Texas Names Legal Panel To Probe Kennedy Slaying

DALLAS (UPI) — Texas attorneys who would help interrogate witnesses. Leon Jaworski, a Houston attorney who was trial judge advocate in the Nuremberg trials following World War II, and Dist. Atty. Henry Wade of Dallas were named to the panel which Carr will head.

Carr said the state's investigation would open shortly after the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) files a report with President Johnson, presumably late this month.

The state investigation, Carr said, would openly interrogate witnesses in the assassination, the slaying of policeman J. D. Tippit and the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald. The findings will be turned over to a federal commission appointed by President Johnson.

Carr said the state investigation would contrast both the FBI's undercover work and the federal commission's consideration because witnesses would be subpoenaed and questioned under oath either in Dallas or at Austin, Tex., the state capital.

The three-pronged approaches to the crimes was called an "unprecedented example of co-operation between local, state and federal government to determine the facts and make them public."

FBI information will be given the Texas court of inquiry, which will forward its findings to the federal commission headed by Earl Warren, chief justice of the United States Supreme Court.

Carr said he did not know if Jack Ruby would be questioned by the state court of inquiry. He said he "didn't want to interfere" with the murder case that charges Ruby with Oswald's shooting.

The Texas attorney general said he planned to select another attorney to aid in the state's inquiry and planned to set the time and place of the probe soon.

Carr said the presidential commission would not call witnesses, but was depending on other sources for its information.

"It is my understanding the commission will take evidence assembled by the FBI and other agencies and evaluate this evidence and reach conclusions," Carr said.

Baptist Women To Hear Speaker

In addition to his duties in the school, McKinnon served for some time as auxiliary chaplain for the Army personnel of the Military Assistance Advisory Group located in Taichung.

Before beginning his missionary work with the Conservative Baptist foreign Mission Society of Wheaton, Ill., McKinnon was graduated from Northern Baptist Theological Seminary in Chicago. He also studied at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., and at Western Baptist Theological Seminary, Portland, Ore. Following a year of furlough in the United States, McKinnon and his family will return to missionary work in Taiwan.

Report Is Feature

Following the dinner the business meeting was conducted by the chairman, Joe Brumbach Jr. A report was given by Mrs. Don Wright on the 4-H advisory committee meeting which she had attended recently in Corvallis representing Douglas and Lane counties.

It was the feeling of the advisory committee that most of the state budget cut would be made in the home economics division of the extension program. Mrs. Wright reports. As Douglas County Farm Bureau members have always firmly backed the extension services, she urged members to contact members of the legislature and the Board of Higher Education. She stated that faculty members of the extension services felt that perhaps an 8 per cent cut in funds might work to an advantage as they would then have to re-evaluate their program and a better one might result.

However, the advisory committee felt that a suggested 20 per cent cut was discriminatory and would probably result in a substantial loss of federal funds as well as seriously impairing the extension services to the counties of the state, according to Mrs. Wright.

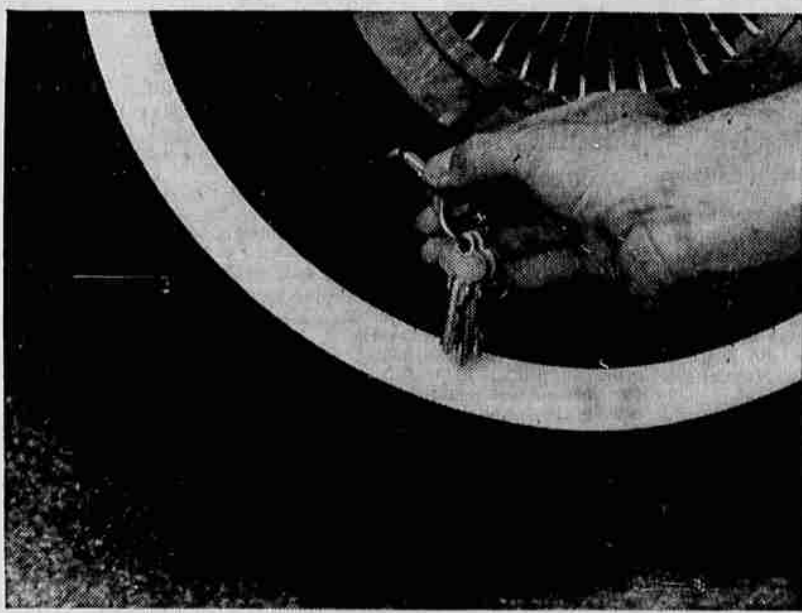
