# Morgan Says State Might Lose Money On Boardman Deal

SALEM (UPI)—Oregon will be "flat on its back for 77 years" if the lease with the Boeing Company for the Boardman project goes through, ex-Federal Power Commissioner Howard Morgan warned Tuesday night.

In fact, Oregon may lose money, he said. Morgan, former chairman of the Democratic Party in Oregon, testified before the Joint Ways and Means Committee. His remarks were promptly greeted by a charge from Warne Nunn, administrative aid to GOP Gov. Mark Hatfield, that Morgan was "a man who aspires to be governor."

# Demo Convention Changes Dates
