UCLA Sophomore Honored In Big 6

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Sophomore Byron Nelson, who caught both touchdown passes Saturday in UCLA's amazing 14-0 upset of Washington, was named the Big Six "back of the week" today.

Nelson ran beautiful patterns to get clear, game observers said, then came up with sure-handed catches of eight and four yards for the scores.

All told, he grabbed 10 passes for 96 yards to equal a UCLA single game reception record set in 1953 by Dick Wallen against Florida.

Nelson stands six feet, weighs 195 pounds and comes from Inglewood, Calif.

Damon Bame, Southern California's hard-hitting linebacker, is the Big Six lineman of the week.

Bame was honored for his fine play in Troy's 28-22 win over Oregon State. He sparked a defense which stopped the Beavers' ground game and forced them to pass most of the time.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Recovering University of Southern California quarterback Pete Beathard called the signals during the Trojan practice session today.

Coach John McKay said that Beathard probably would start against UCLA Saturday when the two teams meet in the Coliseum.

McKay also said 1962 All-America end Hal Bedsole would start as a split end.

County Boasts Three Grid Title Contenders

Douglas County teams remain in the running for three state football championships after the opening round of playoffs concluded over the weekend.

Roseburg's Indians became the favored A-1 team in the state by nipping the Medford Black Tornado, 7-6, in the quarterfinals. The Medford 11 went into the game as the defending state champ, and was rated as the No. 1 team in the state.

In the semifinals the Indians will unseat their tomahawks against the Grant Generals, conquerors of West Linn, 18-0. The contest is set for Friday Field at 8 p.m. Friday. In the other half of the A-1 semifinals North Salem will entertain Beaverton. The Tribe owns one state championship—that coming in 1961 by virtue of a decisive 25-0 win over Beaverton in the finale. Should Beaverton get by North Salem, this year's championship battle could be a rematch.

Grant, the Portland champs, has won five state crowns—all before 1951. The Generals went all the way in 1943, 45, 46, 48 and 50. Beaverton and North Salem are both seeking their first football championships.

The county also boasts another top contender in the B Eight-man division in the form of the Camas Valley Hornets. The Hornets' easy 52-0 triumph over Eddyville in the district championship games installed the local power as one of the eight-man favorites.

Camas Valley will be seeking its first state crown, and to reach the finals the Hornets must handle the District 2 champion Dufur team this week. The game is scheduled for Saturday at 2 p.m. on the Dufur field. Dufur is located south of The Dalles on Highway 197.

The winner of Saturday's Camas Valley-Dufur game will play Eagle Valley the following week.

San Diego, Buffalo Sport Top Offenses

NEW YORK (UPI)—The decline of the Kansas City Chiefs (formerly Dallas Texans) from champs to chumps can be traced to the simple fact that they have had difficulty in moving the ball on offense and in containing their opponents on defense.

Elementary? Just check the team statistics released today by American Football League headquarters.

The Chiefs rank either fifth, sixth or seventh in every one of the six major categories of offense and defense.

Last season, when they won the AFL championship, this club compiled the second highest of offensive yardage total of any team in the league and yielded the least yardage on defense.

The San Diego Chargers and the Buffalo Bills continued to lead the AFL in offense figures and the Boston Patriots and Oakland Raiders ranked 1-2 in defense.

The Chiefs' three individual stars also trail in the standings of their specialties. Len Dawson, the AFL's top passer last season, now ranks fourth; Abner Haynes, the league's No. 2 rusher in 1962, has been switched to flanker, and Curtis McCClinton, No. 5 in rushing last season, presently ranks eighth.

Jack Kemp and Bill Miller of Buffalo regained first place this week in passing and pass-catching, respectively. The other individual leaders were the same as last week's—Clem Daniels of Oakland in rushing, Jim Frazier of the Denver Broncos in punting and Gino Cappelletti of Boston in scoring.

Injured '49ers Ready To Play

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI)—Two San Francisco Forty Niners hurt in Sunday's 48-14 lacing at New York were expected to be ready to go next week at Green Bay.

Quarterback Lamar McHan damaged his ribs, but X-rays Monday revealed no breaks. McHan himself said, "My feelings sure got ruffled up, but otherwise I'm okay."

The other injured man is Abe Woodson, who ran a kickoff back 99 yards and scratched his shoulder blades running into a fence near the sidelines later in the contest.

Bico-Trico B All-League Teams Dominated By County Grid Stars

Elkton's Elks and Monroe's Blue Dragons captured the most first team berths on the 1963 Bico-Trico B League all-conference teams in spite of the Yoncalla Eagles winning the loop crown.

The Elks and the Blue Dragons dominated the offensive unit chosen by the league coaches, with Monroe placing four players on the first unit and Elkton being represented by three. Yoncalla and Oakland each placed three players on the defensive first team.

Overall the Elks and the Blue Dragons each had five players on the two first teams, with Yoncalla and the Powers Cruisers placing four each.

The first team offense is composed of eight seniors and three juniors representing five of the seven schools in the conference.

Don Suloff, talented Elkton quarterback, was the top vote getter among a strong group of signal callers. Suloff is a junior

at Elkton, stands 6-1 and tips the scales at 175 pounds. In addition the Elks placed fullback John Levenhagen and end David Abraham. Levenhagen, the big-gun of Elkton's ground attack, is a senior weighing 190 pounds and standing 6-2. Abraham, another junior, is 6-1 and weighs 160 pounds. Yoncalla's lone player on the

offensive unit is Roger Johnson, a 170-pound junior tackle. Other first unit offensive all-stars include: end Dan Taylor, Powers; tackle Tom Thompson, Monroe; guards Mick Griffith, Powers, and Al Starr, Monroe; center Les Charles, Monroe; and halfbacks Wilbur Starr, Monroe, and Larry Kintzley, Lowell.

Yoncalla's defensive power was a major factor in the Eagles' league championship. The rugged defense played by the league champs resulted in guard John Myers and linebackers Don Wiley and Richard Wales being named to first string positions on the all-league team. In addition, Dick Langdon, David Vian, Tom Cogswell and Mike Latham earned honorable mention spots on defense.

Wiley is a six-foot, 180 pound senior. Wales is a 5-10 senior weighing in at 170, and Myers is a 5-8, 165-pound junior. Myers is one of three juniors named to the first defensive team.

Oakland players hold down three first team defensive spots. Kerney Manley, a six-foot, 170-pound senior was named to an end position; Mike McDonald, a 175-pound junior was named at tackle; and Keith Crenshaw, 160-pound senior holds down one linebacker position.

Elkton's Les Jones and Ken Adams were chosen at a tackle and halfback position respectively. Jones is a 200-pound senior and Adams a 170-pound senior.

Other first team defensive players picked by the coaches include: end Vic Hill, Powers; linebacker John McCray, Powers; and halfback Rod McCallam, Monroe.

The Eagles, league champions for 1963, will meet Jefferson in the state B 11-man semifinals Saturday afternoon. The site of the game will be announced later in the week.

Chamberlain Top NBA Point-Maker

NEW YORK (UPI)—With Chamberlain and the National Basketball Association scoring lead are a hard combination to separate.

Chamberlain embarked on a campaign to concentrate on playmaking for the San Francisco Warriors this season and thus his point production isn't as prodigious as in previous years. But with each passing week his name is becoming more evident among the scoring leaders.

Big Will now has the best scoring average in the league with a 22.1 mark and is the only player to show a field shooting average over .500. In last week's action, Chamberlain advanced from fourth place to second in point production with 449.

Jerry West of the Los Angeles Lakers is the scoring leader with 456 points, but he has played in two more games than Chamberlain and has a 28.5 average. Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks, who became the second player in NBA history to surpass 18,000 career points, has 419 points this season with a 28.1 average.

Oscar Robertson of the Cincinnati Royals is fourth in scoring with 415 points and Elgin Baylor of the Lakers has 392. Chamberlain's field goal percentage is .506, and he is followed by Jerry Lucas of the Royals with .497 and Terry Dischinger of the Baltimore Bullets with .491.

John Egan of the Detroit Pistons is the new free throw leader with an .878 percentage and Robertson is far ahead in assists with 148.

Chamberlain also jumped from third place to first in rebounding with 313 and an average of 22.4 per game. However, Bill Russell of the Boston Celtics, runnerup in actual rebounds with 306, has played in two less games than Chamberlain and has a better average with 25.4.

Fans holding reserved seat tickets for the regular season will have an opportunity to purchase these same seats Wednesday from 5 to 8 p.m. These tickets will be on sale in the RHS gym lobby.

In the event that the holders of the season's reserved seat tickets do not purchase the tickets by 8 p.m. Wednesday, the remaining reserved seat tickets will be sold on a first come-first served basis Thursday at 7 p.m. at the high school gym. Telephone requests for tickets will not be honored.

General admission tickets for the game will be sold at J.C. Sporting Goods, The Toggery and The Man's Shop in downtown Roseburg. These tickets will go on sale Wednesday. General admission tickets will also be sold at the gate Friday night.

General admission tickets for elementary, junior high and senior high students may be purchased from the above listed firms and at the high school during the noon hour. Ticket prices for the game are: \$2 for reserved seats, \$1.50 for general admission and 50 cents for students.

Athletic director Al Hoffman reports that the same seating arrangement will be followed as for the Medford-Roseburg outing last week, with no general admission tickets under cover. Bleacher seating for 2,000 fans is available, bringing the capacity at Finlay Field to 4,500.

Notre Dame Harriers Capture District Title

NEW YORK (UPI)—Winning isn't everything to IC-4A cross-country champion Vic Zwolak if it comes without perfection.

The Villanova student has everything to be proud of after breaking his own meet record for the five-mile Van Cortlandt Park course Monday with a time of 24 minutes, 46.8 seconds and winning the IC-4A title for the second straight year.

Instead, Zwolak complained of a pain in his right side and a "stupid" race that prevented him from recording a time of 24:20 as he had planned. The 5-foot, 9-inch Zwolak established the old record of 24:47.3 last year.

Despite Zwolak's heroics, Villanova was unable to retain the team crown, which went to Notre Dame. The well-balanced Irish squad placed five men among the first 20 finishers for a low total of 55 points. Brown was second in the university division with 133 points, followed by Michigan State (134), Villanova (159) and Rutgers (183).

Zwolak, whose next stop is the NCAA championship at East Lansing, Mich., next Monday, finished 100 yards ahead of Steve Machooka of Cornell. Machooka, an exchange student from Kenya, Africa, who won the IC-4A crown in 1961, was clocked in 23:08.

Bill Clark of Notre Dame was third by just another yard with a time of 25:09, and he was followed by sophomore Richard Sharkey of Michigan State in 25:13 and Frank Carver of Notre Dame in 25:28.

Paul Minehan of La Salle College retained his title in the college division varsity race won by La Salle in 26:30.6.
