4-H Leader Lois Meyer To Attend National Meet

Lois Meyer of Roseburg will attend the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago Dec. 1 to 5 in recognition of her achievements in 4-H project work and activities, leadership and personal development.

In order for 4-Hers to be eligible for the trip, they had to submit a written record of their 4-H activities, have been in 4-H club work for at least three years, and be at least 15 years of age. More than 100 records were judged at OSU before the 24 trip winners were named.

The 4-H group will leave Portland by train Thanksgiving Day and arrive in Chicago Nov. 30. About 1200 4-H club mem-

bers from all states and eight foreign countries will attend.

During their five days in Chicago, they'll hear talks by national leaders and tour famous museums of science, industry and natural history. Boys will tour the International Harvester Plant in Melrose Park while girls tour the Art Institute. The youths will be honored at press conferences, luncheons and banquets at some of the city's largest hotels.

Three general assemblies will be devoted to the topic "Understanding the Changing American Community." Members will be entertained by the Boston Pops Orchestra and the Purdue University Glee Club.

All trips to the 4-H Congress are financed by private business firms and private foundations. Lois Redman, state 4-H extension agent, will be in charge of Oregon's delegation.

Queen Contest Rules Changed
