He covered East's queen with dummy's king, led the ten spot, crossed to his hand with the king of spades, cashed his ace of hearts to pick up the last two trumps, finessed dummy's queen of diamonds, cashed the ace, ruffed another diamond, finessed the queen of clubs, discarded his two losing spades on the long diamonds and wound up with all the tricks except that ace of spades taken by East.
