Dick Barnett and Jerry West smoked the nets for 75 points Monday night at Seattle, Wash.

As the Lakers rolled over Baltimore, 134-120, in the evening's only NBA contest.

The win gave Los Angeles a 16-10 record. The hot race is quite a contrast to the Eastern Division, where the Boston Celtics hold a five game lead.

Baltimore and Los Angeles were tied at 64-44 early in the third stanza of their game at Seattle when Elgin Baylor sunk several shots and then West got a hot hand to push the Lakers well out in front.

Washington Nips Ducks; Jones Stars

EUGENE (UPI) — Oregon's young Ducks still were without a basketball victory today following a 69-63 loss to Washington before 3,693 Monday night.

The Ducks, who now have an 0-3 record, get another chance for a win when they meet Wyoming at McArthur Court Saturday night.

Lyle Nance and Steve Wilson each scored 19 points to pace Washington to its decision over Oregon. Steve Jones had 26 for the Ducks.

The Huskies let a 10-point lead midway in the second half slip away but then came on strong in the final three minutes to triumph.

Washington was sailing along with a 49-39 lead with 10:28 left after being in front 33-23 at halftime when Oregon suddenly came alive and surged ahead 55-53 with 4:32 remaining.

But the Huskies then rallied and finally went ahead to stay at 58-57 on a three-point play by Nance with 2:14 remaining. Nance put his team out of reach for good at 65-61 by tipping in a missed free throw by Wilson with 32 seconds left on the clock.

Washington made 25 of 60 free throw attempts for a .417 average and Oregon hit 22 of 59 shots from the field for a .373 average. The Huskies held a 46-36 edge in rebounding.

The Seattle team improved its record to 2-1.

Olson-Casey Fight To Draw

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — Christmas arrived two weeks early today for Carl (Bobo) Olson, who not only was presented with a draw against Hank Casey Monday night but also got to keep some purse money for a change.

Casey, weighing 173½ to Olson's 176½, apparently earned a clear decision over the former world middleweight champion. A crowd of 2900 grossed close to \$10,000 at the Oakland Auditorium then voiced its disbelief after the tenth round when the bout between the two San Franciscans was declared a draw.

Olson, whose purse was attached by revenue agents after he outpointed Jose Menno last month, retained an undisclosed percentage of his \$3,000 guarantee this time.

Tax-harassed Olson, seeking his fifth straight win of a comeback campaign, made Casey wince from a left hook to the body during a first round.

But then Hank apparently took charge for the next seven heats. Casey generally was in retreat before the on-rushing Olson, but frequently scored with counter-punches to the head and body.

Now fat and 35, Olson went all out in the final two rounds in a bid to flatten his 29-year-old opponent. Casey parried most of Olson's efforts during the final round, landed three sharp rights to Bobo's head.

However, judge Rudy Ortega was the only official voting for Casey. He scored the fight 4-3 for Hank, while Tony Bosnich had Olson ahead, 4-2. Referee Elmer Costa solved this muddle by calling the fight even, 4-4.

SNOW STOPS RACING

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The West team for the Shrine East-West game on Dec. 28 took on a Texas hue today.

Loyola Remains No. 1; OSU Jumps To Seventh

NEW YORK (UPI) — Loyola of Chicago is cast in a new role this year and thus far the Ramblers are playing their part to perfection as witnessed by their continued top billing in the United Press International college basketball ratings.

Last season Cincinnati was considered the outstanding team in the country and it wasn't until the final second of an overtime period in the NCAA final that Loyola was able to knock the glamour off the Bearcats.

This time around it's Loyola which has the built-in reputation and the Ramblers will be hard-pressed all season to maintain their No. 1 ranking. Coach George Ireland, confident his boys can adjust to their new role, today called the squad a "better team than last year" and added, "we respect everybody, but we're scared of none of them."

The respect is mutual and

after two impressive early-season victories Loyola is a near-unanimous choice as the top college team. Of the 35 coaches who make up the UPI board, 32 cast their vote for the Ramblers. Loyola received 336 points of a possible 350.

Duke moved into second position with one first-place ballot and 277 points and New York University is a close third with the remaining two first-place votes and 271 points.

Cincinnati, which was runner-up last week, was a 51-47 victim to Kansas and fell back to sixth place behind Arizona State and Michigan. Kentucky and Oregon are tied for seventh place, Texas is ninth and Ohio State is 10th.

Kentucky is the only addition to this week's top 10, replacing Wichita which fell from fifth to 12th.

The coaches' board is composed of five members from each of the seven geographical sections in the nation. Voting is on a basis of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 points for 1st to 10th places and only those games played through Saturday night, Dec. 7 were considered in this week's balloting.

Namath Ousted From Alabama's Sugar Bowl 11

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (UPI) — Star quarterback Joe Namath, the mainspring of the Alabama offense, was kicked off the team Monday for the rest of the season and the Sugar Bowl game for breaking training rules.

The action left Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant with the immediate problem of finding a capable replacement in time for the Miami game Saturday. The contest will be televised nationally from Miami's Orange Bowl Stadium.

Bryant promoted senior defensive specialist Jack Hurlbut, who has carried the ball only four times for minus 18 yards and completed one of three passes for 41 yards and a touchdown, to the starting unit. Sophomore Steve Sloan moved up to the No. 2 quarterback post.

In a terse announcement of Namath's suspension, Bryant said the Beaver Falls, Pa., junior was being dropped from the squad "for an infraction of training rules this past week-end." He did not elaborate.

"Joe has indicated to me he will remain in school and concentrate on his studies," Bryant said. "He will be allowed to remain on scholarship."

The 6-foot, 2-inch, 189-pound Namath, who directed the Crimson Tide to a 7-2 won-lost record so far this season, could not be reached for comment.

Alabama began the season with only three quarterbacks and Namath kept his two understudies on the bench most of the season. He completed 63 of 128 passes for 765 yards and 7 touchdowns and gained 201 yards on the ground for a total offense of 966 yards, seventh best in the Southeastern Conference (SEC). With all other SEC teams through with their regular seasons, Namath probably could have moved higher in the conference statistics after the Miami game.

Frosh Score Victory

EUGENE (UPI) — Nick Jones scored 27 points to lead the Oregon Frosh to a 60-55 basketball win over Clark Junior College here Monday night.

The win left the Frosh with a 3-0 record. Clark held a 30-28 lead at halftime.



Kentucky, Texas Capture 4th Straight Hoop Wins

Kentucky is back as a national basketball power — in case no one noticed that they were away.

One man who did notice is Adolph Rupp, the Kentucky coach who has compiled a fantastic 83.6 winning percentage in his 33 years at Lexington. The "Baron of the Blue Grass" suffered through a "dismal" 16-9 season last year, the worst in his career, and uncharacteristically declared he was going into this season with "possibly the poorest outlook for a winning season since I have been coaching."

But the Wildcats appear to be heading back to the top after disposing of strong North Carolina Monday night, 100-80, at Lexington. Kentucky, ranked seventh in the nation in the latest United Press International poll, now has won all four of its games this year, all by substantial margins.

Unbeaten and ninth-ranked Texas also captured its fourth victory of the year by tipping Louisiana State, 70-65.

Roger Suttner, a 7-foot center, paced Kansas State to a surprisingly easy 93-84 win over

Indiana. Suttner scored 28 points while Indiana's Van Arsdale twins combined for 40 before both fouled out.

Two other Big Ten teams fared just as poorly. Previously winless Wake Forest held on for a 77-72 upset of previously unbeaten Purdue.

An Illinois rally fell short at the final buzzer as Oklahoma edged the Illini, 105-104.

Iowa salvaged some Big Ten prestige by surprising St. Louis, 79-77, on the strength of Dave Roach's 32 points.

Rice rolled to its third victory in four games over an SEC rival with 90-62 whipping of Tulane.

In other major games, Utah routed University of the Pacific, 90-72; Texas Tech won its first game by beating Nebraska, 76-60; Alabama defeated Florida State, 62-53; Mississippi State whipped Delta State, 67-52; Creighton nipped Idaho State, 63-61; Texas Christian topped Houston, 65-59; Oklahoma State dumped Arkansas, 74-65; Seattle drubbed St. Mary's (Calif.), 84-60; and Baylor bounced Southwest Texas, 71-61.

CBA Pilots To Host Basketball Tourney

A four-team tournament hosted by Canyonville Bible Academy will open the 1963-64 basketball season for the Pilots Friday and Saturday.
