

Noted Gleemen Will Present Program Here Tuesday Night

One of the most famous musical organizations in the Northwest will appear in Roseburg next Tuesday evening. The Eugene Gleemen will present a concert in the Community Building at the Douglas County Fairgrounds beginning at 8:15 p.m.

The 60-voice, all-male chorus is appearing under the auspices of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club with advance ticket sales at both downtown Roseburg music stores and by the Roseburg High School Key Club. Tickets will be sold at the door the evening of the concert.

Organized in 1926, the group is now in its 38th season. More than 500 public appearances have been made and next Tuesday evening will mark the 168th full concert presented by the chorus.

In October of this year the aggregation made a recording for the U.S. Savings Bond program's "Guest Star" series which appears on 2,700 radio stations. The Eugene group is the only amateur organization ever to be asked to take part in this series.

On Nov. 10 the Gleemen sang for the opening session of the National Grange Convention at Portland. The members have made appearances at international service club conventions at Seattle, San Francisco and Victoria, B.C. They were, in addition, the official representative of the state of Oregon at the San Francisco World's Fair several years ago.

Director of the Gleemen is Esterley D. Schick.

Portland Warned To Expect Rise In Gang Activity

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Metropolitan Youth Commission was warned Friday that the Portland area faces an upsurge of juvenile gang activity with racial undertones.

Portland Police Chief David Johnson made the report at a special session of the commission. Multnomah County Sheriff Donald E. Clark said there were indications the county would be faced with a similar pattern.

"Gangs of juveniles seem to be taking advantage of any opportunity to create a situation where it is unsafe for a person to walk down the street," Johnson said.

He added some of the gangs "have the avowed purpose of assaulting individuals of the opposite race."

Members of the commission, as well as school officials, police and leaders of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, agreed that removal of the leaders from gang activity would aid in solving the problem.

They stressed the need for more money to aid in rehabilitation of "hard core" offenders, and suggested the community initiate and support a youth work-study-vocational camp.

Judge Won't Decide Proper Skirt Length

ANCONA, Italy (UPI)—A judge here has refused to decide when a short skirt ceases to be fashionable and becomes an immoral invitation.

The judge dismissed charges of soliciting against three young women who were arrested because they sat on a park bench here, in short skirts and with crossed knees.

Police said passersby complained that the girls were showing a "scandalous" amount of leg.
