

Queen And Berry Set Quarterback Battle Saturday

NEW YORK (UPI) — When experts sagely labeled this the "year of the quarterbacks," they didn't expect it to go this far: The boys under the center are leading the country in passing, naturally, and total offense, which figured.

But they're also on top in punting, which is a surprise, have been among the leaders all year in kickoff runbacks, place kicking and scoring, which is a bigger surprise and now, of all things, threaten to take over the country in rushing, too.

Oregon State's Gordon Queen, 21st on the completions ladder, has fired 16 touchdown passes, two more than anyone else and more than anyone has thrown in 10 years except Charley Johnson of New Mexico State (now with the St. Louis Cardinals of the NFL), who flipped 18 in 1959.

Queen has one game left and it figures to produce some long-range bombing. He'll be firing against Oregon State and Bob Berry, who is down in 16th place in completions, but is third in yardage with 1426. And he has thrown 14 touchdown passes, tied for second with California's Craig Morton.

Today's NCAA Service Bureau statistics show Gale Sayers leading the rushers and he, predictably, is a halfback. But wait a minute! Right behind Sayers, in good position to overhaul the leader, is Jimmy Sidle of Auburn and he is a T-quarterback. Sayers has a 14-yard lead over Sidle and one game to play (Missouri). Sidle has two games to play (Florida State and Alabama) and is the only one of the rushing leaders who has been averaging more than 100 yards per game.

If Sidle comes through, he will be the first rushing champion in history who wasn't a halfback or fullback. In fact, a quarterback has never so much as contended for the title.

Don Trull, Baylor quarterback, is the leader in passing and total offense, and the punting leader is SMU's Danny Thomas, another quarterback.

Trull's sprint to the top in passing also puts him in sight of a couple of records. His 1880 air yards leaves him 145 short

Hank Bauer To Manage Baltimore 9

BALTIMORE (UPI) — The Baltimore Orioles may feel like they are in a Marine boot camp when they report for spring training at Miami, Fla., in late February.

Although Hank Bauer tried to sidestep the issue when he was named the Orioles' new manager Tuesday, the flat-nosed ex-Marine sergeant indicated some Baltimore players will be stepped on if they don't behave themselves.

"I'll be tough if I have to be," said the 41-year-old former New York Yankee outfielder who hit the beach with the U.S. Marines at Okinawa in World War II. "It's up to the players. I'll expect 100 per cent from each man. If I don't get it, I'll take steps to get it."

When Billy Hitchcock was released as the Orioles' manager at the end of last season it was reported that the front office felt he had coddled certain players.

All this should change under Bauer. At least that appears to be the hope of club President Lee MacPhail.

"Hank has a well earned reputation as a competitor and a winner," said MacPhail in announcing Bauer had signed a one-year contract. "His qualities of leadership are what we need to put some spark into this club and change it from just another first division team into a competitor."

The Orioles, picked in pre-season polls to battle the Yankees for the 1963 American League pennant, slipped to seventh place at one stage of the campaign before climbing to fourth at season's end.

Bauer joined the Orioles last season as a coach after managing the Kansas City Athletics for the second half of the 1961 campaign and the entire 1962 season. Actually, Hank quit the A's on the next-to-last day of the 1962 campaign following tiffs with owner Charles O. Finley and General Manager Pat Friday.

Mauro Mina Fight Called

NEW YORK (UPI) — "More than for myself I feel sorry for my country. I was anxious to give Peru a great victory Friday night."

With these words and a shrug of his shoulders, Peruvian lightweight champion Mauro Mina today accepted the fact that he will not be permitted to fight in New York state.

Mina was scheduled to meet Allen Thomas at Madison Square Garden Friday night, but the Garden cancelled the bout Tuesday when it learned Mina had undergone eye surgery early this year. Undeclared Johnny Persol of Brooklyn, N.Y., was named to replace Mina against Thomas.

Dr. Oscar Teran, Mina's manager, admitted that his fighter underwent an eye operation for a detached retina in Lima, Peru, last March. But Teran added that Mina was given a five-hour examination by five eye specialists and they stated that the operation represented no danger.

"After the operation I fought three fights and won them all," Mina said. "I know that I have no problem with my sight and that my chances of beating Thomas are good, but I can't do anything but abide by the decision of the officials."

A spokesman for Madison Square Garden explained the fight was cancelled "in keeping with the New York Commission's position in not permitting bouts after eye surgery involving the retina."

Teran said that it was only after receiving the favorable medical report that Mina returned to the ring. He fought in Peru in September, October and earlier this month, winning two decisions and taking the third on a knockout.

So keeping that in mind, all these games are by a one-point choice:

Oregon (6-3) over Oregon State (5-4) — Webfoots running healthy now with halfback Mel Renfro and quarterback Bob Berry at their peaks. But Ducks will still have to cover the pass-catch combination of Beaver quarterback Gordon Queen to end Verne Burke.

Washington (5-4) over Washington State (3-5-1) — The Huskies apparently kissed off UCLA and they should bounce back to whip the Cougars. But quarterback Bill Douglas and fullback Junior Coffey will have to be at their best to stop Washington State. Coach Jim Sutherland's late-season quarterbacking find, Dale Ford, looked like Y. A. Tittle against Stanford last week. He completed half a dozen passes, at least, with two or three men hanging around his neck. The Huskies need this one to get to the Rose Bowl.

Southern California (6-8) over UCLA (2-7) — There is some belief that the Bruins shot their bolt when they knocked over Washington. The Trojans now know they can make it to the Rose Bowl. UCLA should have trouble containing Mike Garrett and Willie Brown. But who knows?

California (4-4-1) over Stanford (2-7) — Golden Bears have their most explosive offensive in a decade and if Craig Morton is on his stick could turn it into a rout. On the other hand, if Stanford goes back to the
