Mrs. John Durgin is general chairman assisted by Mrs. J. L. Atkins and Mrs. Robert Casebeer.

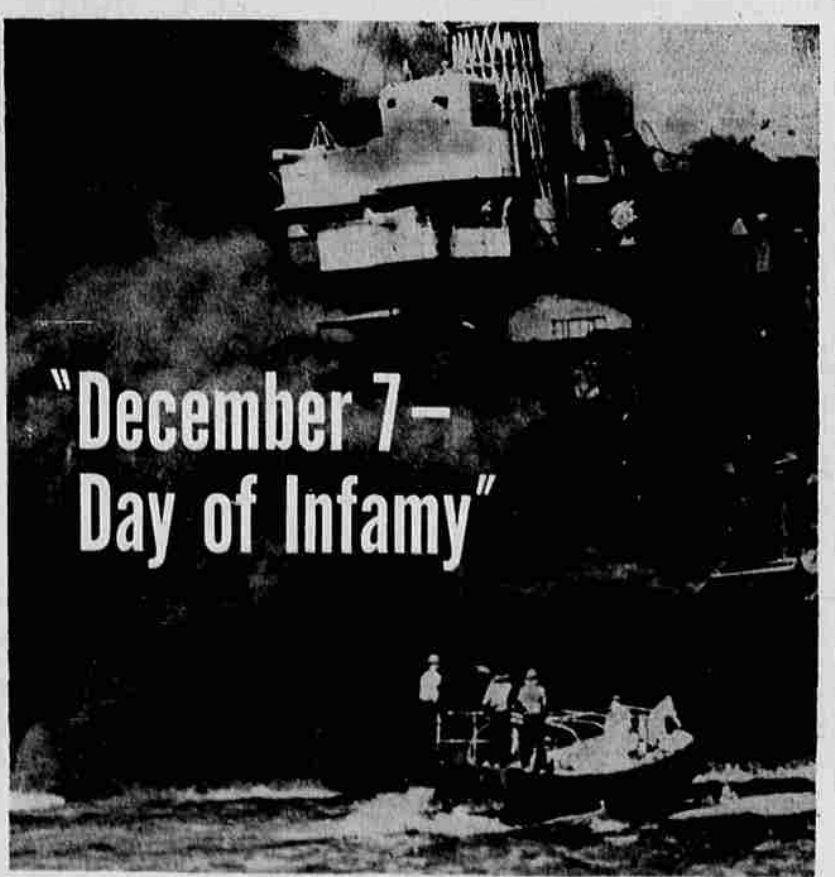

If West took the second trump he would either have to put South right in with a diamond or club or give him a chance to ruff the fourth spade with dummy's eight of trumps. Either way South would have been starting a new rubber.
