

Cambodia Will Renounce Aid From United States

PNOMPEHN, Cambodia (UPI) — Prince Norodom Sihanouk has announced Cambodia will renounce U. S. aid by the end of 1963.

He said American troops will be withdrawn, but they will not be replaced by other foreign troops.

Prince Norodom told a news conference that "by this measure we will be poorer but more independent."

The prince announced Monday the nationalization of im-

port and export businesses here and the nationalization of Cambodian banks by the end of next June.

He said the big French plantations will not be nationalized for the time being, but he could not guarantee the same for the future.

"Without aid, and not rich in foreign reserves, Cambodia will have to increase her production agriculturally and industrially," he said.

He said he had reflected a long time before promoting this form of "advanced socialism" and that this decision had been taken essentially with the aim under current developments of saving the regime and the monarchy and avoiding a big swing to the left.

Cattlemen Back State Sales Tax

BAKER (UPI) — A resolution supporting a state sales tax was approved by the Oregon Cattlemen's Association at its 50th annual convention here.

Delegates also passed a resolution asking the federal government to use tariffs or quotas to protect the nation's cattle industry from excessive beef imports, notably from Australia and New Zealand.

Walter Schrock of Prineville was re-elected president of the association at its closing session. William Marshall of Klamath Falls was retained as first vice president.

Elected second vice presidents were Harry Elliott of Bridgeport, James Brooks of Madras, William Duff of Pendleton, Robert Weir of Lakeview and Wallace Dement of Myrtle Point.

George Johnson and Jerry Brees, both of Prineville, were named secretary and treasurer, respectively.

Agencies Own Half Of Douglas

Douglas County parallels the state according to an Oregon State University report on percentage of land owned by the federal government. Fifty-one per cent of the county's land is owned federally, the same percentage as that of the state as a whole.

Some 21 federal agencies own 31,915,902 acres of Oregon's 61,641,600 acre total, the study notes. It was compiled on a first-of-its-kind map for the state by an OSU graduate student in the Department of Natural Resources.

On the map, the location and distribution of federal land in Oregon is pinpointed by agency. The Bureau of Land Management owns the most acres in Oregon, 15,937,354, closely followed by the U.S. Forest Service with 15,001,833 acres. Together, they have about 93 per cent of the federal land.

County percentages range from 74 per cent in Malheur and Deschutes counties to 1 per cent in Clatsop County.

SEAT BELT BILL

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Commerce Committee Tuesday approved a House-passed bill to establish federal safety standards for automobile seat belts sold across state lines. It would give the Interstate Commerce Commission power to fix standards and to penalize belt manufacturers who violated them.

Cut Of 'Top' Salaries Demanded By Bennett

PORTLAND (UPI) — State Rep. J. E. (Jake) Bennett, D-Portland, suggests that Oregon should reduce expenses by eliminating some of its employees at the top instead of at the bottom.

"I am in favor of cutting salaries of the top people," Bennett said. "I don't think it is right to slash salaries on the bottom."

He said he would take a close look at the higher education budget "to see how many professors at \$25,000 a year we don't need." The state must cut expenses because the voters last month rejected a \$90 million tax program passed by the 1963 legislature.
