Authorities Seek Missing Reptile
 MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich. (UPI) — Police renewed their search today for a missing eight-foot anaconda.

The snake, capable of crushing to death small rodents or slashing someone with its razor sharp teeth, escaped from a downtown pet shop owned by Richard Kulik, 33.

Kulik said he first discovered the South American reptile missing Wednesday morning. He said he searched his shop and called police when he could not find it.

According to Kulik, the anaconda pushed back a wooden door at the top of its cage, found the mail chute at the front of the shop and slithered to freedom.

However, Kulik said the snake could not be considered dangerous.

But police did not agree with him and organized a search immediately.

The anaconda, a warm weather snake, grows to a length of 25 feet when mature. They crush their prey with constrictor muscles and swallow their kill whole.

Kulik already was under fire from the Macomb County Humane Society for keeping a rodent-eating boa constrictor in his store's front window.

The society complained that Kulik was feeding live guinea pigs to the snake in full view of an aroused public.

U.S. Writes 'Finis' To Military, Economic Aid For Cambodia

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States today wrote "finis" to an eight-year effort to bolster Cambodia's neutralist government with military and economic help. It had no other choice.

State Department officials said a note was en route to Prince Norodom Sihanouk bowing to his demand for termination of the \$28 million-a-year aid program and withdrawal of American military and economic missions.

More in sorrow than in anger U.S. officials predicted dire difficulties ahead for the 4-year-old prince who has sought to walk a tightrope between the Communists and the West. They expressed fear that leftist pressure, added to "unfounded" suspicions of the United States, was pushing the strategic Southeast Asian country into the Communist orbit.

The American note officials said, rejected Sihanouk's allegations that the United States was supporting exile "free Cambodia" rebels plotting his overthrow. But it agreed to his request for an end of programs which since 1955 have given Cambodia \$365 million in U.S. aid, including \$85 million in military assistance.

Authorities here viewed Sihanouk's actions with grave concern for Cambodia would be a rich prize for Communist China in its drive to gain the resources of Southeast Asia. Red domination of Cambodia would drive a wedge between pro-Western Thailand and South Viet Nam and flank what is left of anti-Communist Laos.

Chinese Communist assistance has been even greater. Peking has supplied Cambodia with textile, cement, metal working and other plants. Even the East European satellites—Czechoslovakia, Poland and Hungary—have contributed some aid.
