 \$150 million a year can be saved by this method.
 The secretary said he will freeze employment at other defense installations to make jobs available for those being cut from the payroll.
 "Every employee whose job is eliminated will be offered another job opportunity," he said. "If the new job requires a move, the expense in the case

of career employees and their families will be borne by the government."
 His estimates indicated that approximately 35,000 government employees will be moved to other jobs. He said the Defense Department will provide retraining programs for about 5 per cent who would otherwise be unemployed.
 Approximately 20 per cent of the employees losing jobs are expected to go voluntarily into private industry or other careers.

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Recess Granted In Thornton Trial

The trial of Cliff Thornton, executor of the estate of Mazie E. Smith, vs. Senior Citizens Land and Development Co. Jack and Angess Withers and others, which started Monday in Circuit Court has been recessed and postponed until a later date.
 The recess was allowed on motion of the defense attorney for the Withers giving him an opportunity to file an amended answer to the original complaint. He stated in his motion that at the time the answer was filed denying plaintiff's claims, Senior Citizens was not in default under terms and provisions of the Withers' mortgage, but since then have been placed in default.
 Withers claims a \$14,000 mortgage interest in the Rose Hotel properties, involved in Thornton's foreclosure suit. The interest concerns a loan by the Withers to Senior Citizens. The amended answer sets forth the claim of the Withers and asks that they be decreed a first and prior lien against the property.

Youth Found Innocent Of Disorderly Conduct

In Wednesday Municipal Court action, Bruce Lindell Smith, 18, of 1167 NE Walnut St., was found innocent of disorderly conduct on trial before Judge Warren Woodruff. He was taken into custody Oct. 22 for an alleged disturbance in a local restaurant, the police report said.
 On trial Tuesday night, William Douglas Jackson, 21, Umpqua Star Route, Oakland was found innocent of disorderly conduct, in connection with an alleged fight in front of a local tavern last week.
 The man with whom Jackson was allegedly embroiled, John Ambrose Daniel Medford, 23, Sutherland, forfeited \$25 bail on failure to appear in court in answer to the charge. The police report had stated Medford had left the scene of the altercation on arrival of officers. He later was located in the ladies' restroom inside the tavern by officers and placed under arrest, along with Jackson at that time.
 In Tuesday night traffic court 33 cases were handled, including 9 basic rule violations, and the other miscellaneous.

Four Young U. S. Servicemen End 30-Day Test In Steel Box

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (UPI)—Four teen-age airmen emerged Wednesday from a steel box and 30 days in an explosive atmosphere of pure oxygen, the longest known test of its kind.
 They underwent medical tests then returned to their simulated space capsule for five more days of followup. Their conditions were good.
 The test, part of a continuing series of experiments to find out man's reaction to space capsule environment, was sponsored jointly by the Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine at Brooks Air Force Base, and the Manned Spacecraft Center at Houston.
 The four airmen who breathed pure oxygen for 30 days were Jerry J. Huber, 18, of Hope, Mich.; Philip B. Jameson, 18, of Clearwater, Fla.; Thomas A. Rusiecki, 19, of Niagara Falls, N.Y. and Ronald D. Taskey, 19, of Westerville, N.Y., all airmen 3.c.
 Two other airmen 3.c., George G. Vandall, 21, of Mil-

ford, Mass. and Gary L. Morrill, 18, of Eaton Rapids, Mich., stayed outside the capsule as controls. Doctors checked the condition of the four against conditions of the two to compare effects.
 Dr. Billy E. Welch, chief of the school's environmental systems branch, said "The men are in fine shape and we are very happy with the progress of the experiment."
 The men entered the capsule Nov. 4 and spent five days breathing normal air.
 They then breathed oxygen

through masks to purge their systems of nitrogen to avoid the bends, a painful malady caused by formation of nitrogen bubbles in the body fluids.
 The atmospheric pressure in the capsule was then reduced to that found at 27,500 feet and the capsule was flushed of all gases but oxygen.
 Normal air at sea level contains about 78 per cent nitrogen, 21 per cent oxygen, 1 per cent argon, and minute quantities of carbon dioxide, hydrogen, neon, helium, krypton and xenon.
 Air Force doctors watched the men around the clock. Inside the 25-foot by 8-foot capsule, the men read, slept and performed routine tests on themselves.
