

Statement On Catholic-Jewish Relations Get Warm Applause

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Ecclesiastical Council fathers gave warm and prolonged applause Tuesday to the presentation of historic statements on Catholic relations with Jews and on religious liberty.

The statements declare that Jews should not be made scapegoats for the crucifixion of Christ and proclaim the right of all men to the free exercise of religion according to the dictates of conscience.

Although the statement on religious liberty received the greatest applause, the council fathers gave close attention to the presentation on the statement of Jews made by Augustin Cardinal Bea, head of the secretariat for promoting Christian unity.

The German-born cardinal said the statement was a purely religious matter and that there was no question of the council

AFL-CIO Refuses To Consider Admission Of Teamsters, ILW

NEW YORK (UPI)—The AFL-CIO Tuesday refused to consider readmission of the Teamsters and International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's (ILWU) Unions unless they clean out alleged corruption and communism, respectively, in their ranks.

Before the biennial convention took a vote on a resolution concerning the readmission, AFL-CIO President George Meany took issue with a charge by national Maritime Union President Joseph Curran that the federation has kept the Teamsters Union out because of a difference in personalities.

The Teamsters, headed by James Hoffa, was ousted from the AFL-CIO on charges of corruption.

Oriental Fathers Object

Some Oriental council fathers had objected Monday that the special treatment of the Jews in a document on Christian unity could lead to the persecution of Christian minorities in the Arab world.

Cardinal Bea told council fathers that his secretariat has informed Arab states of the non-political nature of the proposed statement.

The document is intended to recall what the church of Christ has received through the Old Testament of the Hebrews and that the church in modern times is the continuation of the chosen people of Israel, Bea made clear in his presentation.

Despite the cardinal's speech, three more prelates today objected to the inclusion of the

Western Pacific Owners Seeking To Block Merger

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A fight was underway today by dissident shareholders and directors of Western Pacific Railroad to block merger of the line with the Santa Fe Railway.

The group, which includes three of the 16 directors, hopes to keep the 1,193-mile San Francisco-to-Salt Lake City line independent. The WP board majority has voted to support Santa Fe's application to the interstate commerce commission for authority to acquire stock control of WP.

The "rebels" maintain that the railroad is solvent and as such should continue to operate independently. Both Santa Fe and Southern Pacific applied to the ICC to acquire the WP. An ICC commissioner recommended on Sept. 10 that Santa Fe be authorized to acquire WP through a common stock exchange. The full commission has yet to rule on the case.

Monday, the "rebels" vowed they would fight the board down to the last vote in an effort to keep WP independent. The group announced that as soon as filing can be made with the Securities Exchange Commission, it will solicit proxies in opposition to management's position.

In view of the action, management announced that a special meeting of shareholders will be held Jan. 10 for the purpose of "getting shareholders' views as to the board's action in opposing Southern Pacific's application and in endorsing and supporting Santa Fe's application to the ICC for authority to acquire stock control of WP."

House Denies There's 'Pork' In Works Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House Tuesday approved a \$4.2 billion public works bill with members heatedly denying that there was any "pork" in it.

The vote was 359 to 27.

The legislation, which still must be passed by the Senate, would provide funds during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1964, to finance flood control, harbor improvement and reclamation projects as well as the extensive and non-related activities of the Atomic Energy Commission.

With little debate, the House approved the \$385.6 million cut recommended by its Appropriations Committee.

Of the \$4.2 billion in the measure, more than \$2.6 billion would be spent by the AEC. But it was in this area that the biggest cuts came.

What little debate occurred was directed at recent critics of the public works program, commonly known as the "pork barrel."

The House made no changes in the committee's recommendations for Rocky Mountain region Bureau of Reclamation and Corps of Engineer programs, nor in the special Missouri River Basin and Colorado River Storage Projects.

Rep. Michael Kirwan, D-Ohio, directed his remarks at Life magazine which carried a story saying there were some projects it considered unnecessary.

ping, with this reviewer in agreement, and though the ratings didn't help Lewis either, it is still no cause for rejoicing when such a major television undertaking goes down the drain. There are too few good shows available to be happy at a failure. And though Lewis has made no secret of his stardom or his prominence, it would take a petty person to find satisfaction in the problems of any human being before a nationwide audience.

Lewis had his problems, all right. And there is little question that he brought the biggest one on himself: He promised too much.

He is a larger-than-life human being, made that way by his fabulous movie success, and his enthusiasm and sometimes overbearing self-confidence before an audience at times result in tastelessness. Done live, the show had no chance to eliminate these occasions—which this reviewer still believes comes from a touch of fear that Lewis once said he experienced when he is alone on a stage. Alone, that is, without a partner like his old sidekick, Dean Martin.

There have been some very funny moments in the series—but the effect of the tasteless occasions destroyed many of them that could have been saved. Basically, however, Lewis is simply overextended and overestimated his considerable talents in thinking he could just "wing it" for two hours on nationwide television, with only himself as the basic prop. As a group, his shows have certainly been putting a terrible load of faithfulness on such old fans as this one, who for some reason keeps coming back for more, knowing that no miracle will take place—and wondering whatever happened to the shy, underdog Jerry Lewis of the movie days with Dean Martin.

For Lewis, personally, I am glad the series is going off, because I think that any further weekly exposure, without a drastic attitude change—and a willingness to find a firm director—would do nothing but damage to his career. Even if

a man has millions, there is no pleasure seeing him when he is down—or taking an extra poke at him either.

Technically, the ending of the show was because of a difference of opinion regarding format, according to a joint network-Lewis statement. Whatever the reason, one can only regret the results all around, and hope that maybe a few lessons are learned.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House today passed an appropriation bill containing funds for several Oregon projects.
