

County Cagers Ready For Opening Battles

Basketball will break on the sports scene in a big way this weekend for the Douglas County A-2 and B teams.

Friday night the 1963-64 season will get underway for the Bico-B entrants with a pair of jamborees, while a full round of non-league cutings will face the Umpqua Valley League crews.

Elkton's Elks and the Canyonville Bible Academy Pilots will serve as the host teams for the Bico-B League jamborees. Competing at Elkton will be the Powers Cruisers, the Oakland Oakers, the Yoncalla Eagles and the host Elks. At CBA the Canyonville Tigers, the Camas Valley Hornets, the Days Creek Wolves and the Pilots will be in action. Both jamborees will begin at 7 p.m.

A-2 action Friday will find the Sutherlin Bulldogs hosting the Phoenix Pirates, the Riddle Irish heading to Medford to play the St. Mary's Crusaders, the Glendale Pirates entertaining the Rogue River Chieftains, the Douglas Trojans traveling to Bandon to clash with the Tigers, the Myrtle Creek Vikings will be at Mapleton against the Sailors and the Glide Wildcats will be at home against the Myrtle Point Bobcats.

Saturday the UVL teams will feature another round of six non-league games. Myrtle Creek will entertain Myrtle Point, Douglas will open at home against the Eagle Point Eagles, Glendale will travel to Phoenix, Glendale will be at Oakland against the Oakers, Riddle will host the Yoncalla Eagles and Central Linn's Cobras will invade Sutherlin.

Drain's Warriors, the lone entrant from Douglas County in the Emerald League, will host the Elkton Elks in a non-counter Saturday.

In addition to the Glendale-Oakland, Elkton-Drain and Yoncalla-Riddle games, other non-league outings featuring Bico-B League teams will find Camas Valley hosting the Prospect Cougars. Days Creek will be at home to the Butte Falls Loggers and Powers will travel to Langlois to meet the Pacific Pirates Saturday.

All varsity action is scheduled to get under way at 8 p.m., with tip-off time on the jammed games being 6:15.

County wrestling teams will also begin their season this week — with two dual meets on tap tonight. The Sutherlin Bulldogs will host the Oakland Oakers grapplers tonight at 6:30 p.m., and the Drain Warriors

will invade Pleasant Hill to match the Hillbillies strength at 7:30.

Saturday the Glide Wildcats will send a contingent of beginners to the Marshfield Beginners Tournament at Coos Bay. This tourney is set to start at 7 p.m.

Twin Forwards Pace Indiana To Cage Win

Indiana's basketball rivals can thank their lucky stars the Van Arsdele twins aren't triplets.

Just the two of 'em are threats to outscore whole teams. Take Wednesday night when the identical 6-foot, 5-inch forwards combined to score 76 points and lead Indiana to a 108-102 victory over Notre Dame. Dick connected for 15 field goals and 12 free throws for 42 points and Tom tossed in 15 field goals and four free throws for 34.

That tremendous two-man performance earned Indiana its second straight victory on a night during which Texas Western upset fifth-ranked Wichita, 75-74, and second-ranked Cincinnati squeezed past Miami of Ohio, 60-56.

Jim Barnes scored 32 points to lead Texas Western to the big upset of the night at Wichita, Kan. Dave Stallworth scored 37 points for Wichita, which suffered its first loss after two wins.

Cincinnati had a close call at home when Miami's Charlie Coles developed a "hot hand" and threw in five straight long-range field goals to reduce the Bearcats' lead from 12 to four points with 1:34 left. The defense-toughened Bearcats refused to panic, however, and held their lead. Ron Bonham had 26 points and 12 rebounds for Cincinnati.

New York University, ranked No. 3 along with Duke, opened its season with an 82-55 triumph over host Cornell. Happy Hairston had 24 points and Barry Kramer 23 for NYU.

Michigan State defeated Western Michigan, 101-100, and Purdue downed Detroit, 86-80, but the Big Ten's spottiest record against outside competition was sullied when St. Louis beat Illinois, 81-78.

In other games St. Joseph's of Philadelphia beat Gettysburg, 73-58; Pennsylvania crushed Rutgers, 91-62; Bradley rolled over Idaho State 101-70; Xavier of Ohio topped Tennessee, 69-57; Villanova beat Princeton, 72-59; and Eastern Kentucky State College defeated the University of Louisville, 78-65.

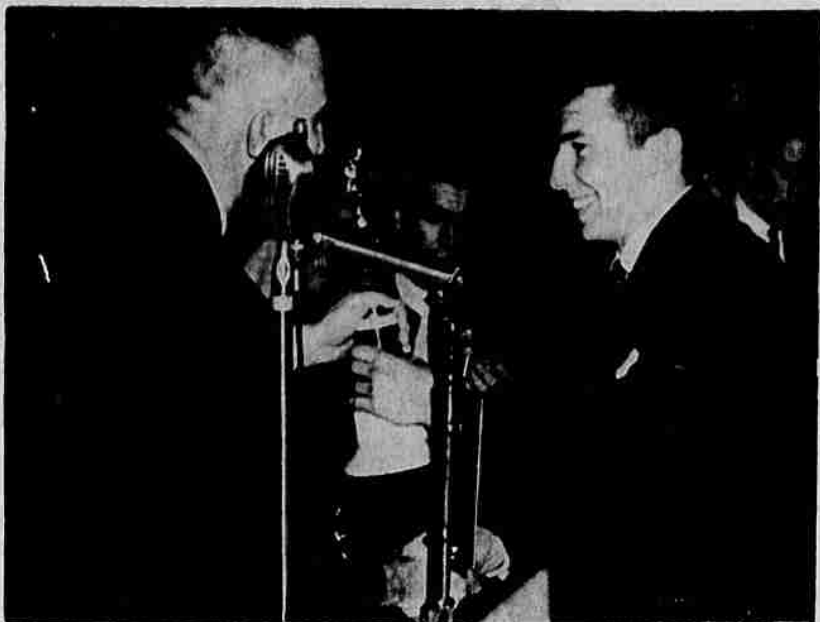
This main event was made at the suggestion of Kozak after he was disqualified for hitting the referee in last week's match with Gorky.

Sutherlin To Open Hoop Season With Pair Of Home Encounters

Sutherlin's Bulldogs will open the 1963-64 basketball season with a pair of home games this weekend against the Phoenix Pirates and the Central Linn Cobras.

The Bulldogs have four lettermen returning from last year's team that ended the season with a 7-15 record. Coach Ros Putman feels that his team will be stronger this year despite the loss of two veterans who were being counted on to return.

Putman figures the Douglas Trojans as the team to beat in Umpqua Valley League play, with top competition coming from the Glide Wildcats and the Myrtle Creek Vikings. While the Bulldogs are rated as a darkhorse contender, Putman feels that with a few breaks they could become a title threat.

The Bulldogs have 10 non-league outings in which to get ready for their first UVL encounter which will be played Jan. 10 against the favored Trojans of Douglas.

Returning to lead the charge for the Bulldogs will be two-year veteran Mike Ouellette. Ouellette, a six-foot senior, is capable of operating from either the center or a forward position, and was one of the team's leading point-makers last year.

Larry Johnson, a 6-4 senior, gives the Bulldogs height under the boards, while Gary Hall, a 6-1 senior forward, is also returning with one year of varsity experience.

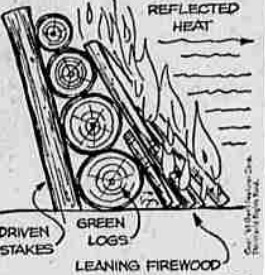
HAUSER RESIGNS

Tribe Gridders Feted At Wednesday Banquet

Mike Leep, bruising defensive linebacker and offensive fullback, was named as the outstanding Roseburg Indian gridder for the 1963 season at Wednesday's annual Indian Club banquet.

In addition to the outstanding player award, Mike Leep was also presented with a trophy as the outstanding tackler. The 210-pound senior set a new school record as he averaged 15 tackles per game and broke the individual game record with 19 tackles. The outstanding player was decided by a vote of the team members, while the tackling award was decided by the coaching staff.

Another linebacker, Dick Gwaltney, was presented the Mike Deller Inspirational trophy. Gwaltney was the smallest player among the regulars, but was a demon on defense. He is also a senior.

The award for the most improved player was awarded Jerry Remick, a senior defensive halfback and reserve quarterback, and senior tackle Don Boerste received the best blocker award.

John Robinson, assistant backfield coach at the University of Oregon, was the featured speaker, but shared the spotlight with two Oregon stars, end Ray Palm and halfback Larry Hill.

Both Hill and Palm were coached by Roseburg's Roy Thompson during their prep careers — Hill at Astoria and Palm at Roseburg where he earned prep All-America honors. Both boys congratulated the Indians on their outstanding showing during the season which saw the local crew post a 9-2 record by reaching the state semifinals.

Hill, a senior at Oregon, has been selected to compete in the annual East-West Shrine game, while Robinson reported that much is expected of Palm, a sophomore, in years to come by the Ducks.

Following his opening remarks concerning Hill and Palm, the Oregon coach told of the highlights of the season for the Ducks and related instances from his own career — both as a player and a coach.

Robinson then stressed two points which he feels to be the major values gained from football. First he stated, "Football forces a boy to come face to face with himself and at the same time forget about himself." In meeting one's self face to face, Robinson went on to explain, every boy is on the field by himself. He said, "The first thing a boy finds out is that he is pretty damned scared."

However, by overcoming this basic fear and becoming part

of the group each player forgets about himself.

The second major value discussed by Robinson was the fact that football forces the players to set a goal and strive to the best of his ability to meet this goal. He added that sometimes each player may fail, but he finds that there is no room for compromise. Robinson went on to say the same thing holds true for each person in life.

In setting a goal and working towards it, the boys learn complete devotion to a cause. In summarizing his philosophy of football, Robinson stated, "The only things the bruises do for the boys are all good."

Thompson followed by expressing his thanks to everyone who makes the football program in Roseburg possible. He then introduced the Indian coaching staff and the team members, and following the presentation of the individual awards Thompson presented each player with his picture which had been on display in a downtown business throughout the season.

Gifts from the Indian Club were presented to the members of the coaching staff by Gordon Stewart, vice president of the Indian Club.

Bill Gray, Indian Club president, served as master of ceremonies. The Indian football banquet is an annual event sponsored by the Indian Club.

AAU Ponders National Sports Festival

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — Delegates to the second-day session of the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) parley today discussed a proposal to establish a national sports festival.

Also on the agenda were proposals to improve the caliber of amateur basketball and require head gear in all boxing matches after Jan. 1 or continue its optional use.

The swimming committee was expected to give formal approval to establishment of a Swimming Hall of Fame at Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Mayor Cy Young of Fort Lauderdale said a bond issue to raise the needed funds was ready to be put before the city's voters as soon as formal AAU approval is given.

The foreign relations committee Wednesday approved 22 in-

ternational meets in 12 forms of competition pending reciprocal approval by other countries.

Highlights of the plans for U.S. teams include a track and field meet with USSR men's and women's teams July 25-26, 1964, at Los Angeles, a trip to the Soviet Union to compete with men's and women's basketball teams next spring, a boxing tour of Africa next spring and a world's synchronized swimming tour next fall.

Committee approval of these plans, announced at the opening business session of the 76th annual AAU convention, is tantamount to organizational action, officials said.

The conflict between the AAU and the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) will get worse before it gets better, AAU president Louis Fisher, executive director Donald F. Hull and secretary-emeritus Dan Ferris agreed. The two groups have struck a truce in their power struggle until after the 1964 Olympic Games.

Fisher said he wired NCAA president Robert Ray asking him or a representative to attend the current five-day meet to discuss mutual problems. He said Ray declined the invitation.

Fisher said he had hoped to work out differences with the NCAA before the end of his term. He will be succeeded at the convention probably by Jay-Ehret Mahoney.
