

Camp Fire Girls Candy Sale To Cover Large County Area

Hundreds of local Camp Fire Girls will "take off" this coming Friday on their biggest "sky's the limit" candy sale to date.

Court Opens Way For Trial Of Jim Hoffa

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court refused today to examine the claim of Teamster President James R. Hoffa that he was indicted on charges of jury tampering in Tennessee by an improperly constituted grand jury.

The brief order let stand lower federal court rulings that this legal issue should not be brought up at this stage in the proceedings. It thus cleared the way for the trial to take place.

A federal grand jury charged Hoffa and six others with approaching jurors and their relatives in the fall of 1962, offering cash and other inducements to acquit Hoffa in a trial then taking place. The trial, involving Taft-Hartley Act charges, ended in a hung jury.

A federal district court in Nashville had set Oct. 14 for the jury tampering trial when Hoffa challenged the grand jury. He contended that Negroes, Catholics, Jews, manual laborers and members of organized labor were improperly excluded from the panel. He also contended that the "suggestions" who proposed names of grand jurors were not a true cross-section of the community.

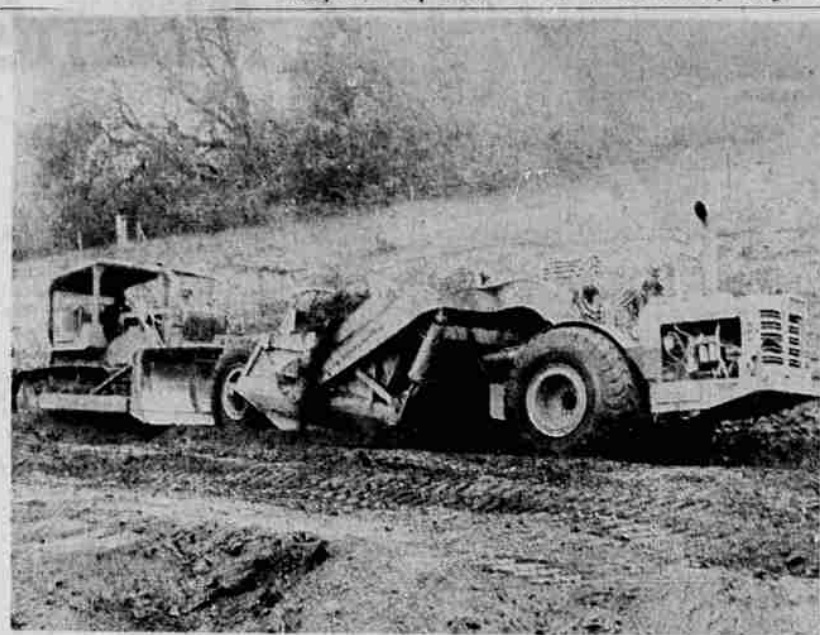
Hoffa also said he didn't get a fair break because the "suggestions" knew the grand jury was especially established to consider the case of one "who has been the target of an unprecedented, well-publicized campaign by the present (national) administration."

"A presumption of prejudice under these circumstances must arise," he said.

Federal district Judge Frank Gray Jr. dismissed these arguments. He was upheld first on Sept. 30, by the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on the ground that they had been prematurely placed before that court. The circuit court said Hoffa can present them again when he appeals—if he is convicted.

Meantime the 6th Circuit Court moved to delay the trial until Hoffa could appeal the Sept. 30 decision to the Supreme Court.

The lower court rulings against Hoffa also included a refusal to transfer the trial elsewhere.

He has spent six years in the armed forces, time working on the logging and construction camps of the northwest, 13 years in the pastorate and 17 in the evangelistic field. He has preached in 33 countries and 49 states of the Union. He served Youth for Christ International

as vice president and regional director for the Pacific Northwest and for four years as regional director in Hawaii with the Pacific Islands as far as Guam as his charge.

He has served as the field director for Greater Los Angeles Youth for Christ and as overseas vice president for Teen World International, a teen service organization to meet emergency needs of Christian around the world. His D.D. degree was honorably given for work in evangelism and missions. According to Boldt he is in constant demand to lecture before high school assemblies and service clubs such as Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions and Chamber of Commerce. His messages are timely, informative, and Bible-centered, Boldt reports.

More Ballots Counted On Tax Preferences

A scattering of ballots on The News-Review's tax preference poll raised the final total of ballots to 783.

The additional ballots didn't change trends. The final results were these: Sales tax with exemptions — Yes 140, no 380; sales tax with exemptions — yes 356, no 189; increase in income tax — yes 18, no 532; state property tax — yes 12, no 527; any increase in taxes — yes 161, no 356.

Mosquito Fish Eyed For County Logging Ponds

The Douglas County Sanitation Department is currently working on a project of stocking all log ponds in the county with mosquito fish in an attempt to cut down the spread of the little biters at their breeding places.

The mosquito fish (Gambusia Affinis) was first introduced to Douglas County in four ponds about six years ago. It has shown noticeable success in most areas.

County Sanitarian Jack Osborne said some of the ponds are so polluted the mosquito fish can't live, but added planting these fish should serve as an effective method of mosquito control in about 25 per cent of the ponds.

Widely introduced throughout the country for naturalistic mosquito control, the Gambusia Affinis feeds on mosquito larvae in impounded waters, bringing almost complete control within a few months.

A near relative of the popular guppy, the mosquito fish seldom exceeds three inches in length. It is a live bearer (giving birth to live young rather than hatching out eggs) so it needs no special breeding place. The mosquito fish cruise at the surface where the mosquito larvae stay, a characteristic which has given it the name of topminnow.

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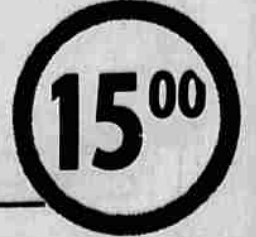
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
