Policy Makers Chart Course For S. E. Asia

HONOLULU (UPI) — America's top policy makers met today in a top-secret conference room overlooking Pearl Harbor to chart a new and unified diplomatic and military course in Southeast Asia.

The meeting was the first since the overthrow of the Ngo Dinh Diem regime in South Vietnam and was also the first to include the senior spokesmen for the White House and the Defense and State Departments.

There was speculation here that inclusion of the three spokesmen at the meeting was an indication of concern in the Kennedy administration about previous conflicting reports and predictions on the war in South Vietnam.

On hand for the talks were the men immediately responsible for implementing U.S. policy in the area, as well as those who must insure that it coincided with America's global strategy.

This was the third such meeting here at intervals of about six months, but the two previous meetings had a less distinguished roster of participants.

Today's meeting included every top man in the Kennedy administration, with the reception of the President himself.

In from South Vietnam were U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge and the chief U.S. Military Adviser, Gen. Paul D. Harkins.

From Washington came Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Defense Secretary Robert McNamara and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff General Maxwell Taylor.

Host for the one-day conference was Adm. Harry D. Felt, commander in chief of Pacific forces.

Spokesmen here refused to discuss the agenda, and the participants themselves had little to say as they arrived for the conference.

Harkins, who probably was a topic of conversation as well as a participant, refused to discuss reports of his "closeness" to the deposed regime of the late Ngo Dinh Diem.

Cambodia's ultimatum to the U.S. to withdraw military advisers and aid missions—and charges by the Cambodian head of state that the U.S. is plotting against him also were likely topics.

Barghoorn Reveals Old Frameup Ruse In Soviet Arrest

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A "youngish looking" stranger outside the Moscow hotel thrust a roll of newspapers into the hands of the startled American. "Unwittingly, foolishly," said Yale Prof. Frederick C. Barghoorn, "I took it and put it in my coat pocket... almost simultaneously a couple of men grabbed me and took me to an auto."

Thus, with the oldest and crudest form of espionage "frameup," began Barghoorn's 16-day ordeal in a Russian prison. He told the story to newsmen Tuesday after reporting in detail to the State Department.

In view of the incident, U.S. officials said they were still undecided when cultural exchange talks could be resumed with Russia in the absence of a Soviet agreement on treatment of arrested persons.

But Barghoorn told newsmen, "I hope that this experience that I have had will not destroy the possibilities of continuing these exchanges."

Recollection Is Fuzzy

The 52-year-old head of Soviet studies at Yale told newsmen he remembered little about the young man who stopped him in front of Moscow's Metropol Hotel about 7:25 p.m. Oct. 31 and asked, "are you an American citizen?"

He half remembered that the man spoke in English, but he wasn't sure. He recalled that he accepted the papers he

Iraq Pupils Hit Embassy In London

LONDON (UPI) — Iraqi students shouting "Down with Arafat" and "Down with Nasser" stormed the Iraq Embassy here today and staged a sit-in.

The students and a number of embassy officials who declared themselves against the new Iraqi government of President Abdul Salam Arafat seized control of the building.

Embassy press attache Hashim Al-Rubaie claimed the Baath party and Baathist army officers are now "in full control" in Baghdad.

Al-Rubaie, who went to the embassy after the students forced their way into the building, said he received the information that the Baathists were back in power in a telephone call from Baghdad.

"In Full Control"

"The man I spoke to, who is a military officer at the presidential palace, said that the Baathists and the Baathist army officers are in full control," Al-Rubaie said.

The press attache said a meeting was in progress in the presidential palace in Baghdad among Premier Ahmed Hassan Bakr, Defense Minister Maj. Gen. Saleh Mahdi Ammash, and other Baathist leaders.

"They are going to have a statement tonight," Al-Rubaie said.

There have been no reports from Baghdad about the present whereabouts of either Bakr or Ammash.

Solons Rush To End Session

Hatfield Voices High Praise For Legislators

SALEM (UPI) — High praise for the legislature and its desire "to wind up the session as soon as possible" was voiced today by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

And in an interview with United Press International, Hatfield revealed the Boardman crisis came to light as plans were being made for groundbreaking ceremonies on the site.

Hatfield said, "I appreciate the desire on the part of legislative leaders to do a good job," and added "I have had extraordinarily fine cooperation from the leaders of both houses."

Hatfield said demands by Republican lawmakers that budget cutting bills contain rigid guidelines resulted because Republicans "want the legislature to participate in the responsibility" for the cuts.

He said legislators had a "single purpose," and that was to find answers to the state's fiscal crisis.

Thornton Ruling Mentioned

Asked to comment on Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton's opinion that he did not have constitutional authority to make selective budget cuts, Hatfield said "I am never surprised at any of his decisions."

Other than to say the opinion "held up the session," and was "subject to debate," Hatfield refused further comment.

18 Killed In Caracas Riot Today

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) — The worst outbreak of violence in the two-year Castro-Communist campaign against President Romulo Betancourt transformed the slums of Caracas into a virtual no-man's-land early today.

At least 18 persons were killed and 73 wounded in the first day of an all-out effort by the Reds to impose their will on the people of Venezuela through bullets, bombs and burning.

The government clamped a modified martial law Tuesday night on the Guarataro district, scene of the worst bloodshed in the early hours of the Communist terror drive. Armed troops stood guard elsewhere in the city.

Caracas was the principal target of the Reds' initial attack, but violence also was reported in the "oil capital" of Maracaibo, where the U.S.-owned Dupont paint warehouse was burned down by Communist arsonists.

Labor Minister Alberto Aranguren Zamora said in a radio-telecast speech Tuesday night that the rest of the country was quiet.

The terrorists are trying specifically to prevent the Dec. 1 election—a goal set for them by Cuba's Premier Fidel Castro in speeches broadcast from Havana.

House Approves Power Intertie

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Tuesday approved a sum of \$7 million for the proposed federal power intertie between the Pacific Northwest and California.

The money was contained in an appropriations bill, approved by committee last Friday. The measure also contained \$57 million for John Day Dam on the Columbia River and other funds for Northwest projects.

Rep. Mike Kirwin, D-Ohio, said the Appropriations Committee intended that no money be spent on the intertie project until a Northwest regional preference bill is enacted. This latter bill is tied up in a House-Senate conference committee.

Other Actions Pending

Other actions are pending against Roseburg Memorial Gardens in a petition filed almost a year ago, on which trial has been set for Dec. 27.

Title of the case is "In the matter of the trust created by Roseburg Memorial Gardens, Inc., on Nov. 9, 1954, The Oregon Bank, an Oregon banking corporation, vs. Roseburg Memorial Gardens, Inc., an Oregon Corp., Laurel Lodge 13, A.M. of Oregon and Avery Thompson, district attorney."

Laurel Lodge is named as being the former owner, which sold the cemetery to Roseburg Memorial Gardens in 1954, as having an interest in the properties. Thompson is named as district attorney, who has an interest in public trusts.

The Oregon Bank petitioned to be relieved as trustee, alleging no money has been turned in to it since taking over the trust from another bank in 1961.

The other banking institution had asked to be released for a similar reason.

Thompson, in an answer filed to the complaint, asked that a receiver be appointed for the trust fund. He suggested the name of Ralston Bridges as receiver to take charge of and to expend the net income of the trust fund. No court action has been taken on the appointment.

This receivership is not to be confused with the request of the Kittelsons for a receiver for the corporation of Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Thompson in his answer states that innumerable cemetery lots located in Roseburg Memorial Gardens have been sold by the corporation whereby there was printed and stamped at the head of all the contracts of sale and certificate of own-

Receivership Asked For Local Cemetery

A. L. Kittelson and Rosa B. Kittelson have filed suit in Circuit Court against the Roseburg Memorial Gardens, Inc., asking for a court order appointing a receiver for the defendant, and for such other and further relief as the court shall deem reasonable and equitable.

The Kittelsons state that the defendant is indebted to them for a sum in excess of \$33,000 for money loaned by them to the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

They state that the debts owed by the defendant exceed its assets, and that the defendant is unable to pay its obligations as they mature.

The complaint further alleges that the corporation has failed to pay into the endowment fund the sums required by Oregon law.

The Kittelsons further allege, on information and belief, that the defendant has failed for more than one year to make any payment to the endowment fund, although it has "collected large sums of money from the sale of cemetery spaces and sale of pre-arranged funeral plans for furnishing vaults and markers."

The plaintiffs allege it is necessary to protect the property of the corporation and to protect the interest of the stockholders and creditors of the corporation, so ask that a receiver be appointed.

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House Gets Fund Paring Bills Today

SALEM (UPI) — The legislature, apparently satisfied it had found a way to legalize giving its authority to the governor, rushed headlong today toward possible adjournment.

The House this afternoon was scheduled to act on a bill to eliminate capital construction projects, cut basic school aid, and trim agency budgets.

The cutbacks were lumped into one bill, and approved 10-3 Tuesday night by the Ways and Means Committee after a full day of searching to find a way to skirt constitutional blocks raised by Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton.

Thornton, in two separate opinions, said the governor could not make selective agency cuts, and that a bill to cut basic school aid which had already cleared the House raised serious constitutional questions.

In meetings with Ways and Means members Tuesday, Thornton pointed out the separation of powers of the legislature, executive and judicial was demanded in the state constitution, and could not be broken down, no matter how severe the state's fiscal crisis.

Compromise Outlined

The compromise that was finally reached calls for the legislature to adopt budget cuts as outlined by Gov. Mark Hatfield in his austerity program as "allotment reductions."

If additional funds become available later, the Emergency Board—made up of legislators—will have authority to release money for whatever projects it wishes.

In effect, the plan wipes out \$18 million in capital construction and salary hikes, trims \$17 million from agency budgets, and cuts basic school aid by \$12 million.

The only other courses open to lawmakers were to change each appropriation—a time-consuming job—or to appropriate the entire general fund to Hatfield—a move which would have made the governor the scapegoat for the cutbacks.

In another move, Ways and Means voted unanimously to introduce bills to divert part of the \$30 million higher education construction bond issue to community college construction.

The bonds will be voted upon next May. One bill sets aside \$25 million for higher education construction, and \$5 million for community college construction. The other authorizes use of \$12.5 million for college construction, and \$1.3 for community college construction next year if the bonds are approved.

Senate President Ben Musa said if no unexpected hitches developed, he hoped the special session could end late today or tonight.

Houck's Bid Low On Highway Job

Roy L. Houck Sons' Corp. of Salem is apparent low bidder on a project of constructing a new section of Pacific Coast Highway in Douglas County.

The firm submitted a bid of \$3,124,394. The project is the Sutherland Junction—Winchester section of the freeway which will be provided with four 12-foot travel lanes. The project is 7.52 miles long and includes grading, paving, nine structures and signing for the Interstate 5 improvement located about seven miles north of Roseburg.

Contract will be awarded Friday. Work consists of widening and resurfacing the existing two lanes and constructing two new lanes. Highway officials have indicated the project is scheduled for completion in the summer of 1965.
