

Roseburg 11 Outbattles Medford 7-6

Beamer TD Caps Drive; Young's PAT Is Margin As Defense Key To Win

"On to state!" became the rallying cry of the Roseburg Indians and their many breathless fans after the local crew evened the score with the Medford Black Tornado Friday night at Finlay Field.

While the joyous Indians and their backers were busy celebrating the thrilling 7-6 triumph which advanced the Tribe to the state A-1 semifinals, the Medford fans sat in stunned disbelief and pondered the happenings of the night.

The victory, the second in 23 games for the Indians against the Southern Oregon kings, more than made up for all 21 of the losses Roseburg has suffered at the hands of Medford—and was sweet revenge for last year's 14-7 setback in the quarterfinals. The Black Tornado went on to win the state crown last year. Roseburg's only other win over Medford came 10 years back.

In the semifinals the Indians will meet the winner of tonight's game between the West Linn Lions and the Grant Generals. The game will be played Nov. 22 at Finlay Field.

Defense stole the spotlight from the highly rated offensive units, with many players having their moments of individual glory. Jerry Remick, Bill Elliott and Alan Young were just three of Roseburg's many heroes—each stealing the spotlight on separate occasions.

Remick Intercepts

Remick's greatest moment came in the closing seconds of the game as Medford was desperately attempting to reach the end zone with what would have been the winning TD. Moving mostly on penalties, the Black Tornado marched from the Medford 10 to the Roseburg 47. At this point Mike Barnes faded back and let fly with a long bomb which Remick wrestled from the hands of the intended receiver on the Roseburg six.

The crucial interception came with a mere two seconds left in the game. The Indians ran one play to end the encounter. Two plays previous to the fateful interception Remick had snared a Barnes aerial, but came down out of bounds nullifying the catch. Still the interception was Remick's second of the game.

Elliott Blocks PAT

Elliott, a surprise defensive starter who had seen very little varsity action this year, protected Roseburg's lead when he alertly charged through the Black Tornado line to block the kick for the extra point after the invaders had scored early in the fourth quarter. The spirited 170-pounder charged at the snap of the ball and dove into the pigskin before Bill Collins could get his kick away.

Young split the uprights with his kick for Roseburg's PAT which provided the host team with its margin of victory. In addition Young's punting kept the "Big Wind" from the south with its back to the wall during much of the game.

The entire defensive unit came in for its share of praise, limiting the feared Medford ground attack to 104 yards. Linebackers Mike Leep and Dick Gwaltney, along with the rugged line play led by Jess Hart and the pass defense by Remick, plagued the Black Tornado throughout the game.

Offensively the Indians were led by field general Jim Beamer. Beamer carried the ball 21 times for a net of 74 yards, scored the TD which resulted in victory and completed four of nine passes for 51 yards. Fullback Mike Leep carried nine times for 35 yards and halfback Bob (Smokey) Burgess accounted for a net of 32 yards on 12 carries.

Medford fullback Bill Enyart was the work-horse of the invaders' attack with 14 carries for 61 yards, while Barnes completed seven of 18 aerials for 146 yards.

The Indians kicked off to open the game, forcing Medford to punt after three plays. However, a 15-yard roughing the kicker penalty gave the losers a first down on the Roseburg 40. A fumble on the attempted punt return would have put the Indians in the same poor position had the penalty not been assessed.

Medford proceeded to advance to the Roseburg 18 before losing the ball on downs.

Taking off at a fast clip the Tribe marched to the Medford 23 in 10 plays before Lynn Flanders fell on Burgess' bobble at the point. Mike Leep ripped off an 8-yard gainer and Beamer connected with end Gary Heeter on a 13-yard pass to spark the opening drive.

After being forced to punt, the Black Tornado was kept deep in its own territory until the final play of the half. While this was going on Roseburg stalled at the Medford 35, 37 and 39-yard line.

Tom Reese downed a punt on the Medford one and Dick Gwaltney came back seconds later to down one on the two-yard marker to keep Medford in trouble.

With less than a minute to play in the first half the Black Tornado took the ball on its 11-yard stripe. Enyart moved the pigskin to the 15, then ran for 16 yards. With four seconds remaining to intermission, Barnes tossed a long pass which Greg Gandee took in stride and raced to the Roseburg six before being hauled down from behind. Determined to defeat the state's No. 1 ranked A-1 contingent, the Indians came back fired up after the break. Taking the opening kickoff the Redskins went 63 yards for the winning tally.

Burgess returned the kickoff to the Medford 37, then went through the middle for three yards. On a third down and seven situation Beamer fired a strike to Ron Leep which was good for 25 yards and the all-important first down. Beamer then ground out six yards to the middle and Mike Leep gained one. On the third down the Indians were held, bringing up a fourth and two.

The Indians elected to go for the first down. Beamer bulled his way on a keeper over right tackle for five yards, and followed this with a six-yard quarterback sneak. After an incomplete pass, Mike Leep picked up another first down, moving the ball to the Medford 12.

A three-yard loss set the Indians back to the 15 and on the next play when Beamer found no receivers in the clear he took off up the middle and rammed 14 yards before being brought down. On the next play the talented signal caller went into the end zone on a one-yard

sneak. Young kicked the vital extra point to give the Tribe a 7-0 lead with 6:21 remaining in the third quarter.

Roseburg missed on a couple of scoring opportunities when they got the ball in Medford territory. Early in the final stanza Medford forced the Indians to kick—then marched 70 yards for its TD.

The drive opened with a 12-yard pass from Barnes to Gandee, then Gandee circled left end for an additional 17 yards. Barnes tossed behind the line of scrimmage to fullback Enyart who went down the right sideline for 16 yards. A pass from Barnes to Steve Toews picked up 20 yards and put the Black Tornado on the Roseburg five. Enyart powered his way for three yards to set the scene for Jim Cox's TD run. Cox sliced off his own right tackle to hit paydirt.

Winning Play
When Elliott blocked the PAT kick, the Indians enjoyed a shaky 7-6 lead with 8:38 remaining in the game.

Following the Medford TD, the Redskins marched from their own 40 to the Medford 25 before being forced to punt. Still, the invaders managed to get the ball with 1:44 left to play. Barnes took to the air, and the over-anxious Indians had a couple of 15-yard penalties called which put Medford in a threatening position as nervous fans held their breaths throughout the stadium. Remick's pass interception saved the day and insured the Indians the win.

The blocked kick for the PAT by Elliott and Young's kick for an extra point were very big factors as the invaders held an advantage in total yardage for the game and would have advanced in the playoffs had the game ended tied.

Roseburg will take a 9-1 record into the state semifinals as a result of the win, while the defending state champs wound up the year with a 7-2 mark. Statistics of the Medford-Roseburg state A-1 quarterfinal game are:

Tonight Calhoun will team up with Abe Jacobs to battle Maurice "Mad Dog" Vachon and Soldat Gorky in a tag-team match.

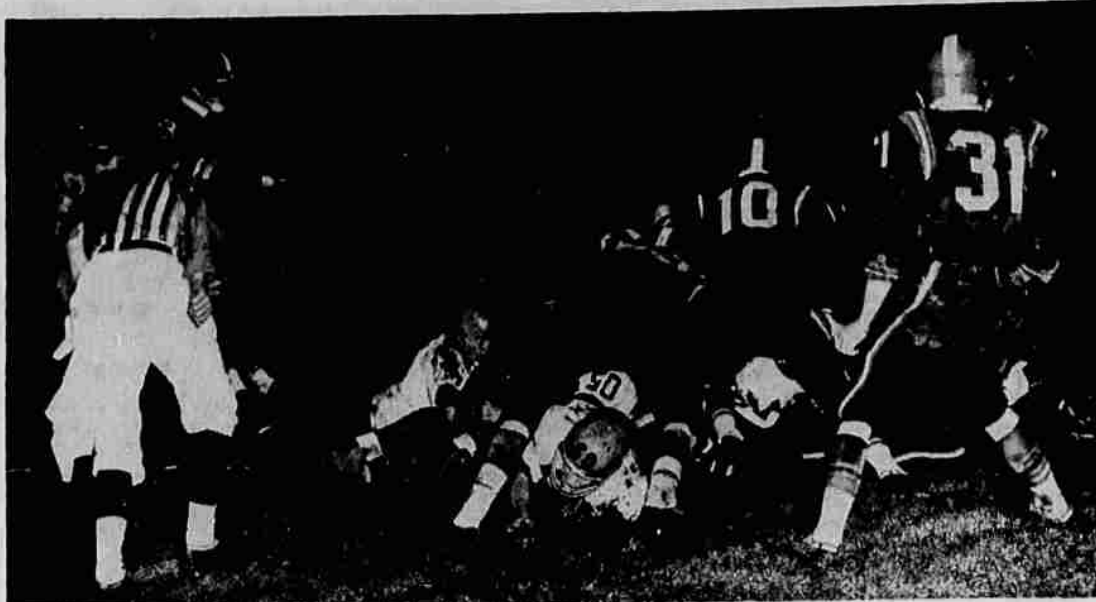

Warrior Five Drops 101-98 Game Friday

That old fourth quarter fade is haunting the San Francisco Warriors again this season.

They blew a 15-point lead in the final quarter Friday night as Detroit pulled out a 101-98 decision for the Warriors' fifth setback in six contests. The night before, San Francisco also saw a 15-point advantage slip through their fingers at St. Louis.

It was the inability to hold onto first-half leads that caused the Warriors to skid to their 31-49 mark last season. History may be repeating itself.

As an example of a team that does not fold, there is always the talent-rich Boston team.

The defending kingpins got a surprisingly stiff fight from New York but won 133-116 Friday to pull four full games ahead of idle Cincinnati in the Eastern Division.

Defending Western Division winner Los Angeles is having troubles, especially since Elgin Baylor has been slowed by injuries. The Lakers dropped a 99-97 decision at Philadelphia Friday night.

At San Francisco, Detroit really spread its scoring around. Bob Ferry had 16 to lead the winners, but it was jump-shooting Don Ohl who kept the rally going that saw Detroit pull even at 89-all after trailing 83-68 at the three quarters mark.

The two teams fought to 95-all and Ray Scott jammed through a layin with 54 seconds to go to put Detroit ahead for the night.

Boston had four men with over 20 points. Tom Heinsohn had 24, Sam Jones and Willie Naulls 23 apiece, and John Havlicek 21. Bill McGill scored 29 for New York.

At Philadelphia, Johnny Kerr's tip-in basket with 3:34 remaining put the 76ers ahead to stay. With nine seconds to go Dick Barnett's bucket made it 98-97, but Paul Neumann's free throw with a second left finished the Lakers.

Hal Greer had 33 to pace the winners, while Baylor was high for Los Angeles with 30.

football playoffs opened Friday night.

Games today sent North Salem to Pendleton and Grant of Portland against West Linn in Portland.

Alan Young's extra point kick was the margin of victory for Roseburg, which was held to a tie with Cottage Grove for the Midwestern League title this fall.

Beaverton survived a touchdown by Parkrose in the first five minutes and scored in the first, second and fourth quarters for its victory.

The Beavers drove 82 and 45 yards after Russ Jordan's 25-yard return of a pass interception accounted for their first score.

Phoenix scored at least once in every period on Douglas and held the Trojans to minus 21 yards on the ground. Phoenix also intercepted four passes and recovered two fumbles.
