

Camas Valley To Face Dufur In District Finals

The Camas Valley Hornets, fresh from their rousing 52-0 victory over Eddyville in the District 1 eight-man grid finals, will attempt to advance one step closer to the state championship Saturday.

Saturday the Hornets, winners of the Southern Oregon Eight-Man League crown, will travel to Dufur for a 1 p.m. state semifinal contest with the host crew.

Blasted Eddyville
Camas Valley romped through the season with a 7-1 record before blasting Eddyville in the District 1 playoff game. The lone loss suffered by the Hornets was a thrilling 20-19 setback at the hands of the Canyonville Tigers in a non-league battle. Later in the season the Hornets rolled over the Tigers, 45-13, in a league encounter.

In other league encounters the Hornets trounced Days Creek, 67-0; toppled Prospect, 54-7; and upended Butte Falls, 51-0. In non-league action the local eight-man power rolled over Days Creek, 68-0, beat Sisters, 41-0, and downed Butte Falls, 61-0.

To reach the state semifinals the Hornets continued on unblemished with their convincing win over Eddyville.

Tops At Season
During the season the Hornets have racked up one of the top scoring records in the state, racking up a total of 458 points in eight games — an average of over 57 points-per-game. Against the Hornets just 40 points have been scored, and 33 of these went to the Canyonville Tigers in the two meetings between the teams.

Camas Valley has both speed and power in the backfield, and

for the season has a total of 3,758 yards total offense. The Hornets are also capable of taking to the air, having completed 53 of 100 pass attempts for 928 yards.

The opposition has been limited to 870 yards total offense, completing 71 of 182 pass attempts for 682 yards.

Terry Volkman heads the Camas Valley offensive thrust, having gained over 1,100 yards rushing during the season. The fleet back also leads in scoring with a total of 25 touchdowns and 10 extra points for 160 points.

Mike Priest is nearing the 1,000 mark in rushing and has scored 121 points. Together Volkman and Priest give the Hornets one of the most feared one-two punches in eight-man football.

Have Passing Too

To go along with Priest and Volkman's running, Jim Kiser has completed 38 of 70 pass attempts for 787 yards. The favorite receiver for Priest is Terry Buel, a converted quarterback playing at an end position.

Don Lawson handles the punting for the Hornets, averaging just over 34 yards-per-kick on 13 tries.

Coach Bill Welch, guiding the Hornets for his first season, will open with Buel (155) and Lawson (150) at the end spots. Jay Randal and Roger Thrush, tipping the scales at 160 and 179 respectively, will start at the guard gaps, while John Parret (164) will open at center.

In the backfield will be the talented trio of quarterback Kiser and halfbacks Volkman and Priest.

Top College Teams Go Bowl Bidding In Big Round Of Action Saturday

The nation's top college football teams go bowl bidding Saturday, with berths open in the four major post-season classics and tenancy available at a number of other prestige locations.

Showdown battles occur in the Big Ten and Big Eight conferences, where the Rose and Orange bowl invitations abound.

Fifth-ranked Michigan State and Illinois (No. 8) bring identical 6-1 records into their Big Ten championship brawl. The Spartans rate six-point choices to beat visiting Illinois at East Lansing, Mich., and earn the Rose Bowl representation. A tie also would provide a Rose-

clinch for Michigan State.

Sixth-ranked Oklahoma meets ninth-rated Nebraska at Lincoln, Neb., for the trip to the Miami, Fla., Orange classic. The Sooners are favored by 3½ points as both teams place unblemished conference records on the line. The loser probably will be invited to another bowl game.

Pittsburgh, a powerful independent and ranked fourth in the country, is a front-runner for the other Orange Bowl slot. The Panthers host Penn State, which can earn a Gator Bowl bid with a good performance. Pittsburgh is a 8½ point choice.

On the West Coast, Washington can sew up the host spot in the Rose Bowl by defeating

Washington State for the Big Six championship. The Huskies rate a 14-point pick.

Should Washington falter, the winner of the UCLA-Southern California game at Los Angeles could come up smelling roses. Southern Cal won this one, 14-3, last year and is a 13½ point choice to repeat.

Indian Banquet Tickets On Sale

The annual Indian Club football banquet to honor the Roseburg Indian gridders has been scheduled for Dec. 4 at the Gold Room of the Umpqua Hotel.

Harry Winter is in charge of ticket sales for the banquet. Tickets will be sold today at the Indian Club luncheon and at halftime of tonight's state semifinal game at Finlay Field between the Grant Generals and the Indians.

Tickets are also on sale at J. C. Sporting Goods, the Umpqua Hotel, The Man's Shop and Winter Realty.

Plans this year call for a special section set aside for the parents of players, as well as a special table for the players. Tentative arrangements are for seating for 300 people.

The banquet will begin at 6:30 p.m.

Counts, Jarvis, Peters Make OSU Top Choice For Coast Cage Honors

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Unless someone comes up with a defense to stop the great Mel Counts, Oregon State is expected to waltz away with the West Coast college basketball honors this year.

The only team given a chance to stop the Beavers is the University of San Francisco.

And that, if it materializes, will leave the Big Six schools out in the cold when it comes to representing this area in the NCAA playoffs.

"Oregon State has to be rated the team to beat for the western NCAA championship," says Little Rene Herrerias, coach at University of California. "And next in line should be Stanford and UCLA, the defending co-champions of the Big Six, should be listed as co-favorites for the AAWU league crown."

Oregon State lost its All-American football player, Terry Baker. But Counts was the big man in the Beaver attack, anyway, and he'll be on the job, better than ever. Two sophomore stars on last year's team, which would up fourth in the NCAA tourney, also are on the job: Jim Jarvis and Frank Peters. They'll handle the backcourt work.

USF has an All-American potential in Ollie Johnson to lead the way in defense of its West Coast Athletic Conference crown.

"We have the potential to retain the title," says Coach Pete Peletta. "But our sophomores will have to jell with the veterans."

Three fine sophomores are Joe Ellis, Russ Gumina and Erwin Mueller. Veterans returning back include Dave Lee, Ed Thomas and Jim Brovella, in addition to Johnson.

Stanford has Tome Dose, high-scoring center returning, along with Hollis Moore and Doug Clementson. There is a real fine sophomore in Bob Bedell, 6 feet 6 forward. Coach Howie Dallmar will have plenty of height.

UCLA gets just about its whole team back. Heading the cast is high-scoring Walt Hazard. Fred Slaughter and Gail Goodrich also will be on hand.

Southern California has something of a rebuilding job. The Trojans lost Gordon Martin, the league's leading scorer last year; and guard Gary Holman signed a professional baseball contract. A fine prospect is Al-len Young, a 6 feet 9 junior college transfer.

Bears, Giants Risk Leads In NFL Contests Sunday

The Chicago Bears and the New York Giants risk their precarious division leads Sunday against a pair of tough clubs that could force both National Football League races into ties.

The Bears, coming off a big win over the Green Bay Packers, travel to Pittsburgh to play the Steelers (6-3-1). The Giants (8-2) are at home against the St. Louis Cardinals (7-3) in a game that could throw the Eastern Division race into a three-team deadlock.

A victory by the Cards at Yankee Stadium, coupled with a win by the Cleveland Browns at home over the Dallas Cowboys, would produce a tie among New York, St. Louis and Cleveland.

Coach George Halas of the Bears expressed his respect for the Steelers last Sunday when he remarked immediately after the Green Bay victory that "I'd rather play any team in the league next week than Pittsburgh."

The Bears, with a 9-1 record, lead Green Bay by one game. The Packers face a patsy in their game at Milwaukee against the San Francisco Forty Niners.

After Sunday, the Bears play home games against the Minnesota Vikings, Forty Niners and Detroit Lions — all clubs with losing records. The Packers play their last three games on the road, at Detroit, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

In Sunday's three games involving non-contenders, the Los Angeles Rams (3-7) are at home against the Baltimore Colts (5-5); the Philadelphia Eagles (2-7-1) entertain the Washington Redskins (2-8); and the Vikings (3-7) are home against the Lions (4-6).

Odds-makers favor Chicago by 4 points over Pittsburgh; New York by 9 over St. Louis; Cleveland by 7½ over Dallas; Green Bay by 21 over San Francisco; Baltimore by 4 over

Los Angeles; Philadelphia by 4 over Washington, while Minnesota and Detroit are rated even.

As a side attraction to the two closely-contested division races, Jimmy Brown of Cleveland and Y. A. Tittle of the Giants face an opportunity to set significant NFL records Sunday. Brown, with 1,447 rushing yards, needs to gain only 81 more against the Cowboys to break his own single-season record of 1,527 set in 1958.

Elks Billiard Team To Meet Portland Elks

The Roseburg Elks billiard team, the Timber Toppers, will travel to Portland Saturday to meet the defending state champion Portland Elks team.

Saturday's tournament will be a seven-man team match, with the first six games scheduled for 30 points each and the seventh game between the club champs being for 50 points.

The Portland crew holds the state championship, and in a recent outing defeated the Timber Toppers, 4-3. The state champs will be favored to win Saturday's tournament because of playing on their home tables.

The featured match will be between the two club champs—Dick Stevenson of Roseburg and Vaughn Biggs of Portland. Biggs is the state individual champion.

Doss Burgess, manager of the Roseburg team, reports that the local billiard aces have been working hard in preparation for the outing. Playing for the Timber Toppers will be Stevenson, Bo Boucock, Len Brower, Craig Short, John Bingham, Bill Bailey and Joe Foote.

The first match will get underway at 1 p.m.
