

Glide's Wildcats Edge By Bobcats 60-59 In Thriller

A pair of free throws by the intermission, closing the guard Mike Radcliffe with 31 seconds remaining in the game, netted the Glide Wildcats a thrilling 60-59 triumph in their hoop opener Friday against the Myrtle Point Bobcats.

The invaders had fought from behind to take the lead in the closing seconds of the game after the Wildcats had held the advantage since the opening minutes. Radcliffe potted his two gift tosses with 31 seconds showing on the clock. The Wildcats regained possession of the ball as the Bobcats tried to get back in the lead and stalled out the remaining seconds.

Jack Rust paced the Wildcats to the victory, leading in the scoring and rebounding. Rust pumped in 23 points on eight field goals and seven of 11 tries at the foul line. John DeGroot scored 11 points and Stan Young bucketed 10.

Rick Pullen led the Bobcats with 16 points on six field goals and a perfect four for four record at the foul stripe. Jim Hatfield added 12 points.

Three Teams Show Power In Openers

Picking a favorite from among the four southern Bico-B League hoop teams became even more confusing after Friday's jamboree staged at the Canyonville Bible Academy gym.

The host CBA Pilots, the Camas Valley Hornets and the Canyonville Tigers each posted 2-1 records as the teams played a round-robin schedule of three games each.

The Pilots started off with a 10-5 win over Days Creek, bursting into an early 4-0 lead. Ken McAdams paced the winners with six points and Robert Van Norman scored all five of Days Creek's counters.

Camas Valley opened in the jamboree with a 17-15 victory over Canyonville. Trailing 9-2, the Hornets came on strong with Terry Buel scoring his five points in the last 33 seconds to pace the winners. Roncy Long had seven points for Canyonville.

The Tigers of Canyonville broke into the winners circle at the expense of the Days Creek Wolves, 12-8. Roger Hammond led the way with five points, while Frank Halstead scored five for the losers.

CBA then nipped Camas Valley, 11-7, breaking into a 4-0 lead and holding off the surging Hornets. Eddie scored seven points for the Pilots.

Camas Valley nipped Days Creek, 15-8, as Jim Kiser pumped in five points. Terry Richardson's seven points was tops for Days Creek.

In the final 10-minute game, Canyonville dominated CBA, 19-12, starting off at a fast pace to build up a 9-2 margin. Mike Heath and Bob Neis each scored six points for the Tigers, while John had eight for CBA.

John was high point for the jamboree with 15 points, followed by Canyonville's Heath with 13. Heath led the rebounders with 14, while McAdams had 13 for CBA and Richardson had 10 for Days Creek. The Canyonville quint had the top shooting percentage, hitting .375 from the field.

The first regular games will find Days Creek hosting Butte Falls and Camas Valley entertaining Prospect tonight. Canyonville and CBA will play their first games Dec. 13.

Riddle Irish Lose, 72-60

Despite a 29-point performance by guard Mike Markham, the Riddle Irish fell, 72-60, to the host St. Mary's Crusaders in a hoop opener Friday.

Markham and Gary Paetz provided the Irish with most of the scoring punch—totaling 45 points between them. Markham sank 13 field goals and was three for seven at the foul line to rack up his 29 points. Paetz swished six field goals and made four of five at the foul line for 16 points.

St. Mary's countered with a trio of high-powered scorers in Ron Batzer, Mike Scott and Randy Corliss. Batzer accounted for 20 points, Scott with 19 and Corliss with 18.

However, the final 12 point bulge did not tell the entire story. With two minutes left to play in the game the Irish were trailing by only three. The loss of Keith Hanson, a top rebounder, via the foul route forced coach Art Weston to play the final two minutes with inexperienced players in the game. The Crusaders took advantage of this and pulled away to ice the victory.

Riddle hit the hoop at a .342 clip from the field, making 24 of 70 shots. At the foul line the Irish were 12 for 27 and were called for 21 fouls. St. Mary's sank 27 of 71 from the field for a .380 percentage, cashing in on 14 of 25 chances at the free throw stripe and committing 19 fouls. Rebounds favored the winners, 48-25.

In the preliminary game Jim Irvin scored 14 points to lead the Riddle Jayvee team to a 44-41 triumph.

Tonight the Irish will open at home against the Yoncalla Eagles.

Roseburg's Indians entertained the Crater Comets with a nip-and-tuck mat duel Friday to start the prep wrestling season for both teams.

The invading Comets posted an all-important victory in the heavyweight match to record a 27-24 triumph over the Tribe matmen.

Crater emerged victorious in seven of the 13 varsity matches—winning two by pins, four by decision and one by default. The Indians' points came on a pin, four decisions and a forfeit.

Several Indians turned in outstanding performances—including Terry Byrd's rapid pin in the 191-pound bracket. Byrd took the mat and disposed of his opponent, Robin Roeder, in a mere 57 seconds.

Don Langenberg, Lonnie Good, Ron Begley and Tom Thomas all did outstanding jobs during the competition. Langenberg won a 5-3 decision in the 106-pound class. Good outpointed Ken Olsen, 4-0, in the 136-pound division. Begley handled Detlef Kirkendall, 4-2, in the 148-pound match and Thomas logged a 10-5 victory in the 157-pound bracket.

Slow First Frame Costs Tribe Defeat By Pelicans

Starting slow, the Roseburg Indians never managed to overhaul the rampaging Klamath Falls Pelicans in Friday's opening game for the two teams.

After breaking the ice on Bruce O'Neill's three-point play, the Tribe cagers found the going slow for the rest of the first quarter, and as a result the Pelicans posted a 57-49 victory.

The two teams will square off again tonight at Klamath Falls. Tipoff time is 8 p.m.

Roseburg broke into an early 3-0 lead, but the Pelicans came on strong to move out in front 4-3 midway through the quarter. From this point on the home team was never headed.

By the end of the first quarter the Indians had only managed to add one point, while the Pelicans had burst out in front, 14-4.

Throughout the hard-fought second half the two teams traded baskets, and by the midway point of the game the White Birds enjoyed a 27-19 bulge. During the second period the closest the Indians could get was four points—18-18, 19-15 and 21-17.

The host team came back after the half-time intermission and proceeded to increase the advantage—leading at one point by a 13 point edge, 43-30, by the end of the period.

Trailing by 10 points late in the game, the Indians began to pick up steam with guards Butch Watson and Bob McKee starting to hit. The gap was closed to five points, 52-47, before the Pelicans began to operate again to protect their lead.

Klamath Falls concentrated on rebounding and foul shooting to claim the victory. Both teams dumped in 19 field goals but the Pelicans capitalized on 17 Roseburg fouls to connect on 19 of 27 chances at the gift line. This provided the winners with their final margin.

Also, the Pelicans controlled the boards, picking off 38 rebounds, compared to 26 for Roseburg. This allowed the winners to get off 63 attempts at the basket, while the Tribe was limited to 48 shots. However, the Indians had by far the better shooting percentage by hitting 19 from the field for a .385. At the foul line Roseburg made 11 of 18 attempts.

Transfer center Gene Kingsbury (6-5) grabbed 17 rebounds for the Pelicans, while O'Neill and John Johnson each had six for Roseburg.

In the scoring department the Indians were led by O'Neill, the lanky veteran potted seven of 17 shots from the floor, including a five for seven record in the second half. At the foul line O'Neill converted three chances into points for his final tally of 17 points.

Gary Hill and Watson followed O'Neill with nine points each. Klamath Falls boasted three players in the double figures. Terry Ash led the charge with six field goals and a perfect 7-7 record at the foul marker for a total of 19 points. Kingsbury, a demon under the basket, ended with 15 and guard Lanny Guyer scored 14 points.

In the opening minutes of the game both teams had trouble with their ball handling. The Pelicans adjusted to the newness of the season without any major difficulties, but Roseburg ended up giving the ball away 22 times during the game on various violations of rules and wild passes.

Coach Curt Jarvis reports that tonight's starting lineup will find O'Neill and Hill at forward, Johnson at center and Butch Watson and McKee as guards.
