Authorities Spread Net For NY Jewel Thieves

NEW YORK (UPI) — Authorities searched today for two men who slipped out of their apartment-hideout a half hour before police raided it and recovered \$110,000 in jewelry stolen in recent burglaries.

The two, seen by neighbors fleeing in a car bearing New Jersey plates, were believed partners of two other suspected jewel thieves arrested Tuesday. Neighbors said the two wanted men were carrying large suitcases, which police theorized were packed with as much as \$200,000 in loot.

The apartment was rented under the name of Peter Tarallo, 37, who was arrested Tuesday with Stephen Berman, 30, after a bungled \$20,000 stickup at a West Side apartment house. The two were nabbed fleeing the scene of the holdup.

The loot recovered included paintings as well as diamonds, pearls, necklaces, and other valuables. Police said they were tipped off to the apartment's location.

Also in the apartment, which had triple locks on its doors, were bank papers indicating Tarallo had safe deposit boxes in two Manhattan banks. Police said they have applied for a court order to open them, and they said they believed the boxes would contain more loot.

Detailed layouts of many apartment houses and hotels on the city's upper East Side were found in the hideout, leading police to believe the gang may have been responsible for a wave of burglaries which have plagued the city to the tune of \$800,000 so far this year.

Burglar tools, narcotics, narcotic equipment and pornographic pictures and films were found in the apartment.

Two Persons' Probations Are Revoked

Probation of two persons was revoked on their appearance before Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders Thursday.

Ross Victor Kinsey, 21, Vancouver, had his probation revoked and he was sentenced to serve three years previously imposed for burglary in a dwelling.

Thomas Reginald Veach, 54, Mt. Vernon, Wash., was ordered to serve a year in the county jail for petty larceny. Revocations were on grounds of probation violations.

Ray Lee Smith, 22, Glendale, pleaded guilty to a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property. Judge Sanders fined him \$150 or the alternative of 30 days in the county jail. He was accused of having in his possession a radio stolen Oct. 27 from a trailer house out from Azalea, the property of Orville Renfro.

A charge of violation of the basic rule against Vern George Dykstra was dismissed by the judge on grounds further investigation revealed insufficient facts to obtain a conviction.

The case was an appeal to Circuit Court from a district court conviction by Judge Gerald R. Hayes and fine of \$5 and \$5 costs.

An old case pending against Clarence E. Young, charging obtaining money by false checks, involving a \$35 check, was dismissed for insufficient evidence. He had been indicted Nov. 26, 1962.

Iraq's Government Works To Restore Normal Routine

BAGHDAD, Iraq (UPI) — Iraq's new government worked today to restore normal conditions to the capital in the aftermath of two spates of fighting in less than two weeks.

Baghdad was calm today, with the curfew reduced to only the night hours and bus and bicycle traffic permitted. Private cars and trucks were still banned from the streets, however, and palace guards were started Thursday to see a crowd of newsmen cycle through the gates in an unsuccessful attempt to get an interview with President Abdul Salam Aref.

(Travelers reaching Athens from Baghdad Thursday said tanks and troops were moving continuously through the streets but that there was no further shooting. Machinegun posts fortified with sandbags control strategic streets, they said.)

(Baghdad citizens were clearly apprehensive that new fighting might break out at any time between Aref's forces and opposing national guard troops, the travelers said.)

Aref, who overthrew the Baathist government of Premier Abdul Hassan Bakr in a dawn coup Monday, named Bakr vice president in his new cabinet Tuesday, along with eight other Baath party members.

Among them was Premier Lt. Gen. Taher Yahya, who said in his first policy statement Thursday night that the new government would "do its utmost to realize the fulfillment of the tripartite union pact" among Iraq, Syria, and the United Arab Republic.

The proposed federation of the three nations failed to take place because of Baathist fears that U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser would dominate it.

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Iran Protests Loss Of Plane

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iranian officials awaited a reply today from the Soviet Union to a protest note charging a Soviet fighter plane shot down an Iranian civilian plane 15 miles inside Iranian territory.

The note was sent Thursday night protesting the incident, which was said to have occurred near the border town of Darrabgez.

(In Moscow, there was no public acknowledgment of the Iranian protest note.)

Iranian officials charged that three Soviet Mig jet fighters streaked across the border in the attack on the plane, which was conducting aerial map surveys. They said the pilot was not aware of the Russian craft until one of them opened fire with machine guns.

The Iranian plane crashed, the officials said, killing the two map surveyors aboard. The pilot was thrown clear but seriously injured, they said.

School Budgets To Be Reviewed

Four special conferences planned to present details on new school budget and elections laws to district school boards and administrators will be held during December and January in Douglas County.

The conferences will be presented by Matt Campbell, assistant county superintendent of schools.

The first will be held at Yoncalla for school districts 1, 22, 32 and 34 on Dec. 2.

The second will be at the Reedsport High School library on Dec. 4 for districts 9, 105, 125 and UH 13.

The Roseburg meeting will be held at Fir Grove Elementary School on Dec. 9 for districts 4, 12, 21, 45, 116 and 130.

The final conference will be at the Tri-City School on Jan. 6 for district 9, 15, 19, 70 and 77.

All meetings will start at 7:30 p.m.

County Officials To Attend School Meet At Mt. Hood

Four Douglas County school officials, along with a three-man delegation from Roseburg, will attend a special Tri-State Conference on the evaluation of instructional media programs at Timberline Lodge near Mt. Hood Sunday-Tuesday.

Involving representatives from throughout Oregon, Washington and Idaho, attendance is limited to official delegates from each area. County Supt. of Schools Kenneth Barneburg will head the county-wide delegation.

Also attending will be Myrtle Creek Elementary School Principal Ray Coffenberry, Reedsport Elementary District Supt. Thomas Huebner and Winston Upper Elementary Principal William Hedrick.

All of these men have been instrumental in the groundwork for establishment of a county-wide curriculum materials center.

Representing the Roseburg schools will be Asst. Supt. of Schools Harry Jacoby, audiovisual director Alva Laws and Riverside Elementary Principal Roy Crain.

Speaking before a meeting of the American Anthropological Assn. — which is holding its 62nd annual conference in San Francisco — Dr. Steven Polgar of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America said that in a study he conducted in the Bay area into the eating habits of pregnant women only nine per cent named pickles as their favorite food.

Polgar told the group that 30 per cent of the women interviewed named fruit juices as their most popular food while expecting. Meat and fish polled a close second place.

He said on a national level pickles ranked in fifth place as the food most craved by pregnant women.

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LaDuke Awarded Injury Damages On Trial By Jury

Robert C. LaDuke Thursday was awarded damages of \$2,000 from Douglas County on trial jury verdict as the result of an accident in which he suffered injuries when his automobile left the county highway.

LaDuke alleged permanent injuries and claimed general damages in the sum of \$75,000, plus \$1,564 hospital expenses, \$330 doctor costs and \$450 loss of wages per month for a total wage loss of \$3,150. However, the county is liable for damages only to the amount of \$2,000.

The accident took place Aug. 21, 1962 on County Road 47, known as the Lookingglass Road at a bridge three miles north of Brookway. LaDuke alleged that a defect in the road was responsible for his accident and therefore the county was negligent and liable.

He asserted there was a sunken grade at the end of the bridge, which, when his right wheel and tire struck the sunken portion, caused the spindle pin of the right front wheel and axle assembly to give way, causing his vehicle to go out of control. It left the roadway and crashed into rocks and terrain along the roadway then went into the ditch.

The trial was conducted before Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders. The jury took the case at 2:43 p.m. and returned its verdict on a 11-1 vote in favor of the plaintiff at 4:07 p.m.

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Navy May Try To Raise U2

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — The Navy said a salvage ship might try to bring up today the wreckage of a U2 "spy" plane that crashed into the Gulf of Mexico while returning from a reconnaissance mission over Cuba.

An Air Force search continued for the missing pilot of the high-flying jet plane, Capt. Joe G. Hyde Jr., 33, of La Grange, Ga.

There were hopes that Hyde may have ejected from the plane, which the Strategic Air Command (SAC) said apparently experienced mechanical failure, in a life jacket and took refuge on one of the numerous coral reefs in the tropical waters.

Navy divers found the wreckage Thursday in about 100 feet of water 40 miles northwest of Key West, and strict security measures were put into effect in the area.

Informed sources said the sleek craft was on a surveillance flight over Cuba, a routine procedure since the U2's discovered Soviet missiles on the Communist island in October, 1962, forcing a showdown that brought removal of the weapons.

Havana Radio reported the crash Thursday but did not mention the plane's mission. The U2 went down in the Gulf about 150 miles north of the Cuban capital.

TO SEND GREETINGS WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy sends recorded greetings to the people of Japan today via the relay communications satellite in the first television program ever flashed across the Pacific.

Weather To Be Normal

Castro Commies Wreck Venezuela Headquarters

CORO, Venezuela (UPI) — Castro-Communist dynamiters wrecked the headquarters of the Falcon state Chamber of Commerce early today and bombed other establishments in this northwestern provincial capital.

There was no immediate report of casualties.

The chamber offices were destroyed by the blast, and three adjacent shops in the Miranda Hotel building were damaged. The other bombs were less powerful and caused only minor damage.

A policeman was killed in Valencia during an attempted bank robbery, but it was not certain immediately whether the thieves were Communists.

The Reds rely heavily on bank robbery to finance anti-government activities.

Two persons were wounded in Caracas when terrorists attacked a power station in the western slums. The city's Magallanes district was blacked out for several hours by the power-station attack, but service was restored early today.

A woman wounded in Tuesday's outbreak of terror in Caracas died Thursday night, increasing the toll of Communist activity in the national capital to 25 killed and more than 120 wounded in three days.

Troops and police combing the Caracas slums arrested 10 suspected terrorists. More than 350 persons have been arrested in the capital this week.

The Communists, having tried unsuccessfully for two years to overthrow President Romulo Betancourt, are now trying to prevent the holding of the Dec. 1 election which will choose his successor.

Rejection Of U.S. Protest Seen As Firm Russ Stand

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet rejection of a U.S. protest over the blockade of a Berlin-bound troop convoy was seen today as another indication Russia intends to stand firm in its dealings with the West, despite talk of better relations.

A Soviet foreign ministry note said Thursday the Nov. 6 protest was unwarranted and blamed the 41-hour delay of the U.S. Army convoy on "the attempt of American servicemen to break the existing rules for the transit of personnel through the Soviet checkpoint" on the East-West German border.

The Soviet action was made public by Tass, the official news agency, only a few hours after Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev called for a joint U.S.-Soviet effort to solve the world's problems through peaceful settlement of outstanding disputes.

The rejection, however, came as no surprise to Western observers here. They recalled Khrushchev's inflexible stand while the 44-man convoy was being held up. He said then that if it tried to force its way past the Soviet armored cars blocking it, it would have to do so "over our dead bodies."

The convoy was held up because its U.S. officers refused to order their men to dismount for a headcount at the Soviet checkpoint. The United States contends that such dismounting is unnecessary for convoys of such small size and denies that the Soviets have the right to establish checking procedures on the Allied access routes to Berlin.

The convoy was finally cleared Nov. 8 without its troops dismounting.

Fire Drills Slated At Former Church

The Roseburg City Fire Department will hold practice drills at the former Church of Christ building located at the west end of the Oak St. bridge Saturday and Sunday.

Saturday the church building will be filled with smoke by the use of smoke bombs to give the firemen drills in search and rescue operations. Also methods of ventilation will be studied during the smoke drills.

Sunday the fire department will burn the building. One of the major drills Sunday will be that of drafting water from the river, and the study of friction between the river and the building. Also firemen will get experience in the indirect application of fog streams as an interior attack method.

Fire behavior patterns will be studied, as well as the exposure and proper application of master streams on the exterior of the building.

A total of 45 firemen are expected to take part in the two-day program.

Mrs. Rose Zachary

Mrs. Rose (Stovall) Zachary, 74, former resident of Roseburg, died Tuesday at her home in Prescott, Ariz. Mrs. Zachary was the mother of James Stovall of Roseburg.

She was born in 1889 in Wilksburg, N.C. She moved to Prescott nine years ago from Alberta, Canada, where she and her late husband had homesteaded for 27 years. Prior to moving to Canada in 1927, Mrs. Zachary had lived with her late husband, Robert Walter Stovall, in Alexander's Addition in Roseburg, the area which was later converted to Umpqua Park and the Fairgrounds. She was a member of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Mrs. Zachary is survived by four sons including James, Fred Stovall of Edmonton, Alberta, Canada and Clarence Stovall, now serving with the U.S. Navy at Long Beach, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Leonard (Mary) Ross of Prescott and Mrs. Georgia Apfel of Bell, Calif.; two sisters, three brothers, 12 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

According to latest reports, funeral services were pending at Widmer Mortuary in Prescott.
