UVL All-Stars Named; Banquet On Tap Friday

Douglas, Riddle and Glendale dominated Umpqua Valley League grid action during the 1963 season, and as a result the three schools topped off the lion's share of the spots on the all-conference teams selected by the coaches.

Riddle, in battling to a second place league tie with Glendale, led the schools in winning first team positions on the all-star 11s—getting three berths on each of the offensive and defensive units. The league champions, the Douglas Trojans, placed three players on the offensive team and won two spots on the defensive team, while Glendale had two on offense and three players on defense. Sutherland and Glendale completed the first two units, with Myrtle Creek's lone representative being listed among the honorable mention players.

The UVL coaches selected 30 players from the six schools. The 1963 UVL all-stars will be honored at a banquet Friday at 7 p.m. at the Bamboo House. The banquet is sponsored by the Roseburg News-Review.

Five players were selected to fill first team spots on both the offensive and defensive team, and five players were unanimous choices of the six voting coaches.

Riddle dominated the first unit offensive backfield placing quarterback Mike Markham, halfback Gary Paetz and fullback Larry Ruckel. Markham was feared for his passing, while Paetz and Ruckel provided speed and power. Markham is a 175-pound junior, Paetz a 170-pound senior and Ruckel a 195-pound senior.

On the defensive team Paetz and Ruckel were selected at halfback and linebacker respectively. Riddle was also represented on defense by end Merle Blankenship, a 180-pound senior. Phil Daniels, Douglas, repeated as the first team offensive center. In addition the talented Trojan star tied in the voting for a defensive end position. Daniels is a 170-pound senior. The Trojans also placed tackle Person on the offensive team. Rust is a 205-pound senior and Person is a 160-pound junior. Defensively the Trojans had Daniels, linebacker Bob Lang-

don and halfback Pat Patterson on the first team. Bob Langdon is a 155-pound sophomore and Patterson is a 135-pound sophomore—the only two sophomores on the first teams.

Representing Glendale on the first offensive team is tackle Mike Heath and guard Gary Kennaday. Heath is a 175-pound junior and Kennaday is a 195-pound senior. Defensively the Wildcats had end Gary Mayfield, 190-pound junior, tackle Jack Rust, 205-pound junior, and linebacker Stan Young, a 185-pound senior, on the first team.

Sutherland's Mike Ouellette and Allen Grauf were selected to fill positions on both the offensive and defensive teams. Ouellette, first string quarterback last year, made it at an offensive end spot, while Grauf was selected as a halfback. Ouellette is a defensive tackle and Grauf is a guard. Ouellette weighs 170 pounds and Grauf tips the scales at 160. Both are seniors.

Allen Anderson and Marvin Van Norman were the two Glendale players chosen. Anderson, a 210-pound junior, was selected as a defensive guard, while Van Norman, a 165-pound junior, was chosen as an offensive guard.

Staubach Wants Victory Over Army To Cap Heisman Honors For Career

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (UPI)—Roger Staubach, Navy's runaway winner of the Heisman award as the top college football player of 1963, asked for only one thing more today—a victory over Army.

"The award is something I treasure all my life," said the 21-year-old Middle Tennessee quarterback from Cincinnati, Ohio. "Naturally, I'm extremely excited and pleased. This is really great, but we've still got the Army game."

Staubach, only the fourth junior to gain the award during the 20 years it has been given by the Downtown Athletic Club, made his comments even as the traditional Army-Navy game officially was being postponed from Nov. 30 to Dec. 7 because of the late President Kennedy's death.

Staubach's coach, Wayne Hardin, said, "I never personally had any doubt that he would win it. I think that he deserved the award and am very proud of him. I know that he realizes that without the fine play of his teammates he would not have been able to win the award."

The 6-foot, 2-inch, 190-pound Ohioan, who drew a near landslide total of 1,860 points in the balloting by sports writers, broadcasters and telecasters throughout the nation compared with only 504 points for runner-

up Billy Lothridge of Georgia Tech, readily conceded he could not have won the award alone.

"I owe it to everyone," he said. "My grade school coach... My coaches in high school and junior college... Coach Hardin and, of course, all my teammates."

Staubach, who will be presented with the award at the Downtown AC in New York on Dec. 4, was mentioned on 694 of the 784 votes cast. He received 517 votes for first place, 132 for second, and 45 for third.

He was voted first in each of the five selections of the nation. Points were computed on a basis of three for a first place vote, two for second and one for third.

Lothridge, Georgia Tech's brilliant quarterback, received 65 first place votes while halfback Sherman Lewis of Michigan State, who wound up third with 369 points, polled 53 first place votes.

Army-Navy Dedicated To President Kennedy

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Army and Navy will get a chance to play their annual football classic at the specific request of the family of the late President Kennedy.

The game will be dedicated to Kennedy's memory, the Pentagon announced Tuesday.

After a day of conferences, Pentagon officials said it was decided to reschedule the Philadelphia game for Dec. 7, a one-week postponement.

Army Coach Paul Dietzel said the postponement was "the least we could do" in memory of the late President.

Terming last Friday's assassination a great tragedy, Diet-

zel said "we are very honored to dedicate the game" to Kennedy's memory.

Coach Wayne Hardin of Navy said he and his team backed the decision "100 per cent."

"We're glad that it's going to be played, though, and not canceled," he added.

The Pentagon announcement said:

"The secretary of the Army and the secretary of the Navy decided today that the Army-Navy football game will be postponed one week in deference to the memory of President Kennedy. Consideration was given to cancellation of the game. However, President Kennedy's family requested that the game be played. The game will be dedicated to his memory."

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Nebraska Coach Named Top Coach For Colleges

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI)—He took over the football job at a school which hadn't had more than a couple of winners in two decades and racked up a 9-2 record his first year.

During his second season he steered the club to a gaudy 9-1 mark.

The ninth victory, a 29-20 today, was more than just another win. It gave his team its first Big Eight title in 23 years; it nailed down a trip to the Orange Bowl; and it won for Nebraska Coach Bob Devaney the title of United Press International Coach of the Week.

Devaney said the triumph over the always tough Sooners was the "greatest" of his career. Then he immediately started handing out praise. By the time he was finished he had mentioned every assistant

coach and most of the players. "Give my assistants a lot of credit," he said. "They did a heck of a job of getting the team ready."

Asked for his analysis of the game, Devaney said it could best be described as a "hard-fighter." There were numerous fumbles and some of them, he said, stemmed from jarring tackles.

On the Monday preceding the game, Devaney assured a quarterback luncheon meeting of several hundred rabid fans that "we're going after Oklahoma" and added that his players were already beginning to "prime" themselves for a top effort.

After the game, the happy coach was able to say, "We took the game right to them from the opening kickoff—and we seldom gave them good field position."

Pirates Get Gene Freese From Reds To Aid Infield

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—The Pittsburgh Pirates, in a move to strengthen their infield, today purchased third baseman Gene Freese from the Cincinnati Reds.

Purchase of the 29-year-old Freese was announced by General Manager Joe L. Brown, who last year traded away three-fourths of the infield that brought the Pirates their first

world championship in 35 years in 1960. At the time, he said the trades were made to bulwark his pitching in order to make the club a contender.

Brown refused to disclose the price paid for Freese but said "it was the highest price ever paid for a player in the eight years" have been with the Pirates.

Cleveland Browns Are Sitting Pretty If They Tie With New York Giants

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Cleveland Browns will be sitting pretty if they finish in a two-way tie for first place in the Eastern Division at the conclusion of the regular National Football League season Dec. 15.

If the Browns deadlock the New York Giants, the St. Louis Cardinals or the Pittsburgh Steelers, they will serve as the host team for a playoff game in each instance Dec. 22.

Because four teams—the Browns, Giants, Cardinals and Steelers—are still in the running for the NFL's Eastern title, 10 possible playoffs were assessed and decided upon Tuesday during coin-tossing ceremonies. The results were announced by Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

The Giants were almost as lucky as the Browns in the "heads or tails" lottery. If the New Yorkers tie either the Steelers or the Cardinals, they will host the playoff game.

In the event of a three-way tie among the Giants, Cleveland and Pittsburgh, the Giants draw a bye and then meet the Browns-Steelers winner at Yankee Stadium.

Only one toss was needed for a possible playoff in the Western Division, where the Chicago Bears and Green Bay Packers are the only teams still battling for the title. The Packers won the toss and will have the home field advantage in a playoff with the Bears, if one is necessary.

If the Cardinals, the Giants and the Browns—currently tied for the Eastern lead—should finish that way, the Browns will host the Giants on Dec. 22, with the winner entertaining the Cardinals the following Sunday. This would postpone the championship game until Sunday, Jan. 5.

If St. Louis ties Cleveland and Pittsburgh, the Steelers entertain the Browns, with the winner hosting the Cardinals. If Pittsburgh, New York and St. Louis finish in a tie, the Giants host the Cardinals and the Steelers entertain the winner.

The Steelers will serve as the host team if they wind up in a two-way tie with St. Louis.
