

Douglas Trojans Lose Quarterfinal Battle To Phoenix Pirates By 38-0

Douglas Trojans had their state championship dreams roughly shattered Friday night at the Southern Oregon College field, running into the powerful machine of the Phoenix Pirates.

The host Pirates drew first blood in the closing seconds of the first period, then gained momentum to roll to a decisive 38-0 triumph in an A-2 state quarterfinal battle.

Phoenix, the No. 1 ranked A-2 team in the state, now advances to the semifinals, facing the winner of today's Woodburn-Vale outing. The Pirates, favored to grab the state title, have now won 10 in a row, while the loss ended Douglas' season at 8-2.

In rolling to the victory the Pirates displayed a well-balanced ground attack from the single wing, and backed it up with a brilliant exhibition of defensive prowess.

Douglas found its offensive attack all but stopped as the hard hitting Pirate line pushed the Umpqua Valley League champs back for a minus 13 yards rushing during the contest. The Trojans managed to complete only two of 14 passes for 41 yards as quarterback Dan Withers found he did not have time to spot his receivers because of the fast charging Bucs.

While Withers was having trouble throwing the ball with any degree of accuracy, fullback Jim Heard, the top rusher for the invaders, could not find any running room as the winners refused to be moved. Phoenix's highly rated defense which has allowed just six points to be scored in 10 games, limited the local crew to a mere two first downs.

The Pirates unleashed a

strong running game against the Trojans, with Dennis Grennan, Jim Construk, Dale Sauer and Jon Granby doing the majority of the damage, with an occasional assist from Ron Williams. The victors relied on their ground game for most of the power, though they did take to the air for a short period in the second quarter when the backfield seemed to be having trouble on the handoffs and pitchouts.

Phoenix broke the ice late in the first quarter when it marched 48 yards to grab a 6-0 lead. Grennan climaxed the drive as he powered his way for the final four yards.

Early in the second quarter the Pirates scored the first of several insurance TDs, blocking a Douglas punt on the 10-yard stripe of the Trojans to set up the tally. Grennan again

provided the scoring punch, this time going five yards with the pigskin. Grennan ran for the extra point.

Sauer put the Rogue Valley League champs on top 19-0 before halftime when he broke loose and rambled 21 yards. The lone third quarter tally was registered by Construk who broke into the clear and raced 46-yards to PAT. Grennan ran for the PAT.

In the final quarter the Pirates added two more touchdowns to their mounting total. The TDs came on a two-yard plunge by Gary Smith and a 50-yard pass interception by Sauer. Sauer grabbed the Douglas pass out of the air in the closing seconds of the game as the Trojans were trying desperately to get on the scoreboard.

All other action in the A-2 quarterfinals is scheduled for today, with Woodburn at Vale, Junction City at Siuslaw and Willamina playing North Catholic at Roosevelt High School in Portland.

Arnold Palmer To Start Manufacturing Golf Club

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Arnold Palmer would like nothing better than to equip every member of "Arnie's Army" with the appropriate weapon — a golf club manufactured by their "leader."

And the fairway wizard, from nearby Latrobe, Pa., already has made a move in that direction.

A golf club tinkerer from "way back, Arnie now heads up a company in Chattanooga, Tenn., which manufactures golfing equipment bearing his name.

"I've always wanted to manufacture golf clubs and now my dream has been realized," Palmer said from his home in Latrobe. "Ever since I was a kid I've been interested in repairing and designing clubs. I've spent hours down in the basement perfecting the clubs which I think were best for the game."

As for his mass production venture, Arnie disclosed that about 200 workers and 17 salesmen are currently employed at the Chattanooga plant.

"Our clubs are plain, solid-looking equipment," he said. "There is a better weight distribution and I think this will make hitting the ball a lot easier. We are putting the weight where the 'sweet' spot of the club is and in a wider area."

In his spare moments these days Palmer is resting up for his scheduled return to the pro tour early in January when he will play in the Los Angeles Open. A few weeks later he plans to participate in the Bing Crosby Invitational, also on the West Coast.

Arnie has had varied commercial interests before his current project represents his first venture into the manufacturing end of the business.

"I've spent a lot of time at the factory, consulting with the designers and offering them my ideas," he said. "Our products will be sold only at pro shops

throughout the country."

But the first set of clubs of the Palmer production line were saved for a "special account." They went to Arnie's father, M. J. (Deacon) Palmer, the man who taught Arnie the rudiments of the game and encouraged his progress.

The decision completed the teams' seasons with 3-1 records. Oregon edged Oregon State 8-0 in an earlier game.

Oregon State Edged By Southern Cal 28-22 As Trojans Make Big Comeback

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Southern California's two great running backs, Mike Garrett and Willie Brown, each scored a touchdown Friday night as the Trojans came from behind for a 28-22 football victory over Oregon State.

The Beavers' passing combination of quarterback Gordon

Queen and end Vern Burke clicked for two touchdowns in the second period, and another in the fourth period, but otherwise Oregon State's passing attack was bottled up.

A sparse crowd of 30-846 at the Coliseum witnessed a tremendous passing effort by Queen when he and his favorite target avoided the Trojans' defensive maneuvers. The three touchdown passes thrown by Queen brought his total to 16 in nine games, one better than the mark set by teammate Terry Baker last season.

Garrett rushed for 159 yards for the Trojans while Brown put the game out of Oregon State's reach in the third period with a 54-yard run down the sidelines for a touchdown.

With the Trojans leading 22-14, both teams scored in the final period when Queen threw his third touchdown pass to Burke for 34 yards. His other scoring throws were for 12 and 22 yards.

Hal Bedsole, back on the first USC team after disciplinary action, hauled in a seven-yard pass from Craig Fertig in the first period after a fumble recovery to give the Trojans a lead until Queen found the Burke in the second quarter to Burke.

March Ends In Score
The first OSU drive was the culmination of a 70-yard march while the second followed a pass interception on the Trojan 22.

Giants Favored By 17 Over 49ers On Sunday

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Giants counted three players "definitely" out today for Sunday's meeting with San Francisco while the Forty Niners are perhaps in the healthiest condition of an injury-plagued season.

The Giants, seeking their sixth straight win, are a 17-point favorite over the Forty Niners, who have had only five players 100 per cent healthy all season.

Missing from the Giants' lineup will be No. 1 fullback Alex Webster, safety Allan Webb and left linebacker Bill Winter. However, three injured New Yorkers came off the injury list — Rosey Brown, offensive left tackle; left corner back Erich Barnes and tight end Joe Watson. All six have had leg miseries.

San Francisco (2-7) will be making its first visit to Yankee Stadium in six years before the usual sellout crowd of 62,000-plus.

The Forty Niners were last here in 1957 when they whipped the Giants, 27-17, behind the passing of quarterback Y. A. Tittle. Sunday, however, Tittle will be on the opposite side of the line.

The 37-year-old quarterback is enjoying his finest season in his 13 year NFL career, making a runaway of the league passing race. He has 140 completions for 1,979 yards, 23 touchdowns and a completion percentage of 62.5 and only three interceptions, in guiding the Giants to a 7-2 record and a first-place tie with Cleveland in the Eastern Conference.

Peralta Wins Unpopular Decision Over Thornton

NEW YORK (UPI) — Argentina's Gregorio Peralta, controversial split-decision victor over California's Wayne Thornton, said today he'll grant Thornton a return television fight if Madison Square Garden guarantees the winner a shot at the light heavyweight crown.

The victory extended Peralta's unbeaten string to 44 bouts.

Promoter Harry Markson wants the return 10-round on Dec. 13, because Friday night's Garden fight was so exciting and controversial. Whether Markson can guarantee the winner a title bout with champion Willie Pastrano he did not say.

Dark-haired Peralta, 28, and favored at 11-5, won an unpopular verdict over blondish Thornton, 24, because he had managed to build up what seemed a lead from the third round through the seventh.

However, Thornton's thrilling start in the first round and his stronger finish caused many of the 2,500 fans in the Garden to

boo the decision for almost five minutes. Peralta's nearly closed left eye, which trickled blood from a cut on the lid, probably stimulated some of the objections.

Peralta, although heavyweight champion of Argentina, weighed only 178½ pounds Friday night — only three and one-half above the light heavyweight limit. Thornton, a recognized light heavyweight contender, registered 179½.

Rangy, fast-stepping Gregorio used side-to-side tactics during most of the rounds against the stockier straight-line body-blaster from Fresno, Calif. There were no knockdowns although heeels was knocked back onto his heels many times.

The two judges favored the South American on a rounds basis as follows: Tony Rosi, 6-3-1, and Artie Aidala, 6-4. However, referee Arthur Mercante had Thornton ahead, 5-4-1. The United Press International favored Peralta, 5-4-1.

An "official" poll by the Garden of 15 sports writers at the ringside favored Peralta: 11-3-1.

Whitey Ford Is Dazed By Offer To Join Yankees' Coaching Staff

NEW YORK (UPI) — Whitey Ford was in a kind of daze when the New York Yankees asked him if he'd like to sign both as a pitcher and a pitching coach.

"I'd just come into the house after speaking at a dinner in New Hampshire for 5,000," he said.

He gulped and added hastily: "Five thousand people, that is."

He "slept on it" and then agreed to his dual role. The fact that an estimated \$55,000 salary went with it helped considerably to make up his mind.

Ralph Houk, whose jump to general manager paved the way for Yogi Berra to become manager, still rode the bench at the announcement. He was a bit apologetic.

"We didn't mean to compete with that other fellow having a

press conference today," he said, referring to the fact that President Kennedy was speech-making a few blocks away.

Yogi stood around, shifting from one leg to another and nodding gnomish agreement to Houk's statements as the Iron Major explained a number of items.

Stays in Games
One was that Ford had always worked with younger pitchers, this way all hands would feel free to give or ask advice and that Whitey "has been thinking of staying in baseball as a coach when his pitching days are over." Whitey agreed, assuring that he looked forward to a "couple more years of action."

Houk went on to say that Roger Maris wasn't on the trading block; Rocky Colavito of Detroit wouldn't do well in Yankee Stadium because his power is to left center which is the deepest spot in Yankee Stadium; pitching was the Yankees'

strong suit; the Yanks were trying to develop and not trade for future talent; and that the big drive was to produce a catcher for the future as well as power-hitting outfielders.

The question also arose as to whether, when he was pitching and lost his stuff, as pitching coach he would take himself out of the game or whether Berra would make the decision as manager.

Ford Makes Decision

Houk interjected that during the past three years Ford was the only pitcher permitted to make his own decision as to whether he would remain in the game or be relieved. Houk said he doubted whether he had overruled Whitey in the decision more than four of five times.

"I guess it would be up to Yogi now whether I left the game," Whitey said. "When he wasn't the manager and I wasn't a coach he let me know. Every time he'd look into the bench, I knew I was gone."
