

# CV Hornets--Eddyville Clash For District Title

Camas Valley's Hornets, proudly wearing the Southern Oregon Eight-man League toga, will be out to add the District 1 eight-man championship to their growing list of accomplishments for the 1963 grid season Saturday.

The Hornets will travel to the coast to meet Eddyville, champion of the northern half of District 1, Saturday at 2 p.m. on the Newport field.

Camas Valley romped through league play with decisive wins over its four conference opponents, and for the season the Hornets sport a respectable 7-1 record.

Eddyville battled to a tie with Alsea in the race for the northern half title, but as a result of its win over Alsea early in the season the Eddyville crew earned the right to meet the Hornets for the district championship. Alsea and Eddyville each suffered one loss during the season.

The Hornets sport one of the highest scoring teams in the state, with a total of 406 points in eight games. The Camas defense has allowed just 40 points while its offense has been running wild.

Canyonville's Tigers, the 1962 Southern Oregon League champs, handed the Hornets their lone setback, 20-19. This was the only time the Hornets have been held under 40 points all season, and the newly crowned conference champs came back to avenge the loss to the Tigers by a 5-13 count. In these two games Canyonville accounted for 33 of the 40 points the Hornets have allowed this year, with Prospect scoring the other seven.

In league play the Hornets upended Days Creek, 67-0, toppled Prospect, 54-7, dumped Butte Falls, 51-0 and clinched the league crown with the 45-13 win over Canyonville. In non-league games Camas Valley blanked Days Creek, 68-0, whitewashed Sisters, 41-0, and clobbered Butte Falls, 62-0.

Statistics for the season find the Hornets with 3,370 total net yards rushing and one punt return. Passing the local eight-man power has completed 49 of 83 tosses for 848 yards. The eight opponents have been limited to 843 yards on the ground and 677 yards passing, completing 69 of 177 attempts.

Terry Volkman has been the big gun in the Hornets' attack, having gained 1,024 yards rushing. In addition Volkman has racked up 141 points on 22 TDs and nine extra points.

Mike Priest has added 861 yards rushing and has scored 103 points on 15 six-pointers and 13 PATs.

Jim Kiser is the passing star for the Hornets. The talented field general has completed 34 of 63 tosses for a .539 completion percentage. Through the air Kiser has accounted for 687 yards.

Terry Buel, a capable runner and quarterback who has been switched to an end position, is the leading receiver. Buel has hauled in 21 passes for 241 yards.

Don Lawson handles the punting for the Hornets. Lawson has been back to punt 11 times this year, booting the ball for 375 yards for a 34 yard average.

Camas Valley, while not overpowering in the weight division, has speed to burn. Kiser, tipping the scales at 142 pounds, will start at quarterback, with halfbacks Volkman (160) and Priest (180) flanking the signal caller.

In the offensive line coach Bill Welch will lead off with Buel (155) and Lawson (150) playing the end positions. The interior forward wall will be composed of Jay Randall (160) and Roger Thursh (170) at the guard spots, while John Parret (164) will start at center.

Defensively the starting lineup for the Hornets will be composed of ends Thrush and Kiser; guards Randall and Bruce Smith (182); linebackers Volkman, Priest and Gary Dean (151); and safety Lawson.

The Hornets are gunning for their first appearance in the state playoffs, and the first eight-man championship for a Douglas County team. Canyonville came close to winning the crown last year, reaching the state finals before falling to Hereford.

Camas Valley is returning to the District 1 finals after an absence of one year. The Hornets won the league crown in 1960 and 1961.

Welch, after seeing Eddyville play last week, reports that the northern champs will match the Hornets in weight and will come close in speed. He added that both teams run much the same type of offenses, and is looking for a hard-fought contest when the teams meet head-on Saturday at Newport.

## Douglas Must Stop Consbruck To Win A-2 Quarterfinal Tilt

"Stop Consbruck!" This will be the cry of the Douglas Trojan fans tonight when the Umpqua Valley League champs tangle with the No. 1 ranked Phoenix Pirates in a state A-2 quarterfinal clash at the Southern Oregon College field in Ashland.

Consbruck is Jim Consbruck, hard-running backfield star for the Pirates who has gained 854 yards in 124 carries during the season. In addition the powerful Phoenix back leads the team in scoring with 19 TDs and six PATs for 120 points.

However, Consbruck is only one of the problems facing the Trojans tonight. Other players that must be stopped if the local crew is to upset the top ranked A-2 team are Dennis Grennan, Jon Granby, Ron Williams and Dale Sauer.

Grennan ranks second to Consbruck in rushing with 477 yards for 106 carries, while Granby has gained 361 yards on 37 carries. Sauer has carried 33 times for 225 yards and Williams has picked up 178 yards on 39 carries. In addition, Williams is the Pirates' passer, having completed 19 of 37 attempts for 422 yards. Granby, Consbruck and Sauer have each hauled in six passes to lead the

team in this department. Phoenix has gained a total of 2,783 yards from scrimmage in winning nine straight contests. The Pirates have done most of their damage on the ground, totaling 2,260 yards rushing and 523 yards passing. The Pirates have outscored their opponents, 320-6, with Sacred Heart recording the lone TD against the No. 1 rated team.

Douglas will counter the strong Phoenix attack with a pair of super-stars of its own—fullback Jim Heard and quarterback Dan Withers.

Heard leads the Trojans' running game with over 1,000 yards gained mostly on straight-ahead power. Withers has a total of nearly 1,500 yards offense with some tricky rushing and his passing. Favorite targets for Withers include Chuck Person, Russ Anderson and Ray Seppherd.

The Trojans have scored 11 points and have allowed 91. For the season Douglas has a total of 2,447 yards—1,677 rushing and 770 passing.

## County Gridders Play Major Roles For State's Many Collegiate Teams

Douglas County has developed a wealth of gridiron stars who have been playing outstanding ball throughout Oregon in college competition.

Portland State, the newly crowned Oregon Collegiate Conference champs, are led by a pair of former Roseburg stars. Halfbacks Billy (Bye Bye) White and Jerry Humphreys were two of the major cogs in PSC's championship drive. White led the league in rushing last year, and is almost certain to repeat on the all-conference team. White and Humphreys are both playing their fourth season of football for the Vikings, and during most of this time the two played both offense and defense.

Elsewhere in the Oregon College Conference three other local boys are listed on available rosters. Don Fisher, Riddle star, is competing in his second year at Eastern Oregon College. John Sneed, 205-pound tackle from Drain, is one of 40 freshmen competing for Oregon Technical Institute in what is termed a "building year." Kenny King, a member of Roseburg 1961 state championship team, is now at Southern Oregon College, but sat out the season because he was ineligible after transferring from the University of Oregon.

Linfield boasts two county players — Larry Miller, Roseburg, and Dennis Schweitzer, Reedsport. Miller is a 5-11, 185-pound senior end who is playing his third season. Schweitzer, a stand-out junior, was injured early in the season and spent the remainder of the year on the sidelines.

Pacific has a returning letterman from Roseburg in the form of Bob Roark. Roark has been playing offensive line, and has seen limited defensive action. He is a sophomore.

Playing for Willamette is Yoncalla's Jim Booth and Roseburg's Spike Moore. Booth, a 200-pound end, is playing his fourth season and is the only three-sport letterman currently at Willamette. Moore, a freshman, has been used as a defensive back throughout the season, and has been praised for his fine work. Both Booth and Moore are expected to strengthen the Willamette basketball team this winter.

Oregon lists two Roseburg players on the varsity roster. Ray Palm, former prep all-American end, and Mike Flury, a hard-nosed fullback. Palm has seen considerable action, alternating at an end spot with the regulars. Flury has been limited because of injuries. Both are sophomores, and Duck coach Len Casanova is expecting both to play key roles in future years.

At Oregon State the only local players are listed on the freshman squad. Competing for the Rooks have been quarterback Paul Brothers, tackle Doug John and end Vern Ohman. All are from Roseburg.

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
