Seattle's Fielder Leads WHL Scorers

Guyle Fielder of the Seattle Totems helps his teammates so frequently that he could easily wind up with the Western Hockey League scoring crown.

Fielder has scored only nine goals, but his 30 assists in 23 games is a remarkable figure. Phil Maloney of Vancouver has 24 assists in 24 games and nobody else in the league has over 20.

Fielder's 39 points thus give him a five-point bulge over Maloney as the two flashy veterans wage their annual battle for the loop scoring crown.

Denver's Lou Jankowski moved into third place in the scoring last week with four goals and three assists to rate as the WHL player of the week.

Latest statistics also show that Los Angeles Blades goalie Jim McLeod tops the WHL with a 2.57 average after 14 games.

Vancouver's Bud J. Boone has run up 16 goals to lead that department, while Seattle's Larry Zeidel has watched 89 minutes of play from the penalty box to rate as the league's bad boy.

All teams took a break Monday night, while slumping San Francisco is at Denver tonight.

Vice president Lynn Patrick of the Boston Bruins of the National Hockey League and Bud Poile, coach of the Seals, are expected to huddle in Denver today and a deal could result.

Oregon, OSU To Rejoin League In Near Future

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—"Free lance" college football teams may be out-dated in the West within the next couple of years.

Oregon and Oregon State momentarily are expected to be invited to rejoin their old Pacific Coast Conference members in the Athletic Association of Western Universities.

The Western Athletic Conference hopes to add Texas Western and San Jose State of California in the not too distant future.

Return of Oregon and Oregon State to the so-called Big Six has been a foregone conclusion since the AAWU was organized at the death of the old PCC as a five-team conference. In fact, the Oregon schools were expected in the conference before Washington State was admitted.

"The question arises," says a member of the conference, "on what basis would Oregon and Oregon State be admitted now against the fact they were not invited to join when the conference was first organized?"

There is no apparent answer other than the fact that the AAWU needs them.

The conference wants to have a minimum of eight teams. Already in it are USC, California, Washington, UCLA, Stanford, and Washington State.

The conference represents the West in picking a team for the Rose Bowl—and excluding all but six teams from the area seems mighty exclusive.

The Western Athletic Conference, with member schools strung mostly through the Rockies, wants to expand, too.

Texas Western has the best chance to be invited to join the present makeup of Arizona, Arizona State, Wyoming, Brigham Young, Utah, and New Mexico.

This conference broke away from old alliances because it wanted schools in metropolitan areas. That's one reason Utah State and New Mexico State were not invited to join.

But the big thing in getting Texas Western into the conference would be that it has a 30,000 seat stadium at El Paso in which to play. And there are high hopes that an agreement could be worked out for the WAC champion to be the host club in this setting for the Sun Bowl game each year.

Oregon plays Southern Methodist there this year.

San Jose State, which appears off the beaten track to most WAC schools, will play nearly all of them in both basketball and football by 1970.

Spartan Expansion

The Spartans have a stadium that seats only around 19,000. They have in mind, however, getting the city of San Jose to build a sports complex that would handle 50,000 for football games and 6,000 for basketball tilts. San Jose State and Santa Clara would be the host schools.

Other institutions standing in line to get into the WAC include Utah State, New Mexico State and West Texas State.

If all these are added, the conference would be divided into two divisions—such as pro football plays right now.

But woe be the independents who try to schedule big league college football in the West after 1970. All the doors will be closed.

Yoncalla Busy Preparing For Bico-B Hoop Chase

Yoncalla's Eagles will clash with the Sutherlin Bulldogs Friday, then play a rematch with the Riddle Irish Saturday as they continue to warm-up for Bico-B League hoop competition.

The Eagles have a nucleus of five one-year veterans to lead the charge, but still rate as only a "darkhorse" contender in conference play.

The Yoncalla quint will be lacking in height with letterman David Vian and newcomer Roger Johnston being the only players in the six-foot bracket.

Coach Royce Henderson states that the Eagles will be an "average" club as far as league play is concerned. He feels that Yoncalla should hold its own in the latter stages of the season if the players continue to improve.

Henderson is a graduate of the University of Southern Mississippi, and has been teaching at Yoncalla since 1961. However, this is his first year as head coach, serving as Jayvee coach in 1962-63.

Returning lettermen include guards Don Langdon (5-9), Dick Langdon (5-8), Roger Carney (5-11) and Dennis Boan (5-7). Vian is the only returning forward.

Top prospects among the newcomers include centers Don Willey (5-11) and Johnston; forwards Jim Willey (5-6), Larry Williams (5-11) and Grant Buell (5-10 1/2); and guard John Mylenko (5-10).

The Eagles opened the 1963-64 season in the North Bico-B Jamboree, then lost a 73-53 non-league battle to the Riddle contingent. Both weekend games are against A-2 opponents, with Jayvee action starting at 6:30 p.m. and the varsity games beginning at 8.

The weekend of Dec. 19-20 the

Eagles will serve as the host team for the Yoncalla Lions' Club Invitational tournament featuring Crow, Elkton and Lowell. Games will start both nights at 7:15 p.m.

League play for the Eagles will begin Jan. 10 against the Elkton Elks.
