

Chicago Cardinals Take On Browns In Top NFL Battle

Charley Johnson of the St. Louis Cardinals is a quarterback who likes to chew his cabbage twice.

Johnson, having the best year of a brief career, beat Cleveland, 20-14, two weeks ago and now must duplicate the feat to keep the Cards at the top of the National Football League's Eastern Division.

The 24-year-old chemical engineer survived the earlier Browns' clash because of his ability to keep passes out of defenders' hands. Only two tosses were intercepted by Cleveland. Johnson was better against the New York Giants last Sunday when he had no interceptions as the Cards won, 24-17, to throw the conference into a three-way tie for the lead.

St. Louis, Cleveland and New York have 8-3 records. The crowded first-place slot should ease, especially since the Gi-

Patriots Get Top Selection In AFL Draft

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Boston Patriots acquired the Denver Broncos first choice in the 1963 American Football League draft in a last minute deal today and selected Jack Concannon, 190 pound Boston college quarterback.

The draft was delayed one half hour past its scheduled starting time while Coaches Mike Holovak of Boston and Jack Faulkner of Denver, huddled to discuss a deal.

Milt Woodward, assistant commissioner of the AFL, then announced that the Patriots had acquired Denver's first choice in exchange for Boston's first and third round picks and a player to be determined later.

The Kansas City Chiefs exercising second choice, then selected quarterback Pete Beathard of Southern California, the New York Jets drafted Matt Snell, Ohio State back, and Denver claimed Bob Brown, 269-pound Nebraska guard.

The AFL conducted its draft at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel two days in advance of the rival National Football League's selection meeting at Chicago on Monday.

Teams drafted in inverse order of their present win-loss percentages. Boston and Buffalo, which have identical 5-5-1 records, alternated the fourth choice on each round. The Patriots won a coin toss, giving them the right to select ahead of Buffalo on the odd numbered rounds.

The Bills, after a delay of 10 minutes, next selected tackle Carl Eller of Minnesota.

Scott Appleton, Texas tackle, next was selected by the Houston Oilers, halfback Tony Lorick of Arizona State by the Oakland Raiders, and Ted Davis, Georgia Tech linebacker was claimed by the San Diego Chargers to complete the first round.

The first round consumed 24 minutes and subsequent rounds were expected to take longer.

Concannon, a 9.9 sprinter, ranks fourth in total offense among major college players with 1,513 yards. In addition to being a good passer he also is Boston College's leading rusher.

Oakland Oakers Rated Among Top In Bico-B

Oakland's Oakers, rated as one of the favorites in the Bico-B League hoop race, sport a well-balanced team headed by a strong nucleus of veterans.

However, Coach William Speltz feels that lack of depth in the ranks could hurt the Oakers. Speltz reports that the Oakers have good balance in height and speed, but that his team could suffer if any of the returning veterans should be lost.

Oakland boasts returning veterans for the guard positions in the form of Kerney Manley and Keith Crenshaw. Kerney Manley is a 5-11 senior with two years of varsity experience. Crenshaw, a 5-7 senior, aided the Oakers in boasting a 12-9 record last year.

Height will be provided by letterman Dennis Parker and Jon Lamoreaux, and non-letterman Randy Manley, Parker, a veteran at the post position, stands 6-3 and was among the league's leading scorers last season. Lamoreaux is a 6-1 junior letterman at a forward position, while Randy Manley is a 6-1 junior who saw action on the Oakland Jayvee team last year.

Greg Vasche, another talented prospect up from the Jayvee squad, is expected to see action this year at a guard position. Vasche is a 5-11 junior.

The Oakers will open the 1963-64 campaign Dec. 6 at Elkton in the North Bico-B League jamboree at 7 p.m. The first regular game is scheduled for Saturday when the Glendale Pirates invade Oakland for a non-league battle. Jayvee action will begin at 6:30 p.m., with the varsity teams squaring off at 8.

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Oregon's Hoop Strength Depends On Sophomores

EUGENE (UPI) — Oregon's basketball team should be stronger this season despite the presence of eight sophomores on the 14-man squad, coach Steve Belko believes.

"Or, to put it another way: "It should be a good season for us if you don't figure it on wins and losses."

That's because the Ducks face the problem of stopping such outstanding big men as Oregon State's Mel Counts, Portland's Steve Anstett and Stanford's Tom Dose without an established center of their own.

The battle for the starting spot now is between sophs Gene Brockmeyer (6-9) and John Franz (6-6), Belko says. Lewis Patterson (6-9), another soph, suffered a broken hand early in the practice season and "is a little further behind."

The Oregon coach also has experimented with using veteran

forwards Jim Johnson (6-5) and Steve Jones (6-5) at the center spot if all else fails.

"If we do that, Johnson would be our offensive center and we'd use Jones there on defense," according to Belko.

If the center problem can be solved, the Ducks will be in good shape. Johnson and Jones, both two-year lettermen, tied for the team lead in scoring last year with 376 points each.

Behind those two at forward are Larry Cooley (6-4), who played 117 minutes last season, and Bill Jennings, a (6-5) sophomore.

Three letterman guards also return, but the key man at this position will be 6-3 Jim Barnett, rated one of the best sophomores in years at Oregon.

"It's going to take him a little while to adjust," Belko warns, but "we think he will provide some extra punch for us."

The Riverside, Calif., star led the frosh in scoring with a 22.3 average last season and cracked the 30-point mark twice.

The other guard probably will be Elliott Gleason, a (6-2) junior letterman who scored well at the end of last season. Also available are Bob Yates and Pat Lay, both junior lettermen.

Another sophomore who might surprise everyone is Dave Kfoury, a guard from Portland's Cleveland High School. Overlooked in the freshman crop of a year ago, he averaged 10.5 points a game and Belko rates him as one of the best outside shooters he's had in recent years.

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Vikings Score In Final Minute To Tie Generals

PORTLAND (UPI) — Disappointed North Salem and Grant reigned as Oregon high school class A-1 football co-champions today after battling to a 7-7 tie here Friday night.

"It just leaves me with a hollow feeling," North Salem Coach Spike Hillstrom said after the hard-fought game. "The kids feel the same way."

"We can still say we haven't been beaten but the kids are disappointed and I am too," Grant Coach Frank Buckiewicz said. "They'll get over it quick, though, when they realize that they didn't get beaten either."

The Portland Interscholastic League champion Generals rolled up a 11-0-1 record and the Valley League champion Vikings posted a 7-1-2 mark for the season.

Vikings Score Late
North Salem, which lost to Medford in the finals of the playoffs last year, tied the score with 29 seconds left in the game on a one-yard touchdown run by halfback Rod Allison and an extra point kick by quarterback Gib Gilmore.

The Vikings marched 63 yards in 21 plays for their touchdown. Grant scored its points in the second quarter on a one-yard touchdown run by halfback Pete Carson and an extra point kick by Tom Summers.

The Generals moved 77 yards in 15 plays for their score.

"It sure was a game of halves," Hillstrom said. "We told the kids at the half they would have to cinch up their belts and they came back and did a great job."

North Controlled Ball
"The difference was ball control by North Salem in the second half," Buckiewicz said. "North Salem got in the position where it could run the ball on fourth down against us."

Allison's touchdown came on a fourth down play after the Vikings made first downs the three previous times on fourth down plays.

**Rams Favored
Over '49ers
In Big Game**

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners, kicked around by just about everybody in the National Football League except the powerful Chicago Bears, try to salvage a bit of pride Sunday when they tangle with their down-state rivals, the Los Angeles Rams.

The game, which used to be a sellout a month in advance, is expected to attract only about 45,000 fans into Kezar Stadium this time.

San Francisco, which has only two wins all year (over Chicago and Dallas) is a three-point underdog to the Rams, who haven't had their best year, either.

But the Forty Niners figure they have a chance to lick anybody—if things go right.

"Our second-half effort against Green Bay last week was one of our best all season, comparing favorably with our Bear game and the second half we had against Dallas," says young coach Jack Christensen. "Our problem has been to put two good halves together."

The Forty Niners bowed to Green Bay, 28-10, after trailing 3-28 at halftime. San Francisco is 2-9 for the year.

Over the years, the Rams hold a 15-11 edge in the series with one game ending in a tie. Los Angeles got off to just about as bad a start as San Francisco this year. And it wasn't until Roman Gabriel took over as the No. 1 signal-caller that the Los Angeles club clicked. It has won four of its last six games with Gabriel at the post.

In their previous league meeting this year, the Rams rolled to a 28-21 decision.

The Rams bring a defensive line that averages 275 pounds to the man. So it is obvious that San Francisco will have to pass if it hopes to move the ball. Lamar McHan will do the quarterbacking for San Francisco.

Kickoff time is 1:30 p.m. (PST) and the forecast is for fair weather.
