Youths Riot In Prelude To Grid Tilt

ATHENS, Ohio (UPI) — Between 300 and 1,000 students, apparently spurred by football rivalry between Bowling Green State and Ohio universities, rioted last night, throwing bottles, jeering police and blocking traffic.

Bowling Green and Ohio clash today in a football game that will decide the Mid-American Conference champion. City police called for assistance from the Highway Patrol, which sent two cruisers. Traffic was tied up for more than a half-hour, and even after police said the disturbance had been broken up many students from both universities continued to mill in the area.

Assistance was also requested from the Ohio University campus police.

A highway patrolman said he believed some arrests were made, but an officer at city police headquarters said the department was making no statements about the incident. Police Chief J. B. Grogan was not available for comment, nor were Ohio University officials. No one was believed seriously hurt in the riot, which involved 1,000 students, although several fights broke out.

Another report indicated only about 300 students were involved in the incident. This source said four students were arrested on charges of disturbing the peace, but the arrests could not be confirmed.

"We're making no comment on it," said a city policeman at headquarters when questioned about the riot.

Apparently no major damage was caused by the students. The Ohio University security force at first reported nothing had happened out of the ordinary for a Friday night — "Just a couple of drunk students," said one officer. Later it acknowledged there had been trouble off campus but no comment was available from the security office.

The Ohio-Bowling Green game was one of the highlight games on the last full weekend of college football in the state. This was the fifth consecutive year the two schools have collided for the Mid-American Conference gridiron title, and Bowling Green was favored to take the Bobcats for a fourth time.

Defendant Has Verdict In Suit Over Accident

Verdict for the defendant, Victor Starbuck, was returned by a jury on trial in a suit brought by Everett L. Lockhart, administrator of the estate of Ethel Lockhart. The trial opened Thursday at 10 a.m. and was concluded with the jury verdict at 2:24 p.m. Friday. The case was tried by Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders. Lockhart had sought judgment for \$25,000 plus costs and disbursements for the death of Mrs. Lockhart in an automobile accident May 11, 1962. The accident took place on the Days Creek Cut-off Road three-quarters of a mile south of the intersection of Forest Road. Mrs. Lockhart was driving a 1959 automobile northerly when it collided with the car operated by Starbuck, traveling southerly. Lockhart had charged negligence.

Brazil, U.S. Resolve Last Controversy In Inter-American Economic Session

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—The United States and Brazil reached agreement early today on the terms of a disputed aid proposal, resolving the last major element of controversy at the Inter-American Economic Conference.

The resolution agreed on after night-long discussion provides that a Brazilian plan for the creation of a \$20-billion inter-American aid fund to which

"all nations" might contribute will be taken up for study within 90 days by the newly-created agency for coordination of U.S. aid to Latin America.

The conference decided that the coordinating agency should hold its first meeting in Buenos Aires, starting Feb. 24 and continuing to March 14. The Brazilian plan presumably would be discussed at that meeting.

Creation of the coordinating agency, an earlier source of controversy, was approved Friday night by all of the new-world nations represented here except Bolivia, which abstained from the vote.

Bolivian Planning Minister Roberto Jordan Pinto said his government does not believe the United States and Latin America are completely prepared to carry out the Alliance for Progress aid program, which would be coordinated by the new agency.

"We are frank where others are not," Jordan said. "President Kennedy and those around him have to cope with those who do not understand Latin America and its people."

Dominican delegate Pedro Casals, who voted for the resolution, said he believed it should have contained some reference to what he called "political criteria" in U.S. aid programs.

"The United States uses political influence in administering aid," Casals said. "It withdrew aid from my country during the recent crisis (which created the present Dominican civilian junta regime)."

Debate on the wording of the Brazilian measure went on in a subcommittee room through the night Friday night, while the full conference was registering its formal approval of the coordinating agency and other measures agreed on earlier.

Program To Reduce Costs Is Paying Off For City

"Operation Economy" is still "a way of life" for the city of Roseburg, according to a report just released by City Manager Craig McMicken.

This is the second in a series of reports on efforts to provide, in the words of Mayor Thomas Garrison, "the required city services at the least possible cost." The first report came in January of this year.

Department heads submitted reports describing economies and more efficient methods in operation of their departments. The department reports covered 24 pages.

In his summary report, McMicken says no dollar amount was assigned to efficiency, but that departmental expenditures have totaled \$24,333 less than the \$636,726 budgeted in the general fund. These savings will be budgeted for the next fiscal year as required by law to reduce the need for raising property taxes.

McMicken said the greatest value to come out of "Operation Economy" is the attitude of all city workers. He said they are doing their jobs "with a sincere attempt at making savings wherever possible."

Among the typical savings were such things as installation of a ethyl gas pump to cut delivery price of gasoline 3 cents a gallon for the police department (savings, \$450), salvage of filter rock from the old disposal plant for road construction by the street department (savings,

Calapooia Church Will Be Built In Two Stages

Still another new church plant will soon be added to the Central Douglas County scene. Closely following the announcement of construction starts for two Roseburg churches comes a progress report from the Calapooia Free Methodist Church, the foundation for which was laid in the first week in August.

The new Calapooia church will be constructed in two stages, the first of which is scheduled for completion to the "use" stage in late spring or early summer. The initial stage will consist of 12 Sunday School classrooms, a nursery, three assembly rooms for meetings, a church office and a pastor's study. According to the Rev.

C. O. Tremain, minister of the church, the largest assembly room will be used first for services and a sanctuary proper will be constructed at a later date.

Work Proceeding Plans for the building were drawn by Walter Barham, Coos Bay engineer, and work is proceeding with two full-time carpenters and additional help being donated by church members. Cost of the building at move-in time is estimated at around \$25,000.

The planned sanctuary will cost an additional \$30,000, exclusive of volunteer help and donations. Around 30 families make up the membership of the church at present and "faith and hard work" are responsible for the start of the ambitious undertaking, Tremain said.

Plumbing, electrical work, windows and doors are the next steps in the construction. The building has been winterized and interior work can proceed regardless of the weather, according to Tremain.

The present minister returned to the pastorate Aug. 1 from a six-year tenure in the Klamath Falls church, replacing the Rev. Ray Macbeth who was transferred to the Tennessee conference of the denomination.

Church Served Earlier The Rev. Mr. Tremain had served the church earlier for three years before moving to Klamath Falls. He is a native of Washington state and attend-

Rocky: Barry Not In Tune With GOP Thinking

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI)—New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, campaigning for the Republican presidential nomination, said today that Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., will not be the 1964 GOP standard bearer unless he "modifies his positions."

Rockefeller said Goldwater was "not in tune with the main stream of Republican thinking." The New York governor said, "unless Goldwater makes some radical change he won't hold the support he has now."

However, Rockefeller pledged, "I will support whoever wins the nomination." Rockefeller, the only announced candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, challenged the Arizona senator to modify his stands on foreign and domestic affairs.

Rockefeller said in the past Goldwater has urged "withdrawing from the United Nations, sale of the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA)" and in-

cluded both ideas are contrary to the mainstream of American thought.

Wandering Child Gives Mom Scare

Sutherlin police and the sheriff's department thought they had a kidnapping on their hands Friday afternoon when they received word of a missing Sutherlin boy.

Ronnie Dexter Stillwell was the subject of much confusion and worry for a brief period when he was reported missing about 2:30 p.m.

The boy's mother was in a coin-operated laundry washing clothes when he wandered off. When she started looking for him, she was informed that someone saw the tot get into a black sedan with a man and woman.

She had no other description than that the car had some clothing in it. Fearing the worst, she notified police. All points bulletin to be on a lookout for the car was sent out. Officers had little to go on.

But little Ronnie wasn't far away. He was located a short time later in a nearby variety store. He wasn't lost. Just curious, and possessing a streak of wanderlust.

Rockefeller said, "Goldwater has been in opposition to President Eisenhower and the majority of the GOP senators on civil rights legislation."

The governor said, "Goldwater in 1963 voted against cloture to limit filibuster" against the civil rights bill.

In answer to a question of whether he would name a Negro to his cabinet if elected president, Rockefeller said he would be "receptive" to the appointment of "qualified citizens" to any post.

Rockefeller arrived by plane this morning for a weekend of campaigning for Missouri support for his presidential bid.

The Governor was whisked by motorcade to the St. Louis Press Club for a news conference. His schedule included an address tonight at a news media

banquet. His St. Louis visit will be rounded out tomorrow with an appearance on CBS TV's "face the nation."

There was no outward sign of any immediate support to Rockefeller among Republican leaders who said they were "neutral."

One Republican spokesman said "we're waiting to see the other candidates and may the best man win."

Lem T. Jones, chairman of the State Republican Committee said his party is "happy to have men of stature who will make themselves available as candidates." He predicted a "favorable year" for the Republicans in Missouri.

President Kennedy won Missouri by less than 10,000 votes. Republicans feel that a strong candidate "will sweep the state" in 1964.

POPE SENDS CHECK

TOKYO (UPI)—Pope Paul VI has sent a check for \$5,000 to Japan as a token of sympathy for victims of last weekend's mine and train disasters that claimed over 600 lives.

Msgr. Emmanuel Gerada, the papal nuncio, delivered the check to Yasue Katori, chief of the West European section of the Foreign Office.
