

YMCA Is Beneficiary Of United Fund

This is the second in a series of articles on Central Douglas United Fund participating agencies for which a campaign to raise \$49,936 is being conducted. One of Central Douglas County's proudest possessions is its YMCA building at Stewart Park in Roseburg and the program which goes with it. Without the Central Douglas United Fund subsidy, the memberships of the "Y" would be almost prohibitive in cost.

This would be a pity because of the variety of activities and services which directly enrich the lives of hundreds of boys, girls, men and women.

The new "Y" building in Stewart Park has been a center of many, many types of activities, ranging from athletics to music and culture. As a result it has become a force which stimulates and implements community pride and unity.

Despite efforts to fashion programs for all age groups, it has had to curtail some programs because of lack of funds.

Nonetheless, it still has many

additional programs on the drawing boards. And even with restricted finances, the Roseburg YMCA never refuses anyone the privilege of membership and participation in "Y" programs. Memberships have been provided for whole family groups who are unable to pay any fees for the services they receive.

Older boys and girls are encouraged to "earn" their dues by performing needed services in the "Y." No differentiation is made between the "paying" and "sponsored" member, thus proving that charges are not to be construed as restrictive factors.

Sometimes persons in the

community like to sponsor a youth in the "Y." Usually the "Y" prefers to keep the identity of the sponsored youth secret, but on request of a donor, the general secretary will give clear details on the membership and why it was granted. The "Y" also receives memberships designated by the giver.

The important point is that it is the policy of the YMCA never to turn anyone away because of lack of money. In this year's campaign, which is for the 1964 budget year, the Roseburg YMCA will receive \$14,500 if the total goal of \$69,936 is raised. All this money will be used in Roseburg for services provided by the "Y."

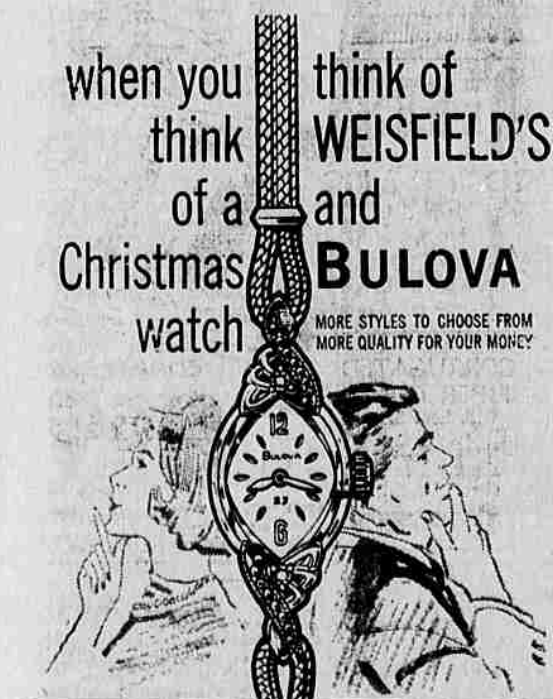

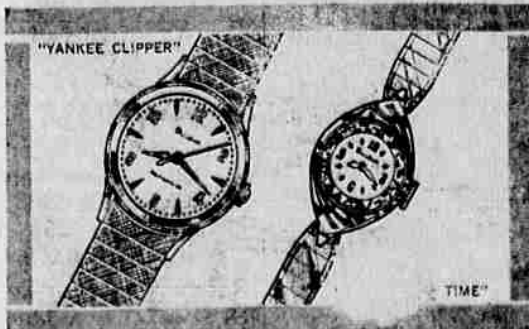

Busenbark Family Ranch Sold To California Family

The 286-acre Busenbark Bros. ranch at Melrose was sold this week to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Guide and six children of Fresno, Calif., who will move here in March. The ranch was purchased in November, 1909, by John Busenbark Sr., who had come from Wichita, Kans., to visit cousins in Roseburg and liked the surrounding country. Other members of the family, Kathryn, John Jr. and the three married brothers, Royce, David and Tence, with their wives and children, arrived in 1910 bringing their farm equipment and belongings by railroad.

The family group lived for a few months with the elder Busenbarks in the old house while land was being cleared and houses built for the three older brothers on the 10-acre plots given to each child by their father. Kathryn and John later sold their interests to the others. The old house still is in good condition and has been occupied for the past several years by Mr. and Mrs. Guy Oglesby.

The sale does not include the homes of Royce and Dave.

Since the brothers' retirement from active farming a number of years ago, the ranch was operated by the late Dale Busenbark, son of the T. B. Busenbarks. Over the years the ranch has progressed from pasture and uncleared land to a fine diversified farm with various fruits, walnuts and grain fields. At one time a large prune orchard and drier were maintained, also a large dairy herd. In later years hogs and cattle and raising of feed for same and the pear orchards have been the main areas of production.
