## Underbid Goes Safely to Slam

One of the paradoxes of contract bidding is that a pair is likely to reach a higher contract by starting with an underbid instead of an overbid.

Thus in the Oxnard, Calif., sectional late in October most pairs arrived only at six spades.

red suits. Of course, some players reached seven spades after an opening two bid, but the bidding sequence that had least trouble getting there started with a one club opening by North.

South had a natural spade response and now North was in trouble. How was he going to show his full strength?

He finally decided that the only way would be through a Blackwood four no-trump. I don't know exactly what he planned to do if South's response showed no aces, but when South showed one ace, North continued with five no-trump.

I think that North would have gambled out the grand slam if South had shown his one king, but South never gave North a chance.

North and South were playing that a Blackwood five no-trump as a follow-up to four no-trump guaranteed all four aces.

So South knew about all the aces. He also was pretty sure that North had at least four spades to the ace-king. How else could North have done all that bidding after merely opening one club?

In that case, South's king of clubs and queen of spades had to be all that was needed for a grand slam in spades so South bid it.

## Pauling Gets Peace Prize

OSLO, Norway (UPI)—Linus Pauling, a leader of the anti-bomb movement in the United States, and two International Red Cross organizations received Nobel Peace prizes Tuesday in ceremonies before King Olav V.

Pauling won the \$50,000 prize for 1962, which was not awarded until this year. He won the prize for physics in 1954, and is the only man to have won two Nobel prizes.

The League of Red Cross Societies and the International Red Cross Committee received the 1963 Peace Prize.

By tradition, the Peace Prize Committee does not explain its choices. But the league apparently won for its relief work in Algeria, while the international committee was believed to have won for offering to act as an intermediary in the Cuban missile crisis.

Gunnar Jahn, chairman of the Peace Prize Committee, said in handing the prize to Pauling:

"No one would suggest that the nuclear test ban in itself is the work of Linus Pauling. But does anyone believe that this treaty would have been reached now if there had been no responsible scientist who tirelessly, unflinchingly, year in, year out, had impressed on the authorities and on the general public the real menace of nuclear tests?"

## Solon Says Oregon Businessmen Lack Initiative In Seeking U. S. Contracts

U. S. Rep. Robert Duncan said today he has received material confirming his belief that Southern Oregon businessmen are not receiving federal contracts because of the lack of

communication between the businessmen and the federal government.

Earlier Duncan had asked the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce and others in Southern Oregon to work with him in setting up conferences where businessmen can receive information on their possibilities for securing such contracts.

"As part of my campaign to help 4th District businessmen compete for these contracts, I wrote several federal agencies asking why our area was not awarded a number of contracts comparable to those received by neighboring states," Duncan said.

The congressman said that in many cases, the agencies indicated the fault lay with local businessmen rather than government contractors.

He referred particularly to a recent letter from Craig Raup, a staff member of the Agency for International Development. "Mr. Raup said a major factor in Oregon's lack of federal contracts lay with the lack of effort made by local manufacturers and suppliers to pursue this type of trade," Duncan noted.

"I think one reason local businessmen have failed to enter this field is because they are not aware of the potential here," Duncan added.

Duncan reports that his proposal to Southern Oregon Chambers to establish a series of meetings between businessmen and representatives of the major federal agencies "has been received enthusiastically." He said he is working on details now.

"The economy of the 4th District is a vital interest of mine, and I will do everything in my power to help it expand," he concluded.

## State To Continue Free Vaccination Plan For Calves

Dr. Dallen Jones, Roseburg veterinarian and member of the state Board of Livestock Auction Markets, reported today that the "free" vaccination of calves for Bang's disease will be continued.

The vaccination will be carried on as in the past, at least for the foreseeable future, Jones said.

The decision was reached in Salem Monday following a joint meeting of the state Brucellosis Advisory Committee and the state Livestock Auction Board with state and federal department of agriculture veterinary officials.

Industry spokesmen on the two advisory groups urged officials to give priority to vaccination in the brucellosis control program.

Reductions in the Oregon Department of Agriculture budget necessitated the state's discontinuing its full share of the vaccination cost. Dr. Glenn B. Rea, state veterinarian, said the department will know in another two months whether or not the state will be able again to contribute its full share for the total vaccination program, but it will have sufficient money for brucellosis testing.

## ASKS IDENTIFICATION

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Treasury Department announced Monday that it is requesting banks and other financial institutions to ask savings bonds owners for their taxpayer identification numbers when they collect interest on bonds.

The move is part of a campaign by the Internal Revenue Service to make sure bond owners report all their interest.
