

Young Wife of Supreme Court Judge Tells About New Life In Washintgon

EDITOR'S NOTE: United Press International Reporter Helen Thomas has obtained an exclusive interview with the bride of Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas. In the following dispatch Mrs. Douglas explains how she has adjusted to sharing the life of a prominent jurist.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The young bride of 65-year-old Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas spoke frankly and with warmth today about her new life in official Washington and the kindness she has been shown.

Joan Carol Douglas, 23, who married the Justice Aug. 5, told United Press International in an interview — the first she has granted — that she was aware that the 42-year difference in her age and her hus-

band's age caused some surprise when they were married. But, she said, no one is old when he is interested in people and involved in living.

"Some people are old and dowdy at 24, while others remain young always," she said. "Great people have the quality of eternal spring and are involved in today and tomorrow — not just yesterday."

As for herself, she said: "Some people wondered how my husband would keep up with me. But I'm taking vitamin pills to keep up with his pace. I can't think of a minute when he isn't doing something constructive, speaking, writing, hiking or putting up storm win-

dows. "He is a very productive person who is interested in everything," she said, adding, "there is too much chit-chat about age these days."

Mrs. Douglas said her husband intended to stay on the bench despite reports he would quit since he has reached retirement age.

Poised, definite in her opinions, a good conversationalist and a charming hostess, Mrs. Douglas said she is "in love" and happy, explaining "I'm of the old school."

She has soft appealing good looks with a heart-shaped face, dark blonde hair piled high on her head, expressive brown eyes and hands. She is only five feet tall and weighs less than 100 pounds.

Everybody Helpful
When interviewed in the long living room of her new home which she is busy decorating, Mrs. Douglas wore a simple blue velvet dress with a small sheath, a strand of small pearls and pearl earrings.

She said the wives of the other justices "and everybody has been very kind and very helpful." "Everyone I've met has been very warm and human," she said.

She is the third wife of the justice. Much is made of the fact that she was writing a treatise on Douglas' political philosophy when they discovered each other. Actually, she said, she was impressed by a speech Douglas gave at Allegheny College at Meadville, Pa., where she was a senior, and decided to write a term paper on his ideas.

"It was a silly little school paper, 150 pages," she laughed. "I got a good grade and three credits."

Rockefeller Ends Capital Visit Confident Of GOP Nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller wound up a support-seeking visit to the nation's capital today on an optimistic note. He said he was "more encouraged" than ever that he would win the 1964 GOP presidential nomination.

Rockefeller, the only announced Republican presidential candidate admitted, however, that he is running behind Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., but he expressed "no doubt" that he would overtake Goldwater in the months ahead.

The New York governor met with a number of GOP senators during his visit. Sources said he attempted to discount reports that he was in the presidential race merely to stop Goldwater and make way for a third candidate. Rockefeller was said to have emphasized to party leaders that he is in the race for keeps.

Rockefeller was accompanied by his bride since May, Margaretta (Happy) Rockefeller, who described the capital visit as her "most exciting" since her last one—a wartime trip when she pedaled to the city on her bicycle from an aunt's home in nearby Arlington, Va. It was Rockefeller's first Washington visit since announcing his candidacy.

Rockefeller, often holding hands with Happy, met groups of tourists and congressional employees during a three-hour,

hand-shaking tour of the Senate Monday that included a subway ride, a view of the Senate in session, three short news conferences, lunch, thousands of photographs and hundreds of autographs.

Monday night he met with a small group of Republicans at dinner in his Washington mansion. He described the dinner session as strictly informal. He said that he asked for no commitments from anyone and that the meeting was for an exchange of views on the campaign.

The group included Republican Sens. Clifford Case, N.J., George D. Aiken, Vt., Thomas H. Kuchel, Calif., John Sherman Cooper, Ky., Leverett Saltonstall, Mass., J. Caleb Boggs, Del., Jack R. Miller, Iowa, and New Yorkers Jacob K. Javits and Kenneth B. Keating. Gov. National Chairman William Miller and Sen. Winston L. Prouty, R-Vt., were invited but presumably could not make it.

A Rockefeller spokesman said national and international matters were the topics at the four-hour, round table discussion. All agreed that President Kennedy "should, can and will be beaten" in 1964 by any Republican candidate, including Goldwater, he said.

Bonneville Inks Anaconda Pact

PORTLAND (UPI) — Bonneville Power Administration announced Monday that it has signed a contract with the Anaconda Aluminum Co. for 64,000 kilowatts of additional firm power.

BPA Administrator Charles F. Luce said that the power will be delivered to the company's Columbia Falls, Mont., plant beginning Oct. 15, 1965.

The sale brought the amount of additional firm power sold to industry by the BPA in the past four months to 196,000 kilowatts, Luce said.

He added that it was the first additional firm power sold to industry by the BPA since 1960.

Colder Weather Due

The five-day weather forecast, according to the Weather Bureau station at the Roseburg Airport, calls for temperatures averaging below normal with much below-normal temperatures due around Friday. From 1 to 2 inches of rain are expected in the interior part of the state during the period.
