George Raape of New York illustrates this type of play. He won the opening club lead with dummy's queen and promptly led a low heart toward his own hand. East played the four and George played the nine. He was afraid of a spade lead from East and was going to avoid letting him get in.

Problem Poser Double-Barreled

Here is a hand that is a problem in both bidding and play. When it came up in the San Antonio tournament the final contracts ranged all the way from three no-trump to seven no-trump, with quite a few four spade, six spade, six no-trump and six diamond contracts thrown in for good measure.
