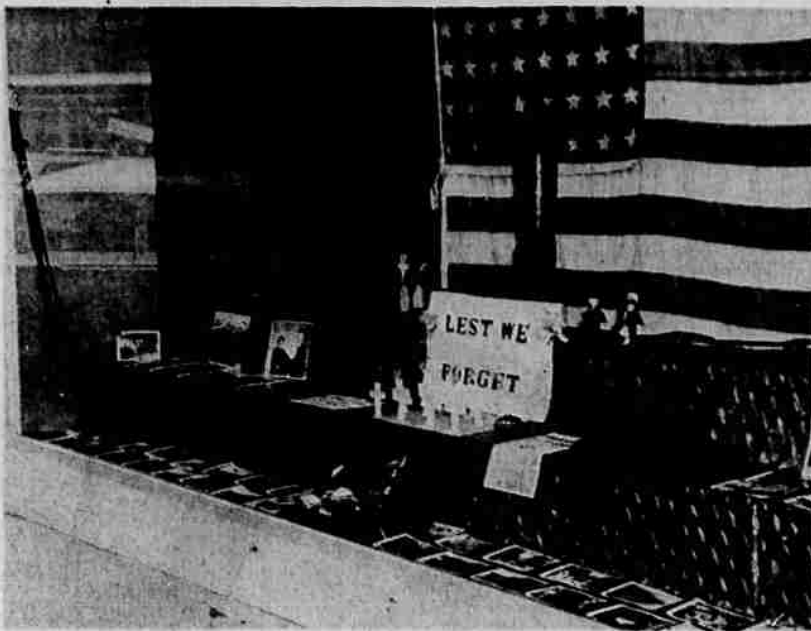

Committee Favors Giving Hatfield School Fund Allotment Control

SALEM (UPI) —The Ways and Means Committee voted Friday to give the governor allotment control over basic school support, but was unable to decide whether a one-shot revenue speedup should be adopted.

Sen. L. W. Newberry, R-Ashland, and Rep. Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston, opposed giving school allotment control to Gov. Mark Hatfield in the informal poll.

The vote was taken after two days of testimony on proposed reductions for welfare state institutions, and education. It is not binding because the committee will not begin formal deliberations until the special session begins Monday.

Ways and Means members had hoped to be able to agree on basic policy questions so recommendations could be presented to the House and Senate caucuses Sunday night. However, members felt there were still too many unanswered questions.

One-shot Plan Debated
The deadlock over the one-shot

plan centered around a disagreement over whether the governor's \$12 million plan or the \$20 million plan suggested by Sen. Alfred Corbett, D-Portland, should be considered—or whether the one-shot idea should be abandoned because it might add to problems next biennium.

The question of whether budget reductions should be considered temporary or permanent dominated Friday's deliberations.

Sen. Walter Leth, R-Salem, said it was a decision that had to be made by legislators, by state agencies.

His comments came after Chancellor Roy Lieuallen said he considered higher education's

proposed cutbacks temporary. Several legislators said they might not go along with higher education's plan to increase entrance requirements and tuition fees.

Educational TV Untouched

Lieuallen said no major cuts in educational television had been planned because "we assume this is a temporary crisis. We do not want to eliminate or cripple activities that would be hard to re-establish."

Freeman Holmer, finance and administration director, said additions to institution operating budgets, and programs such as vocational rehabilitation, parole and probation would have first priority of restoration of "small amounts" if money were available.

He said recovery of "large sums,"—more than \$2 million—would give priority to restoration of capital construction projects such as the Portland State College science building, Campbell Hall at Oregon College of Education, community college buildings, and Fairview Home.
