Sutherland Bulldog Quint Drops 61-56 Cage Tilt

Sutherland's Bulldogs applied their press in the fourth quarter, but fell five points short of overtaking the invading Phoenix Pirates in Friday's basketball opener for both schools.

The Pirates, paced by John Barker's 20 point performance, built up an early lead, then coasted to the 61-56 victory.

Barker's 20 points was the high output for the game and came on nine field goals and two for five from the field. Help came from Dan Beeson with 12 points and Ron Williams with 11.

Mike Ouellette was the big gun for the Bulldogs with 13 points tallied on five two-pointers and three for five from the foul line. Otis Chapman followed Ouellette with nine points, while Larry Johnson and Charles Koch each had eight.

After a hard-fought first quarter, the Pirates outscored the home team, 21-9, in the second period to enjoy a 30-20 half-time advantage.

The winners went into the final stanza with a 13 point lead which was soon increased to 20. At this point the Bulldogs put on their full court press and began to whittle down the deficit. However, when the final buzzer sounded the Bulldogs were still trailing.

Sutherland hit at a .287 clip from the field making 21 of 72 attempts, while at the foul line the losers made 14 of 28 tries. Phoenix held a 48-42 edge in rebounding.

In the Jayvee game the invaders posted a 42-31 triumph. Tonight Sutherland will host the

Central Linn Cobras in a non-league battle.

Beavers Top BCU, 87-47

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Seven-foot Mel Counts scored 19 points and snared 19 rebounds to lead the unbeaten Oregon State Beavers to an 87-47 basketball victory over British Columbia Friday night.

Counts, a senior, sat out part of the first half and was on the bench the final 11 minutes of the second half.

Oregon State, ranked ninth in the nation in the United Press International poll this week, recorded its third victory. It was the Thunderbirds' first loss in five starts.

Jim Jarvis and Frank Peters added 16 and 14 points, respectively, for the Beavers.

Dave Way led British Columbia in scoring with 13 points.

The Beavers held the Thunderbirds scoreless in the final 9:42 of the opening half to go from a 21-18 lead to a 39-18 advantage at halftime.

Oregon State made 39 of 81 field goal attempts for 48 per cent and British Columbia hit 16 of 56 shots from the floor for 29 per cent. The Beavers held a 62-37 margin in rebounding.

Oregon State meets Washington tonight at Gill Coliseum.

Several Baseball Trades Hanging Fire

 LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Departing major league officials put a reverse twist on the old gag of don't-call-me-I'll-call-you as they left for home today with plans to stay in touch and possibly complete several deals still hanging fire.

Six player transactions in all were made during the week-long meetings that began in San Diego and finished here but a number of baseball men said they still hope to make a deal before the inter-league trading deadline on Dec. 15.

"We'd certainly like to get another outfielder," admitted manager Bill Rigney of the Los Angeles Angels, who acquired first baseman Joe Adcock from Cleveland Friday to conclude an earlier Leon Wagner-for-Barry Latman swap.

Jackie Brandt of Baltimore is the outfielder Rigney would like to have and the Angels aren't the only club still in the trading market.

The world champion Dodgers, who sold first baseman Bill Skowron to Washington, still are seeking a pitcher; manager Yogi Berra of the Yankees confesses he'd like to have catcher Bill Rodgers of the Angels; Milwaukee and Cincinnati both are after a relief pitcher and the Philadelphia Phillies are shopping around for a third baseman.

Other deals which were made at the meetings sent pitcher Jim Bunning and catcher Gus Triandos from Detroit to Philadelphia in exchange for outfielder Don Demeter and pitcher Jack Hamilton; Baltimore traded outfielder Al Smith and \$25,000 in cash to Cleveland for outfielder Willie Kirkland; the New York Mets purchased outfielder-catcher Bob Taylor on a conditional basis from the Milwaukee Braves and San Francisco traded outfielder Felipe Alou, catcher Ed Bailey, pitcher Billy Hoeltz and a player to be named to Milwaukee for pitchers Bob Hendley and Bob Shaw and catcher Del Crandall.

Washington also released catcher Hobie Landrith to make room for Skowron on its roster.
