

Eisenhower Proposes 'Old Order' For Succession To Nation's Highest Post

NEW YORK (UPI)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower proposed today that the presidential succession revert to its pre-1947 order — eliminating the speaker of the House and the president pro tempore of the Senate from third and fourth places.

In an article in the Saturday Evening Post, the former Chief Executive said he preferred the old order of passing the reins of government from president to vice president and then to members of the cabinet according to the established ranks, starting with the secretary of state.

He said the revision of the succession law in 1947, placing

the House speaker and president pro tempore of the Senate ahead of the cabinet members, "does not fulfill the requirements of our times." He said it was quite possible that the majority leaders in the House and Senate would not belong to the same party as the president.

"It would be possible for a man to succeed to the presidency who is out of sympathy with the aims and policies of the administration — and who would find it necessary to change the whole cabinet and roster of policy officials," Eisenhower said.

Instead, the succession should provide "the least disrupting

transition" to presidential power, Eisenhower said. There should be insurance that the party selected by the people to head the executive branch will continue to do so for the four-year presidential period.

"True, the speaker of the House and the president pro tempore are elected officials, but the first has been elected by a district and the second by a state; neither necessarily reflects the will of the whole electorate," Eisenhower said.

"For these reasons I believe that the earlier order of succession is a more logical one which would keep the presidency heading in the same political direction until the elector-

ate has an opportunity to make its further wishes known."

Eisenhower said the assassination of President Kennedy demonstrated once again that the institution of the presidency can continue firm and secure although a political leader may pass suddenly from the scene.

He said he hoped the tragedy would not make the White House a prison.

"As our nation and the world become more complex, more and not less contact between the President and the people and among leaders of nations, is necessary," he said. "The

very fact of being president involves certain personal risks, which I believe must be accepted."

Eisenhower said the risks should be reduced without limiting the President's "necessity" to provide improved security n-

Pope's Plan To Visit Holy Land Makes Him A Roman Hero

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul's historic plan to visit the Holy Land next month appeared today to have turned him into a popular Roman hero.

The pontiff was mobbed and cheered Sunday when he rode in an open car on a nippy day to the heart of Rome to pray before a statue of the Madonna of the Immaculate Conception on her feast day.

It was the most enthusiastic popular reception of the sedate and often self-conscious Pope's young pontificate. It was also the biggest turnout for the feast of the Immaculate Conception that Romans could remember.

The Pope first prayed at the foot of a six-story high column topped by a tall slender statue of Mary. Fire department men had sealed extension ladders to deck the statue with bouquets of flowers, as they do every year.

The foot of the statue was swamped by more flowers and gifts Romans brought to the Madonna. The singing and praying lasted all day and thousands of people passed by.

After praying, the Pope received olive branches stripped from trees from the Garden of Gethsemane where Christ was

The ground-breaking ritual marking the beginning of construction of the new Methodist Church at 1767 W. Harvard Ave. took place Sunday. Miss Oregon, D'Ann Fullerton, of Roseburg, turned the first shovelful of dirt.

Heinline, representing senior members; Floyd Wilson, chairman of the Building Committee; Joanne Stewart, representing the children; Ernest Buell, representing senior members; JoNell Logan, president of the Senior Youth Fellowship; Wayne Crooch, lay member of the annual conference; Bill Dishman, representing junior high fellowship; Mrs. Emmett Gibbons, president of the Women's Society of Christian Service; and Glenn Clute, president of the Board of Trustees.

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The South Douglas Ministerial Association is sponsoring the presentation at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday of the new Billy Graham film, "A Touch of Brass," in Tri-City at the elementary school.

The Rev. Donald Boldt is in charge of arrangements. There is no admission charge. Boldt said, but a free-will offering will be taken. The public is invited to attend.

A co-feature on the program is the musical "To God Be the Glory" highlighting the Graham platform team of Cliff Barrows, Beverly Shea, Ted Smith, Don Hustad and Billy Graham himself.

Lodge Considers Ike's Proposal

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge said Sunday he would "consider seriously" a proposal from former President Dwight D. Eisenhower that he seek the Republican presidential nomination, although he has no plans at present to run.

Lodge, vice presidential nominee in 1960, said he had no direct word of Eisenhower's appeal and declined to say how he would reply to it. But there were strong indications that whatever his response, Lodge would not leave his post here until well into the new year.

"I have not received any such message," he said when asked about reports that Eisenhower wanted him to return immediately to the United States and begin campaigning. "If I did receive such a message," he added, "I would consider it and take a good hard look at it."

The 61-year old ambassador said that at present "I have no intention of running" for president. He said he feels he can do the most good by continuing to serve here.
