

Reaction Of Legislators Varied To Hatfield's Opening Message

SALEM (UPI)—The special session of the legislature was launched Monday—agreed there was much to be done, but not agreed on what should be done. Reactions to Gov. Mark Hatfield's special message to a joint session of the House and Senate ranged from enthusiastic support to bitter disapproval. Hatfield admonished lawmakers to go swiftly about their work, then go home. House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille, said the address was "what I expected."

Senate Minority Leader Anthony Yurri, R-Ontario, termed Hatfield's address "brief, clear and to the point." "Worst Ever," Pearson But Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, blasted the message as "the worst address I have ever heard any governor deliver. I resent his remarks directed at the legislature. He offered no solution to the problems."

Underlying the day's activities was a tone of seriousness. Musa termed it "a different attitude of legislators." What it foretold was not clear. Hatfield admonished lawmakers not to enact any new tax measures. But within an hour of his speech more than a dozen had been proposed, and it appeared the flow had barely begun. Barton commented "it's anyone's privilege to introduce bills as long as they are germane to the subject and hand."

Teachers Must Sell Ideals, McIntire Tells Group Here

The teaching profession is made up of dedicated, reasonable, intelligent people who are doing a job that is important. To be more effective in that job, teachers should be able to communicate this fact to the public. This was the gist of a speech given this morning by Frank O. McIntire, director of public relations for the California Teachers Association. He spoke to more than 700 Douglas County teachers packed into the Community Building at the Fairgrounds as a highlight of the fall teachers' conference.

One of the first steps in creating this better image, he said, is to become informed about "the vastly important subject of education." He said teachers have to be able to communicate the very fundamentals of their profession. "If you don't you're on the defensive." The Pasadena, Calif., man pointed out that particularly here in the West, people are new to their present areas. He noted that in his own county, for example, a study shows that people have moved on an average of every four years. McIntire said his feeling is that people do not transfer their loyalties and understanding. Instead, they criticize. "We have to show them we haven't changed the things which shouldn't be changed and have changed those things which should be changed."

Confusion and Contrast It also was a day of confusion and contrast. There was confusion because the normal legislative processes were reved up to jet speed. Six of the bills introduced Monday were given two readings and referred to committee within an hour's time—a process that under normal procedures would take two days. Contrast resulted because legislators assigned to committees were put immediately to work, while others had nothing to do but wait. Still unresolved was whether the legislature would make budget cuts, or allow the governor to make them. There was no agreement in Ways and Means whether it should assume a one-shot measure would be approved. And there were so many conflicting views on proposed cuts in basic school aid, that the problem was turned over to a subcommittee.

New Court Action Keeps Alive Tragedy On Bluebelle's Decks

MIAMI (UPI)—Another sheaf of legal papers kept alive today a sea tragedy born two years ago on the bloody decks of the Ketch Bluebelle in the dark waters off the Bahamas. It was on behalf of the only survivor of the tragedy, Terry Jo Duperrault, that suits were filed in federal court Monday seeking a total of \$750,000 from three Miami brokers charged with negligence in drawing up charter papers for the last voyage of the Bluebelle. That was to have been a happy voyage, the dream vacation of Arthur Duperrault, 44, a Green Bay, Wis., optometrist and his family. There was his wife, Jean Duperrault, 38, and the three children, Terry Jo, 11, Rene, 7, and the brother, Brian, 14.

was a fishing buoy bobbing on the Atlantic. This was Terry Jo, severely sunburned, but alive. The next day, as doctors reported she would survive her ordeal, Harvey slashed himself fatally with a razor blade in his Miami motel room. When Terry Jo could tell her story, it didn't jibe with Harvey's. On the night the Bluebelle went down, she recalled, she was awakened in her cabin below-decks by her brother's frantic cry: "Help daddy, Daddy, help." When she went outside she found her mother and the boy, young Brian, lying in pools of blood near the stairway to the deck. On the deck, she said she found Harvey with a pall of water, and he ordered her back below.

Up Second Time She said when she was up a second time to escape the water rising in her cabin she found the decks awash and saw Harvey leaping overboard toward an empty dinghy. She saved herself with a life raft she found still aboard. This was the Coast Guard's conclusion: That Harvey killed his wife, the Duperrault parents and Brian, and scuttled his ship, but did not harm the two girls "probably in the assumption that they would drown when the vessel sank." Rene probably did drown, the Coast Guard said, and Harvey picked up her body to lend credibility to his story. The "most probable cause" for the tragedy, the Coast Guard said, "was the state of mind of Julian A. Harvey," and a \$20,000 double indemnity insurance policy Harvey had taken out on his wife not long before was listed as a possible motive. Terry Jo, now 13, lives with relatives in West De Pere, Wis. Monday's suit was filed by the Kellogg-Citizens National Bank of Green Bay on behalf of Terry Jo.

Duncan Says WCA Sincere In Plans

U. S. Rep. Robert Duncan says he believes the attitudes of federal agencies and West Coast Airlines is "a sincere one with the objective of providing adequate service to Roseburg and other similarly situated communities." He expressed this feeling in a letter to Roseburg City Manager Craig McMicken. At the same time, he says he thinks it is "probably unrealistic" to expect very substantial utilization of the Roseburg air service unless convenient scheduling can be worked out. He continues that "if and when" the point of regular scheduling is again reached, he will recommend an intensive campaign to increase airline travel so Roseburg will not be in the marginal "use it or lose it" category. He said he was certain WCA would cooperate in such a campaign.
