Publishers Post Appeal For New 'Butts' Hearing

ATLANTA (UPI)—About the only uncontested fact remaining in the sensational Wallace Butts libel case today was that it is far from settled.

U.S. District Judge Lewis R. Morgan heard arguments during a six and one-half hour hearing Tuesday on a motion by the Curtis Publishing Company for a new trial and, after conferring with attorneys, will decide whether to grant an appeal.

The defense is citing more than 30 reasons for wanting a new trial.

A team of six attorneys, headed by Post chief counsel Phil Strubling, argued Tuesday that much of the original trial was in error, that vital testimony was kept from the jury and that the final award to Butts was so excessive that it was "without conscience."

Morgan reminded lawyers at least five times that he heard no objections while the trial was in progress—the time, he said, when they should have been voiced.

"They are trying to get you to pull their ox out of the ditch," drawled William Schroder, chief counsel for the one-time great football coach of the Georgia Bulldogs whose recent years have been rocked by misfortune.

Schroder said the Post attorneys "forfeited their right" to object to the trial procedure when they "acquiesced" to it during the trial itself.

The Post lawyers contended that the judge himself had the duty to refuse to accept the jury's verdict, which they noted was by far the largest libel award in court records. They said he also should have cautioned against what they termed "inflammatory" statements made by Butts' lawyers.

Butts was awarded \$3,000,000 libel damages—a U.S. record—in federal court last summer. His suit was based on publication in the Saturday Evening Post of an article inferring that he gave away team secrets to Alabama when he was University of Georgia athletic director.

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Miami Hurricane Blows Out Of Steam During 86-77 Setback By Santa Clara

There were plenty of storm warnings hoisted along the Western edge front before the Miami Hurricanes came to the San Francisco Bay area, but the Floridians hardly caused a stir when they finally arrived Tuesday night.

Miami had a 99 point-per-game average and an All-American candidate in Rick Barry, who sported a 34-point average. Santa Clara took on this whirlwind Tuesday night and tamed it, 86-77.

Barry did live up to his press notices as he maintained his record by hitting 34 points, but Bruce Asch of the Broncos had 28 and Russ Vrankovich 23 to spark a well-balanced attack.

It was a fine comeback for the Broncos, who looked as if they were in big trouble when they dropped their season opener to lowly San Francisco State. At Pullman, Wash., Tuesday night, Washington State picked up its first victory with a foul-filled 85-68 win over Idaho.

Officials doled out 57 offenses and five players wound up fouling out. Twenty-nine infractions were called against the Cougars and 28 for Idaho.

Cougar ace Byron Vadtset was one of the men who fouled out, but not until he had hit 11 of 13 field goal tries and 6 of 7 free throws for 28 points.

Two games in Southern California saw the West Coast Athletic Conference and the California Collegiate Athletic Association split.

At San Diego, Hal Catlin hit a 15-footer at the buzzer to give San Diego State a 77-75 win over previously unbeaten Pepperdine. Ted Bridges had 22 for the Waves and Catlin 20 for the Aztecs. It was a close one all the way with the half-time score 36-34.

At Los Angeles, Loyola trailed Los Angeles State 44-40 at halftime, but slowed down the pace and picked up an 80-76 decision.

It was 76-61 when Mike Lawler hit a 10-footer with 30 seconds to go. Los Angeles State brought the ball up court, but lost the ball when a technical foul was called.

Jim O'Keefe had 22 for Loyola and Ken Raynaud 19 for Los Angeles State.

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Blough Gets Grid Honors
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Blough revealed that during the three years he played varsity football at Susquehanna University the Pennsylvania team lost to Army 53-0; Colgate, 87-6; and Cornell, 91-0.

"Obviously," said Blough, "your award committee felt that you with a record like that on the gridiron deserved a medal for sheer survival."

The Gold Medal is given annually to a national leader who has "carried on the disciplines of college football to a successful post-graduate life." Past winners included three former presidents of the United States—Herbert Hoover, Dwight D. Eisenhower and the late John F. Kennedy.

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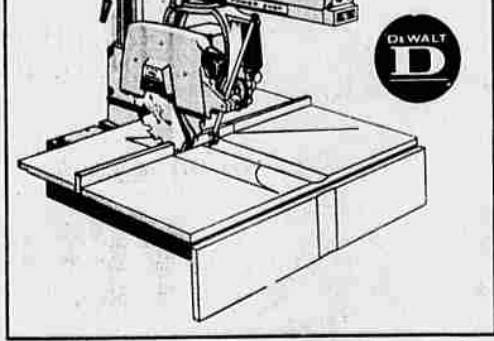
SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Big Six champion Washington and runner-up Southern California dominate the 1963 all-league game with four players apiece.
