## Hope Yule Tour Still Uncertain

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Bob Hope "reacted well" to his first treatment at Children's Hospital for a blood clot in his left eye, according to a hospital spokesman.

The 60-year-old comic was given a local anesthetic Friday and then received a delicate photo-coagulant treatment which lasted less than 10 minutes.

Following the treatment, Hope was returned to his home to rest. Further treatment will depend on the results of Friday's session, which involved flashing a powerful light beam into the eye to dissolve the clot and seal a torn area in the retina.

Hope, who has been afflicted with the eye trouble since 1958, entered the hospital Thursday. It still was not known whether he would be able to leave Dec. 22 as scheduled to tour U.S. military bases in the Mediterranean area.

## Robert M. Cutler

## Training Meets Set Next Week

"Developing Responsibility in Children" will be discussed at home economics unit meetings in January, according to Mary Fletcher, county extension agent.

Training sessions for leaders who will be directing discussions will be held in Scottsburg Tuesday and in Roseburg Wednesday and Thursday. Women in extension units all over Douglas County will be participating.

Rules cannot be laid down telling parents how to develop responsibility in an individual child but the women in these groups will consider what responsibility really is and how it is developed, said Miss Fletcher.

Mrs. Roberta Frasier, family life specialist at Oregon State University, says the program developed because she is frequently queried about developing responsibility in children today. She said groups often ask if she thinks children today are less responsible than they used to be and would they not be more responsible if they had more to do at home.

Mrs. Frasier said she believed that training for responsibility begins with attitudes developed in infancy, and that sometimes children are discouraged in developing responsibility because they are not allowed to do things for themselves.

She observed that children have different responsibilities to school, teachers, friends and parents and sometimes must decide which of these responsibilities should be met first.

## Suggestion Nets Award Of \$300

A suggestion for an improved routing method in the manufacture of rustic forest signs has won a \$300 cash award from the Forest Service for Peter C. Day.

The award was made this week by Vondis E. Miller, Umpqua National Forest supervisor.

Miller said the award to Day is the largest cash presentation for employe accomplishment made on the Umpqua in recent years.

Day is foreman of the Forest Service regional sign shop located in the Umpqua's warehouse building on Diamond Lake Boulevard.

The new system for routing signs developed by Day consists of a special template and routing device. A hand router is guided by the template as it cuts the letters in the signboard. It replaces more cumbersome and costly methods previously used, said Miller.

The official said the award was made through the "employe suggestion program" which encourages employes to submit ideas for improving operational efficiency.

The Forest Service sign shop here manufactures numerous kinds of rustic signs for National Forests in Oregon and Washington.

Roberts of Klamath Falls; one sister, Mrs. Bess Craig of Portland; 18 grandchildren; 24 great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 11 a.m. at Long & Shukle Memorial Chapel, with Dr. Eugene Gerlitz of the First Baptist Church officiating. Private interment will follow at Civil Bend Cemetery, Winston.

## Kennedy Death Inquiry Pends

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Texas' court of inquiry into the assassination of President Kennedy was postponed Friday by Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr who feared it might hamper a federal investigation.

Carr praised a blue-ribbon commission President Johnson named to investigate the assassination. He said he will work with the federal investigators. "Investigative authority of the federal government is being used to the fullest," Carr said. "It is our considered judgment that the Texas court of inquiry, if held at this time or in the immediate future, might bring about an interruption in the continuity of the nationwide investigation."

Carr announced plans for the state probe a few minutes after President Kennedy's funeral in Washington. Full federal cooperation was promised.

President Johnson later selected a commission to look into the matter and Chief Justice Earl Warren was named to head the panel.

## Oswald's Widow Asks Citizenship

FORT WORTH (UPI) — Marina Oswald, widow of the suspected assassin of President Kennedy, was quoted Friday as saying she wants to become an American citizen.

Mrs. Oswald, 23-year-old Russian-born mother of two, burst into tears when she learned at least \$7,700 had been sent to her by sympathetic Americans. Mrs. Shirley B. Williamson, part-time private investigator and housewife, headed a drive to raise money for Lee Harvey Oswald's widow and children.

## Three Fliers Killed In Light Plane Crash

ESTACADA, Ore. (UPI) — Three men were killed when their twin-engine plane crashed in an open field about 10 miles north of here Friday night.

The aircraft, a four-place Cessna 310, was on a training flight from the Skyways, Inc., flying school at Troutdale.

The victims were William A. Smith, 31, Portland, and instructor for Skyways; Harry Sank, 35, Anchorage, Alaska, a private pilot who was being checked out for a commercial license, and Charles N. Gates, 38, Troutdale, manager of Skyways' flight division who was along as a passenger.

# Protection Against Killer Difficult

NEW YORK (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower said today "there could be no absolute protection against" an assassin who is "determined" to kill a president.

Eisenhower, noting that he received an average of 250 "crackpot" letters weekly while in office, said he "thought it realistic to assume that my safety was largely out of my hands."

"If a determined individual was willing to die to accomplish his purpose, there could be no absolute protection against him," Eisenhower said.

in an article in the Saturday Evening Post. Eisenhower also urged that succession to the presidency be changed to keep the administration "heading in the same political direction" in the event of an emergency.

Eisenhower said the present line from the president, vice president, to the speaker of the House, president pro tempore of the Senate and then to the cabinet is illogical.

The former chief executive said he preferred a previous system that called for the secretary of state and other cabinet members to follow the vice

president in line of succession. This was the law prior to 1947. "I believe that the earlier order of succession is a more logical one which would keep the presidency heading in the same political direction until the electorate has an opportunity to make its further wishes known," Eisenhower said.

When Lyndon B. Johnson became president House Speaker John McCormack, 72, and Sen. Carl Hayden, D-Ariz., 85, became next in line respectively to succeed to the presidency.

However, Eisenhower pointed out in the Post article that the speaker of the House is elected by a district and the president pro tempore of the Senate by a

state. "...Neither necessarily reflects the will of the whole electorate," he added.

The present line of succession, Eisenhower said, makes it "possible for a man to succeed to the presidency who is out of sympathy with the aims and policies of the administration..."
