# Court Decision Pending On Money Claim Dispute

Ownership of \$1,241, being held here by the district attorney for its rightful owner, may soon be determined.

This is the money removed from a special compartment under the rear seat of a car operated by Maynard Fred Edwards, 35, of Los Angeles in May of 1962, and which the owners of the Drain Variety and Dry Goods Store claim was taken from their place of business.

Mena Kim, 22, also of Los Angeles, arrested with Edwards in possession of the money, was tried and acquitted of larceny from the store.

Edwards, also charged with the theft, was never brought to trial, as he was turned over to California authorities to serve a previous sentence imposed in that state. Once California had him in prison, they have refused to permit him to be brought here to stand trial on the Oregon charge.

**Money Is Problem**  
Meanwhile the \$1,241 is still in question. District Attorney Avery

Thompson filed an interpleader suit in Circuit Court naming as defendants, Edwards, Miss Kim and George Thad Thompson and his wife, Wilma, doing business as the Drain Variety and Dry Goods Store.

The Thompsons filed an answer to the complaint, claiming ownership of the money and alleging that it was taken from their store May 12, 1962. The answer demands immediate return of the money.

The other two defendants, Edwards and Miss Kim, although served with summons in accordance with state statutes, have not filed answers within more than the statutory time allowed to answer or otherwise appear, so they have been adjudged in default by Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders.

Since only the Thompsons have placed a claim for the money, the logical step will be for the court to declare them the owners unless some other legal action enters before final judgment is made.

**Taken From Desk**  
The money originally was reported missing from the Drain store office, where it had been prepared for bank deposit by Thompson and left in his desk while he went out for lunch.

Edwards and Miss Kim were seen by clerks in the store, then were seen to run to their parked car. When the money was discovered missing, police were notified, and the pair was stopped in Edward's car near Grants Pass a couple of hours later. A similar amount of money was found in their car.

On trial, Miss Kim steadfastly denied her guilt, saying she had not taken the money and was not aware any money had been taken. Her case admittedly was weaker than the case against Edwards, according to the district attorney's office, and the jury found her innocent. Edward's case still pending and cannot be terminated until he is released from the California prison, without a dismissal of the charge.

# VA Medic To Attend Research Meeting

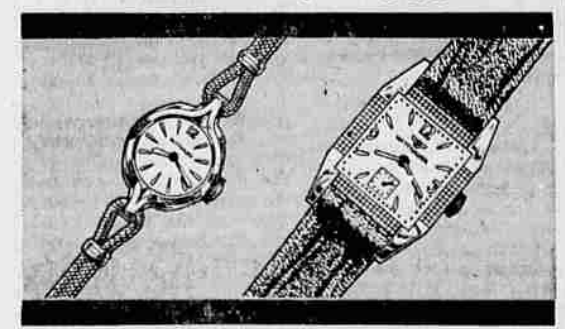

# Yugoslavia Prisoners Get Pardon

**BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (UPI)**—Husbands kissed wives, children hugged fathers Monday when almost 2,500 political offenders pardoned on Yugoslavia's 20th anniversary as a Communist state emerged from the country's prisons.

President Tito signed the amnesty decree Thursday. Today he heard himself praised by visiting Romanian President Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej before a joint commemorative session of parliament.

The Romanian leader lauded Tito's courage and skill as commander of the anti-Nazi Yugoslav guerrillas who founded Communist Yugoslavia at a wartime mountain stronghold on Nov. 28, 1943.

The nation's best-known political prisoner, former Vice President Milovan Djilas, was not among the 2,456 offenders released, according to his wife. He received a nine-year sentence in 1962 for writing books offensive to the regime.

According to Mrs. Djilas, her husband told a visitor Sunday that it must be taken for granted he would have to serve the full term.

Informed sources said the mass amnesty left about 1,000 "unredeemed" political prisoners behind bars.

Djilas, once one of President Tito's closest aides, was first sent to prison in 1955 for publishing criticism of Tito's regime.

While serving this term he wrote and smuggled to an American publisher "The New Class," a critical survey of modern communism.

His original 18-month sentence was extended to 1961 when he was conditionally released—the condition being that he stop writing criticism of communism and publishing it abroad.

But he was re-arrested on April 7, 1962, after the publication of his latest book, "Conversations with Stalin," based on three talks with the Soviet premier during Djilas' tenure as a top Yugoslav official.

The Yugoslav government later announced he was arrested because he published articles abroad "damaging to the interests of Yugoslavia."
