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Shotgun Blast Injures Housewife

Soldiers Convicted In Death Of Airman Draw Prison Terms

EVREUX, France (UPI)—Two Negro American soldiers were convicted Monday night of unpremeditated murder in the death of a white airman as a result of a fight at the U.S. air base here.

Four other soldiers, including one white, were scheduled to be tried Wednesday on similar charges arising from the same incident last Sept. 6.

The verdict Monday night was handed down against Pfc. Raymond C. Bost Jr., 22, of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Pfc. Robert Burrell, 20, of Philadelphia, Pa. The court martial board was made up of 10 white officers. Bost was sentenced to 15

years at hard labor and Burrell was sentenced to 12 years, but each of the terms is subject to an automatic review by Army officials in Europe and in Washington.

Say Attack Unprovoked

They were convicted in connection with the death of Airman L.C. Robert Padgett of Woodlawn, Va., in a base hospital a few hours after the fight. He received a fractured skull and a blood clot.

The prosecution charged the soldiers rushed into an Air Force barracks carrying steel bars and sticks in an unprovoked attack. Some other airmen were injured in the fight, but not seriously.

The defense claimed the soldiers entered the barracks to discuss racial questions and that the fight broke out when someone shouted a racial insult to the Negroes.

"I am soaked," Capt. Norman H. Kirshman, a defense attorney, said after the verdict.

"I hope you have clear consciences," he told the court. "Any possible future they (the defendants) have had you have destroyed."

Bost and Burrell stood stiffly at attention and showed no emotion when the verdict was announced. But they looked downcast when they were taken away.

Blames Both

The prosecutor, Capt. James Ritchie, had blamed both soldiers directly for Padgett's death.

"Don't convict them because Padgett is dead," he had told the court, "but don't acquit them because they are Negroes."

"The facts speak for themselves," he said. "These men are killers, both of them."

Prior to the opening of the trial last week, American officials had described the fight as a barracks brawl. There was testimony of drinking before the incident.

Ritchie asked the court to make the sentences "appropriate for the offense and the offenders." In addition to the murder charge, Bost also had been accused of assault on another airman.

Three of the four soldiers still to be tried asked that enlisted men sit on the court martial. The other was granted a special trial on the ground that part of the pre-trial investigation report referred to him as a troublemaker, prejudicing his case.

Balky Fire Truck Detains Firemen; Residence Burns

An Elkton family is homeless today as the result of a fire Monday which destroyed their two-story frame home and all its contents, leaving them with no personal possessions except for clothes which were part of the laundry hanging on the outdoor line.

According to Mrs. C. W. Henderer, Elkton correspondent, the burned-out family was that of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Goin and their five children ranging from grade school to high school age. No one was home at the time of the fire, thought to have started around 11 a.m. and discovered by neighbors too late for salvage of any of the contents.

The Elkton Volunteer Fire Department was called but failure of the fire truck to start kept the fire crew from the scene. It was doubtful if any aid could have been given, Mrs. Henderer said, since the fire was too far advanced at the time of discovery.

FBI Agents Checking Mails For Sinatra Ransom Demand

STATELINE, Nev. (UPI)—FBI agents today checked the mails for a possible ransom demand for Frank Sinatra Jr., 19, kidnapped from his motel room at this Lake Tahoe gambling center Sunday night.

Authorities theorized that a ransom note mailed Monday would show up today for delivery. They were checking incoming mail at Lake Tahoe and at Reno, where the missing youth's famous father waited anxiously in a hotel.

Tino Barzic, young Sinatra's manager, said he and Joe Foss, band member who was in the motel room at the time of the abduction, were given lie detector tests at the direction of the FBI. "There was nothing there," Barzic said.

Hoffa Begins Contract Talks

CHICAGO (UPI)—Teamsters President James R. Hoffa opened his "conference table" fight for a national contract with the trucking industry today in what may be the most important negotiating session in the turbulent history of his union.

Hoffa and his union aides were meeting at the conference table with a special committee of Trucking Employers Inc. (TEI), newly formed, "to put up a united front to union demands."

The employers group represented thousands of trucking firms across the nation, ranging from small intra-city lines to the huge over-the-road transcontinental carriers.

A start toward Hoffa's long-sought national contract hung in the balance of the discussions. Ever since Hoffa first advanced the idea of a national trucking pact he has met opposition from management and many government officials who contend such an agreement would give him power to precipitate a national emergency by calling a strike.

Chairman of TEI's negotiating team was C.G. Zwingle, vice president of Pacific Inter-mountain Express.

The special committee was authorized only last week to "attempt to negotiate" a national contract agreement with the teamsters. Zwingle said at that time that the truckers hoped to modify contract provisions "to secure greater flexibility of operations and a greater utilization of manpower and equipment."

HOME PROJECT

LONDON (UPI)—The "Solicitors' Journal," a legal magazine, said today a poll revealed that many British lawyers have their hair cut by their wives.

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The manager said he believes Sinatra was kidnapped for ransom. "They're going through my mail now to see if I got any ransom letter," he said.

Temperatures Drop

Asked what he thought of the youth's chances of survival, he said "It's awfully cold outside."

Temperatures dropped to seven degrees at this snow-covered Sierra Nevada resort this morning.

Barzic said the FBI believes that Sinatra and the abductors were still in the area. Agents were quietly checking many of the hundreds of closed summer cabins that dot the area.

Curtis O. Lynum, San Francisco, FBI agent in charge here, refused to discuss the investigation, declaring "we are doing all in our power to solve the case."

In Reno, a friend described the older Sinatra as "nervous, worried, tired and concerned."

"He has always been kind of worried about this happening," the aide said. "The thought was always in the back of his mind and now of course it has been realized."

Six Arrests Discounted
The FBI no longer considered six heavily armed men arrested in the area late Monday as suspects in the kidnapping. The six were wanted in connection with several Southern California bank

robberies. Agents said Foss, Sinatra's roommate, was unable to make "a positive identification of any of the six men."

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Vandals Break Local Windows; Take Gas Caps
