

# Suit By Newspapers Against State Pharmacy Board Moved To Douglas

A law suit brought by several newspapers against the state Board of Pharmacy challenging legality in the board's ban on advertising certain drugs has been transferred from Lane County Circuit Court to Douglas County for further action.

Plaintiffs are the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association, Inc.; Statesman Publishing Co., Salem; News-Review Publishing Co., Roseburg; Oregonian Publishing Co., Portland; and Guard Publishing Co., Eugene, each an Oregon corporation.

Named as defendants are members of the Board of Pharmacy, listed as Paul M. Brunsell, Orville W. Corbett, A. G. McLain, Layke L. Seaton and Meredith L. Fisher, as members of the board, and the state Board of Pharmacy.

**Judgment Asked**  
The suit asks for a declaratory judgment that the order of the board prohibiting certain advertising be declared void because it allegedly violates the state and federal constitutions; that it exceeds the statutory authority granted by law to the board and is of no force and effect; and that it contains an unconstitutional delegation of power to the Board of Pharmacy.

The complaint states that at the regular meeting of the Oregon State Board of Pharmacy, Aug. 10, 1961, the following alleged order was unanimously adopted by the board:

"It shall be unlawful for any pharmacy, pharmacist or licensee of the Oregon State Board of Pharmacy who furnishes drugs to the ultimate consumer to advertise, directly or indirectly, by any media affecting the public, any drug, medicine or appliance bearing the legend: Caution: Federal law prohibits dispensing without prescription or whose sale is restricted to a prescription by Oregon law. Nothing in this regulation shall prohibit the furnishing of professional information to medical practitioners."

The complaint alleges that prior to this date, various

pharmacies and pharmacists in Oregon had advertised and were advertising in newspapers published by the plaintiffs advertisements of prescriptions in form and content similar to certain advertisements designated in an exhibit with the complaint. Plaintiffs allege they are informed and believe that such advertising would have continued had it not been for the alleged order or rule of the state board.

rule went into effect. They allege the order or rule is unconstitutional and violates the due process clauses of the Fifth and 14th Amendments to the constitution and violates the equal protection and privilege and immunities clauses of the Oregon Constitution, that it violates the commerce clause of Article 1, Section 7 of the U.S. Constitution, that it exceeds the statutory authority granted the state board by the legislature and is therefore void and unconstitutional and that the Oregon law under which the order was enacted is an unconstitutional delegation of power to the board.

Plaintiffs allege they are interested in determining their rights, status and legal relationship with reference to the order, that the rule deprives the general public and drug customers of the right to information regarding prices of drugs, that the order deprives licensees of their right to truthfully advertise drug prices.

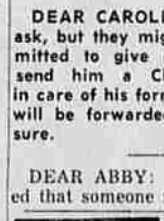
**CAROLINE**

Charley and Peggy Solomon of Philadelphia have managed to acquire over nine thousand master points between them. This is the most master points held by any married couple.

Of more importance, they are great ornaments to the game of bridge and just about as delightful a couple as it is possible to be.
