

# Senator Pearson, Scottsburg Author Booked For Livestock Meeting Here

Four major committee sessions and four report sessions are on tap for this week's annual convention of the Western Oregon Livestock Association in Roseburg.

This was announced today by Dick Nichols, convention chairman and president of the Douglas County Livestock Association which is hosting the event at the Umpqua Hotel.

The committee sessions listed were: Legislation and taxation, with Albert Julian of Scio and Steve Eymann of Canby acting as co-chairmen; feeding and marketing, under the chairmanship of Charles Lucht of Molalla; livestock disease and parasites, under the chairmanship of Dudley Sitton of Carlton; public lands, ranges and pastures, under the chairmanship of Elton Jackson of Roseburg; and wildlife, under the co-chairmanship of Burl Oar of Roseburg and Walter Fisher of Oregon City.

These sessions are scheduled Thursday afternoon. The general

## CDUF Drive Goal In Sight

With more than two-thirds of the Central Douglas United Fund goal achieved, hopes were rising today that the target of \$69,936 is in reach.

The hope was put into words Monday at a progress luncheon of CDUF chairmen in the Elks Temple by Campaign Chairman Hazel Saxon. "If we can get in all the accounts and unit plans still out, we have a good chance of going over the goal," she said.

The major theme of the meeting was slated toward divisions making renewed efforts to get their contact accounts to the CDUF office.

Spokesman Willard Buchanan reported that the television auction Sunday had been a considerable success and efforts are being made to iron out "bugs" so it may be staged again. He said the auction had grossed \$1,800 to \$1,900 dollars.

In the listings of articles auctioned, the name of one firm wasn't recognizable. It involved four gallons of paint valued at \$18.36 from Gerretsen's Building Supply. The listing read "Gentian Building Supply."

With the addition of this money, the total is now 71 per cent of the goal (more than \$49,000).

Buchanan reported that just over half of the contact kits with pledges and money have been turned in. The total, he said is 642 of 1,187 kits sent out.

Mrs. Saxon said she would like to see all reports in by the end of the week, except the Unit Plans reports.

About 20 leaders turned out for the Monday meeting.

## County Firms Get Two Large Timber Tracts

U.S. Plywood Corp. of Roseburg and Douglas Veneer Co. of Dixonville submitted the high bids Monday for two large tracts of timber located in the Diamond Lake Ranger District.

U.S. Plywood offered \$271,802 for the 220-acre Upper Deer Creek Sale 70 miles east of Roseburg. The tract, which contains 16,600,000 board feet of timber, was appraised at \$271,777.

Douglas Veneer entered the top bid of \$321,447 for the Falls Cutoff Sale, a 211-acre tract located 62 miles east of Roseburg. This tract contains 13,200,000 board feet and was appraised at \$319,257.

### Volume Described

The tract won by U.S. Plywood includes 8,800,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$18.05 per thousand, 500,000 board feet of western white pine, sugar pine and ponderosa pine appraised at \$22 per thousand, \$3,700,000 board feet of shasta red and noble fir appraised at \$11.30 and 3,600,000 board feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$9.05.

U.S. Plywood's bid was based on the appraised price for all species with the exception of the western white, sugar and ponderosa pine group for which it offered \$22.05. The total bid represented an average of \$16.37 per thousand.

Other bidders were Evans Products Co., National Plywood Inc. and Sun Studs Inc., all of Roseburg.

The tract won by Douglas Veneer includes 10,500,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$24.45 per thousand, 1,800,000 board feet of western white pine, sugar pine and ponderosa pine appraised at \$14.05 and 900,000 board feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$8.30.

### Bid Averaged \$24.35

The winning bid was based on \$25.65 for the Douglas fir, appraised price for western white, sugar and ponderosa pine and \$8.40 for the western hemlock and other species. Total bid represented an average of \$24.35 per thousand.

Other bidders were J. R. Standley & Sons Logging Co., Evans Products, Douglas County Lumber Co., National Plywood, all of the Roseburg area, and Eugene Plywood Co. of Eugene.

Next Umpqua National Forest timber sale will be held Nov. 26 at 2 p.m.

## Reedsport Bank Gets Bond Issue

The Umpqua National Bank of Reedsport was successful bidder on the \$47,500 bond issue for construction of the proposed city jail and police station. The low bid calls for an effective interest rate of 3.397 per cent.

The other bidder on the bonds, Pacific Security Bank, submitted a bid proposing a 3.4133 per cent effective interest rate. The council by motion accepted the low bid, according to Dawn Pescau, correspondent.

The bonds are to finance a jail and police station to be built adjacent to the present community building and utilizing the space now occupied by the city recorder's office in the building. The present city administration facilities will be moved to the presently occupied Umpqua National Bank Building purchased by the city for remodeling as a city hall and library. The Umpqua National Bank is constructing a new bank in downtown Reedsport.

## Oaklander Held On Check Charge

E. L. McDonald, 34, Oakland, was arrested on a Circuit Court warrant issued following a Grand Jury secret indictment charging him with drawing a bank check with insufficient funds in the bank to pay the same in full. He has been released after posting \$1,000 bail.

McDonald is accused of issuing the check for \$500 on the First National Bank of Roseburg, payable to Southern Oregon Diesel, owned by B. A. Gregory. The check was accepted by Nels Pate Skow, an employee.

A charge of forgery against Nelson Gillespie Butler, 53, Eureka, has been dismissed on motion of the district attorney, on grounds the prosecuting witness is in Texas and cannot be returned in time for trial. Further grounds are that the forgery allegedly was committed in conjunction with several others, on one of which Butler was convicted in Coos County, and the judge there had knowledge of the Douglas County case in imposing sentence.
