

Tribe Readies Forces For State Semifinals

Roseburg's Indians, 7-6 victors over the No. 1 rated Medford Black Tornado in the first round of the state A-1 playoffs, are now busy preparing for an invasion by the Grant Generals.

The semifinal game between the Generals and the Indians will be staged on Finlay Field Friday at 8 p.m.

In reaching the playoffs, the Tribe posted an 8-1 record in the Midwestern League (District 5-A-1) play, while the Grant Generals won the Portland Interscholastic League championship (District 1-A-1) with a perfect 9-0 record.

Grant is the only team remaining in the A-1 title race with a perfect record. The Generals reached the semifinals by upending West Linn's Lions, 18-0. Beaverton and North Salem will clash in the other semifinal game Friday.

Neither Grant nor Roseburg are entirely without experience when it comes to playoffs. The Tribe has represented District 5 in the state playoffs for the past three years — winning all the marbles in 1961.

The Generals have been a perennial power in the PIL, and have five state crowns to prove the point. However, Grant's last championship came in 1950, and it is "hungry" to return to the "magic circle."

The Indians have scored 219 points in 10 games, while the invaders have put 193 points on the scoreboard. Both sport rugged defensive units, with the local crew having allowed 82 points to the opposition and Grant has given up 85 points.

Team-wise the Indians hold a

statistical advantage over their opponents for the season, having gained 2,909 yards from scrimmage, while giving up 1,976 yards. The Tribe holds a 134 - 114 advantage in first downs.

Roseburg boasts a well-balanced offensive attack guided by quarterback Jim Beamer. Beamer ranked as the second leading passer in Midwestern League play, completing 44 of 80 tosses for a .550 completion percentage. In addition the converted fullback has carried the mail 103 times for 352 yards. When Beamer is not guiding the charge, Jerry Remick is capable of making the Indians go. Remick has completed 11 of 16 passes and has carried 24 times for 80 yards.

Halfback Bob (Smookey) Burgess leads the ground gainers in rushing statistics. The fleet junior has carried 90 times for 832 yards — an average of 9.5 yards-per-carry. Burgess played the top average in league play.

To go along with Burgess and Beamer, the Indians rely on the power of fullback Mike Leep. Mike Leep has carried 91 times for 386 yards, and is a main cog in the defensive machine at a linebacker spot.

Completing Roseburg's starting backfield will be Ron Leep at the other halfback spot. Ron Leep is used primarily as a pass receiver and a blocking back, but on his seven carries has gained 95 yards. He is also a top threat in pass receiving, having caught 11 aeriels for 218 yards.

Ends Gary Heeter and Doug Matson are the favorite targets for the aerial game. Heeter has snared 29 passes for 402 yards and six TDs. In league competition Heeter pulled in 27 tosses to him with Thurston's Dave Gibson for the lead in this department. Matson has caught 12 passes in the 10 games.

Alan Young handles the punting, kicks off and kicks for the extra points for Roseburg. Young has punted 37 times for an average of 35.7 yards-per-kick, has kicked off 19 times for a 42.2 yard average and has booted 21 extra points.

Jon Burnham, a defensive standout, is at the top in punt and kickoff returns — having run back eight of each. Craig Engle, reserve fullback, has returned eight punts.

Kansas City Launches Trading Program In Search Of Power

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — The Kansas City Athletics plan to wheel and deal in the winter trading market this year in search of one item—power.

They are willing to sacrifice. They will give up front-line pitching, stable defense, percentage hitters and even youth to obtain that one hitting element for their lineup.

The Athletics' management believes there is no other solution to the club's perennial problem, a second division berth in the American League.

"We are fed up with our pitiful offense," said General Manager Pat Friday. "We must have power in our lineup, and we are going to get it."

No Untouchables
"That means there are no untouchables on our roster. We will consider trading anyone we have in order to get what we want."

The Athletics took their first step in the new power program Monday by obtaining right-handed slugger Rocky Colavito, the league's leading home run hitter over the past six seasons, from the Detroit Tigers.

In exchange for Colavito, relief pitcher Bob Anderson and an estimated \$50,000 in cash, the Athletics gave up veteran second sacker Jerry Lumpe and pitching regulars Dave Wicker-

Texas Tightens Grasp On No. 1 Grid Ranking

NEW YORK (UPI) — Stamping Texas improved its No. 1 ranking today in the runaway race for the 1963 national college football title.

Thirty-two coaches—one more than last week — rated the Longhorns first in the United Press International ratings on the strength of their perfect record, the only one among the major powers.

Pittsburgh and Michigan State negotiated the only change in the top 10 from last week, the Panthers taking over fourth-place from the Spartans, who replaced them in fifth.

Navy, enjoying the highest ranking ever held by a service team in the history of the ratings, fattened its hold on second place, drawing two No. 1 ballots. Mississippi slipped but clung to a three-point lead over Pittsburgh in third. The Rebels received the other first-place ranking from the 35-man board.

Increase Point Totals
Oklahoma, Alabama and Illinois each increased its point total in sixth, seventh and eighth, respectively. Ninth-ranked Nebraska and Auburn, No. 10 had the same totals as last week.

While the top 10 went undefeated last weekend for the first time this season, the second 10 was jolted severely with losers Washington (No. 11), Baylor (No. 14), Missouri (No. 15) and Ohio State (No. 17) dropping out of the ratings completely.

Syracuse, Penn State and Mississippi State moved up to take their places as the 11-12-13 teams. Southern California and Arizona State (winner of seven straight) tied for 14th and Wisconsin re-entered the ratings in 16th.

Memphis State, in the listings for the third consecutive week, finished in a 17th-place dead-lock with Kansas.

Utah Enters List
Eight-game winner Utah State entered the top 20 for the first time in 19th, and Georgia Tech and Army tumbled into a tie for 20th with the Air Force. The Cadets and Engineers were 12-13 last week, but were drubbed thoroughly last Saturday.

Texas rests this Saturday before completing its regular season Thanksgiving Day against Texas A&M.

The three biggest games between ranking teams take place this weekend, with bowl bids at stake in each one.

Illinois collides with Michigan State at Lansing, Mich., with the Big Ten title and a trip to the Rose Bowl riding the outcome; Nebraska, at home, tangles with Oklahoma, the winner to collect the Big Eight championship and an Orange Bowl invitation; and Penn State and Pitt meet in their annual rivalry at Pittsburgh with an Orange Bowl bid probably in the offing.
