

# Oswald's Body To Remain Where It Is, Says Mother

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UPI)—The body of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, buried in a pine coffin in a hastily dug grave, will "remain exactly where it is, and that's final."

Oswald's mother, Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, told a news conference Friday she is convinced her son is innocent. She said she must, however, "face the fact he is the accused assassin" of President John F. Kennedy.

Police had urged her to have Oswald's body exhumed and moved from Rose Hill Cemetery, on Fort Worth's eastern edge, to protect it from ghosts and vandals.

The body, she said, will stay where it is even "if it takes all the policemen in the state of Texas to protect it."

# Mother Claims Son Mistreated

FORT WORTH (UPI)—Angry Mrs. Marguerite Oswald charged Friday that her hooky playing son was cast into "a class with criminals" because he skipped school in New York.

The mother of suspected presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald said she became angry with New York authorities because of their treatment of her son. Lee was about 13 years old at the time.

"They took my boy away," she said. "He was put in the juvenile home in Brooklyn."

Mrs. Oswald, 56, said Lee skipped school three times, went before children's court and was sent to the home.

"Mother, take me out of here," she quoted the youth as saying. "I am in here with boys who have stabbed people with knives."

She said John Carro, a probation officer for the Bronx Family Court asked Lee "if you go home with your mother, will you promise to go to school?"

Mrs. Oswald said the boy promised to attend school then Carro asked Lee to report to report to him once a week.

"At that point," she said, "I got mad."

"I told Mr. Carro my son was not a criminal and that to make him report once a week put him in a class with criminals."

# Recital Series Draws To End

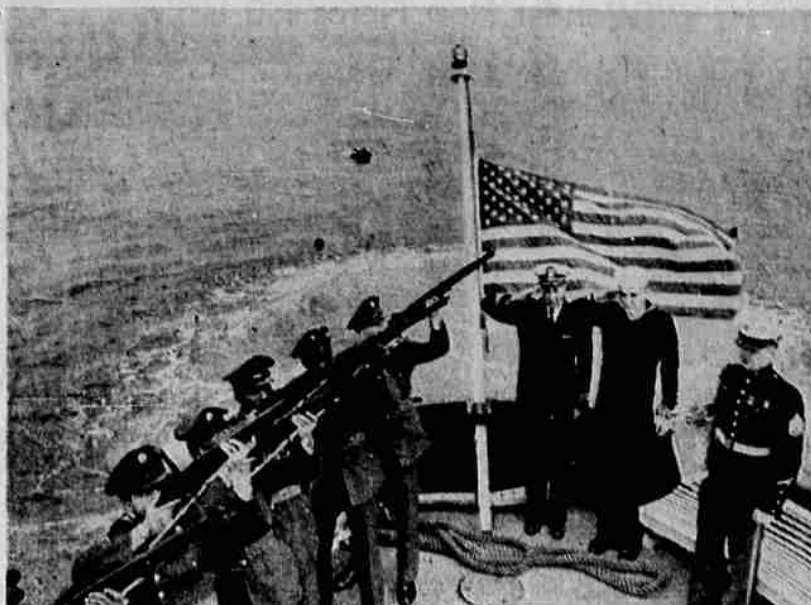

# Observance Of Attack At Pearl Harbor Quiet

HONOLULU (UPI)—Prayers... taps... a moment of silence... and the laying of a wreath above the rusting hulk of a once-proud battleship.

This was to be the quiet observance of Pearl Harbor Day today, 22 years after Japan's attack on the naval base here that triggered U.S. entry into World War II.

Some 70 representatives of 26 veterans' organizations planned the quiet observance at 3:15 p.m., EST, at the white concrete memorial above the battleship USS Arizona.

The Arizona was sunk in the first wave of the Japanese attack that long ago Sunday. Her rusted hull still entombs the bodies of 1,102 American dead. Her fuel tanks still bleed a thin stream of oil across the smooth waters of Pearl Harbor.

The Navy no longer observes Pearl Harbor Day as such because it is Defense Department property to conduct a single memorial for all war dead on May 30 each year.

There was, of course, a fresh note of mourning here today. For flags throughout the harbor have been at half-staff the past two weeks in memory of the late President John F. Kennedy, a Navy hero of the Pacific War that began here Dec. 7, 1941.

# COURT CASES HANDLED

## Burglary Count Results In Sentence Of A Year

Don Cameron Walker, 20, Portland, has been sentenced to serve one year in the Oregon Correctional Institution for burglary by Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders.

Walker earlier pleaded guilty to being one of four participants in the burglary of Frank's Chevron Coffee Shop near Myrtle Creek Oct. 14, and pre-sentence investigation was ordered at that time. Cases of the other accused persons have been disposed of.

Probation Granted

Imposition of sentence was suspended and William David Ledbetter, 18, Winston, has been placed on probation for five years by order of Judge Sanders.

Ledbetter pleaded guilty earlier to uttering and publishing a forged check Oct. 28. Conditions of probation are that he make restitution on checks outstanding in the sum of \$215.

CHELMSFORD, Eng. (UPI)—Hospital authorities said today they fired night nurse Mary Cusack, 20, because she accepted a marriage proposal from patient Alan King, 30. King was transferred to another hospital.

"A hospital isn't a marriage bureau," an official said. "If one of the nursing staff forms a liaison with a patient, they must both leave."
