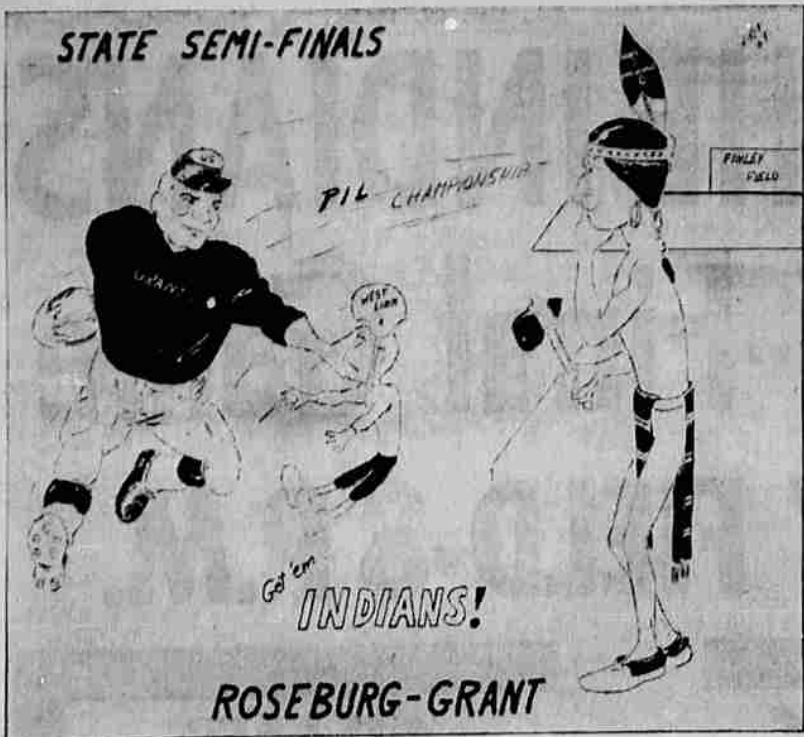




Roseburg Hosts Grant Generals In State Semifinal Tilt Tonight

Once more all the chips will be down as the Roseburg Indians host the Grant Generals in a state A-1 semifinal battle tonight at Finlay Field.

Kickoff time for the crucial game is scheduled for 8 p.m. In the other half of the semifinals the Beaverton Beavers will tangle with the North Salem Vikings in a game under the lights at Salem. The winners of the two contests will square off Nov. 29 on the turf of Portland's Multnomah Stadium to decide the 1963 state champion.

Facing a "do-or-die" situation last week against the No. 1 ranked Medford Black Tornado, the Indians came through with a stunning 7-6 triumph, while up north the Generals were rolling over West Linn, 18-0.

Grant boasts more state championships in football than any other school in the state—five. However, the last time the Portland school won the crown was in 1950. Prior to that Grant had gone all the way in 1943, '45, '46 and '49.

While the Tribe goes into the game as a slight favorite because of last week's victory over Medford, the Generals have one thing working for them — that being their undefeated record. A total of 18 of the last 20 A-1 football champs have posted undefeated seasons. The last team to win the crown was David Douglas in 1960, and before that Grants Pass accomplished the feat in 1948.

important, if not the deciding factor of the game. Roseburg and Grant sport two of the biggest lines in the state when it comes to defense. The Indians will field a defensive forward wall averaging 195 pounds, while the invaders boast a defensive line averaging 195 pounds-per-man — and this is without the services of Ron Goodpaster, a 6-7, 250-pound terror.

Through the 10 games played to date the Tribe has an advantage in scoring, having racked up 219 points as compared to 193 scored by Grant. Defensively the Indians have given up 82 points and the Generals have been touched for 85. Of Grant's 27 TDs, 22 have come on the ground, while the Indians have thrown for 11 of 33 six-pointers.

The Indians have racked up a total of 134 first downs, rushed for 2,080 yards and gained 830 yards passing in their 10 games.

Two of Beamer's favorite pass targets will be operating from the end positions. Gary Heeter has caught 29 passes for 402 yards and six TDs, tying for the top spot in Midwestern League play in this category and earning a first team all-star berth. Doug Matson, operating from the tight end, has held onto 12 passes. Ed Mendenhall, a promising sophomore pass receiver, is scheduled to spell Ron Leep as flanker back during the game.

Filling out the interior offensive line from left to right will be guard Tom Thomas, center Vince Peetz, guard Bob Palmer and tackle Don Boerste.

stars — Mike Leep. Mike Leep has well over 130 tackles for the season and has spearheaded Roseburg's stingy defensive unit to earn himself a spot on the all-conference team. Another all-conference linebacker will be in action in the form of Dick Gwaltney, who will move up to the line if the Indians decide to throw a five-man forward wall. The other two starting linebacker positions will be filled by Matson and Dick Yost.

Remick, the team's leading pass receiver, and Dave Butler, who has moved up from safety, will operate as the defensive halfbacks. The deep man on defense will be Ron Leep.

Alan Young, the sophomore with the educated toe, will handle the kicking off, the punting and the tries for extra points. Young has kicked 21 PATs this season and is averaging 35.7 yards-per-punt.

Coach Frank Buckiewicz's Grant charges have an enormous forward defensive wall anchored by 265-pound guard Gordon Bailey. Flanking Bailey will be tackles Tom Summers (215) and Carl Seeger (195) and ends Ross Johnson (185) and Jay Edwards (170).

Mike Smith and Art Nelson will operate from the linebacker positions in the interior area, while the Generals will play with four backs protecting the deeper pastures. Deep men will include Laddie Buck, Scott Gilman, Scott Davis and Greg Harold.

Smith is set for the starting quarterback role for the Generals, and will have a capable trio of backs surrounding him in the form of Pete Carson, Jeff Kempe and Carl McDade. McDade is the total offense leader for the invaders as he handles most of the throwing from his fullback position. For the season McDade has over 1,000 yards — of which some 800 has been through the air.

Pete Carson, running from the right halfback spot, is the top rusher for the Generals with over 130 carries for just under a seven yard-per-carry average.

The line for the Generals will include ends Craig Tinnett and Gilman; tackles Seeger and Summers; guards Keith Hedges and Chuck O'Rourke; and center Ed Sites.

Seeger, O'Rourke, Carson and McDade have all been named one of the state's top defensive on PIL all-star teams.

plished the feat in 1948. While the Generals were dethroning the always-powerful Jefferson team in the PIL, the Indians are back in the playoffs for their third consecutive year. Last year the Tribe lost out in the quarterfinals to Medford, 14-7.

The Generals have spent most of the week working on defense — concentrating on halting Roseburg's advance via the outside belly service which proved so deadly against Medford. Grant also has power on the ground, and a rugged duck shapes up in tonight's encounter.

Both Have Passing In addition to sporting strong ground attacks, both teams are capable of moving overland if the situation calls for passing. In the aerial department the Indians are reported to have a slight edge, due mainly to the pinpoint control of quarterback Jim Beamer.

Drain Warriors Dominate All-Star Team By Placing Four On First 11

Drain's Warriors may have ended in the runner-up spot in Emerald League grid play, but the Douglas County team dominated the all-conference team selected by the coaches.

Drain placed four players on the first string, added another to the second team and had three players earn honorable mention.

In league play the Warriors posted an 8-1 record to end in second place behind the Junction City Tigers. Junction City boasted one first string all-star, Elmiria and Central Linn each placed two on the first unit, and Central Linn and McKenzie divided the remaining two positions.

Rogers Rutledge, pass snaring end, earned a first team berth for the Warriors, along with tackle Doug Wilkinson, guard Cliff Johnston and halfback Mark Thomas. Thomas was the leading ground gainer and scorer in Emerald League competition, and was near the top among the state's A-2 point-makers.

Rutledge is a 165-pound senior, Wilkinson a 190-pound senior, Johnston a 168-pound senior and Thomas a 150-pound senior.

On the second team Drain placed fullback Frank Backus, while Art Cooper, Dennis Clearman and Dick Woolley were named to honorable mention spots on the all-league team.

Along with the Drain stars, the first team included: end Mike Kehoe, St. Francis; tackle Leonard Bucholz, Elmiria; guard Karl Luethe, Junction City; center Tom Hawkins, Central Linn; quarterback Scott Taylor, St. Francis; halfback Larry Hand, McKenzie; and fullback Dave Mooers, Elmiria. Taylor and Hand are the only juniors named to the first team.

The second team was composed of end Joe Ziegler, Oakridge, and Gary Billieck, McKenzie; tackles Ken Thompson, Junction City, and Jay Zemp, Central Linn; guards Ron Kuhl, McKenzie, and Harry Larson, Pleasant Hill; center Pat Hogan, Junction City; quarterback Larry Hills, Oakridge; halfbacks Mark Bowers, Harrisburg, and Dick Evans, Junction City; and fullback Backus.

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Extended Deer Hunting To Start This Weekend

Deer hunters holding unit permits for the Baker, Lookout Mountain, Catherine Creek, Fort Rock, McKenzie, Metolius, Paulina, and Wasco big game management units will get their last crack at deer this year when several extended hunts get under way this month. In all cases, an unused deer tag and unit permit are necessary to be eligible to hunt during the extended seasons.

In northeastern Oregon, three hunts are on tap for permit holders. These include the Elkhorn Area for Baker permit holders, with the season scheduled Nov. 30 through Dec. 8; the Durkee hunt for Lookout Mountain permit holders, with the season also scheduled Nov. 30 through Dec. 8; and the Medical Springs area for Catherine Creek permit holders, with this season scheduled next month, Dec. 14 through 22. Permit holders in these areas must hunt for antlerless deer only.

Four hunts are on tap in central Oregon. Fort Rock permit holders will get one last chance this weekend, Nov. 23 and 24, on the Fort Rock Winter

Great Aerial Battle Set Saturday When Oregon Ducks Host Beavers

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — The stage is set for one of the great aerial battles in college football history when Oregon and Oregon State meet for the 67th time in the Far West's oldest football rivalry.

Take the ingredients. Oregon State, in end Vern Burke, has perhaps the finest pass catcher in college football. In quarterback Gordon Queen it has a lad whose 16 touchdown passes this fall surpass all but one collegiate effort in the last 10 years.

Oregon has a junior quarterback named Bob Berry who already has cracked some all-time school marks. His coach, Len Casanova, calls him an "All-America." And the Webfoots also have in halfback Mel Renfro probably the best all-around performer in the school's history.

Burke caught 10 touchdown passes last year and has 9 this year. No other college end has caught that many—19—in two seasons. He also has 1,722 yards in two seasons, including a record 1,007 last year.

Queen's 16 touchdown passes are more than any collegian has thrown in a season in the past 10 years except Charley Johnson of New Mexico State who had 18 in 1959.

Berry has overcome Oregon marks of 13 touchdown aeriels in a season set by Norm Van Brocklin in 1947 and of 1,358 passing yards set by George Shaw in 1954. Berry has 14 TD passes and 1,426 yards through

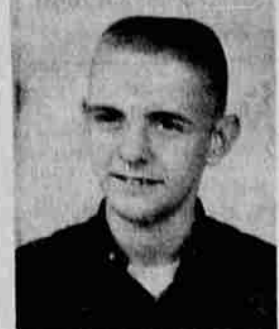
the air this year, although he missed one game with an injury.

Renfro was an All-America last season and recovered enough from a broken rib to play one of his finest games against Indiana last week. There isn't a phase of football in which the senior halfback doesn't excel.

Oregon is rated a five point favorite on the basis of a 6-3 season mark to 5-4 for Oregon State and the fact it is playing at home.

But the Webfoots haven't beaten the Beavers since 1958 when they won 20-0 at Corvallis. Since then Oregon State has won three and there was a 14-14 tie in 1960.

Over the years Oregon has won 30, Oregon State 27 and there have been nine ties.



CHRIS HANSEN, 14, recently combined with senior partner Gene Meeks to win the Junior-Senior Bowling Tournament at Indian Lanes.
