

### Nurses Overcome By Monoxide, Reported Okay

Merridy Restoule and Peggy Pfeuffer, both nurses at Mercy Hospital and residents of 1446 SE Micelli, were hospitalized Sunday evening when they were overcome by carbon monoxide poisoning.

The Roseburg City Fire Department was called to investigate the apartment. Cause of the poisoning has not yet been determined. The call was received by the firemen at 2:55 p.m.

The girls were taken to a local hospital by Walt's Ambulance. At first Miss Restoule was thought to be all right, but she passed out while Miss Pfeuffer was being taken to the hospital. Reports from the hospital indicate that both girls are in good condition today.

At 12:37 p.m. Sunday the City Fire Department was called to the home of E. W. Henderson, 182 SE Miller, where a short in the electrical wiring was causing smoke. No damage was reported.

### Unknown Vandals Hit Impeach Warren Sign

The billboard on the North Umpqua Highway about eight miles east of Roseburg calling for the impeachment of Chief Justice Earl Warren of the Supreme Court has been toppled and burned.

Roy Cottrell, of Roseburg, member of the Impeach Earl Warren Committee, said today the committee intends to erect a sign again and take any precautions necessary to protect it.

He reported that unknown persons pushed the sign over shortly after Halloween. It was straightened, but the sign was toppled again last week. Then later, somebody lit a fire which only partially burned it. The sign had also been chopped with an axe.

Cottrell pointed out that the sign is on private property. The movement to impeach the chief justice came originally from the John Birch Society. Birchers insisted Warren had voted in the Supreme Court in ways which favored the growth of Communism in the U. S.

Cottrell, a member of the John Birch Society chapter in Roseburg, says, however, this is a committee distinct from the John Birch Society.
