High School Students Get Bid To Enter 'Democracy' Contest

High school students in Douglas County have opportunity to participate in the 17th annual Voice of Democracy national broadcast scriptwriting contest.

All 10th, 11th and 12th grade students in any of the county's high schools are eligible to participate, reports Robert C. Stevenson, Myrtle Creek, who is chairman of the district contest.

The competition is sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars (District 12) with the co-

operation of the state and national associations of broadcasters.

Stevenson said "The Challenge of Citizenship" is theme for the 1963-64 event. Each state winner is provided with a five-day all-expense paid trip to Philadelphia, Pa.; Valley Forge, Pa., and Washington, D.C. The state winner is also eligible to compete for national scholarships in the amounts of \$5,000 for first place, \$3,500 for second, \$2,500 for third and \$1,500 for fourth.

Students interested in taking part are invited to contact their high school principal. Stevenson noted that this is the fourth annual contest for Douglas County. Elimination contests will be staged at individual schools and a contest on Jan. 10 will name the district winner. The state finals will be conducted later in January.

Teachers are advised the contest may be conducted as a classroom project in English, speech or history. Scripts will be judged on content, originality and delivery. The deadline for school and community contests is Dec. 20.

Students Of Month Selected At Sutherlin

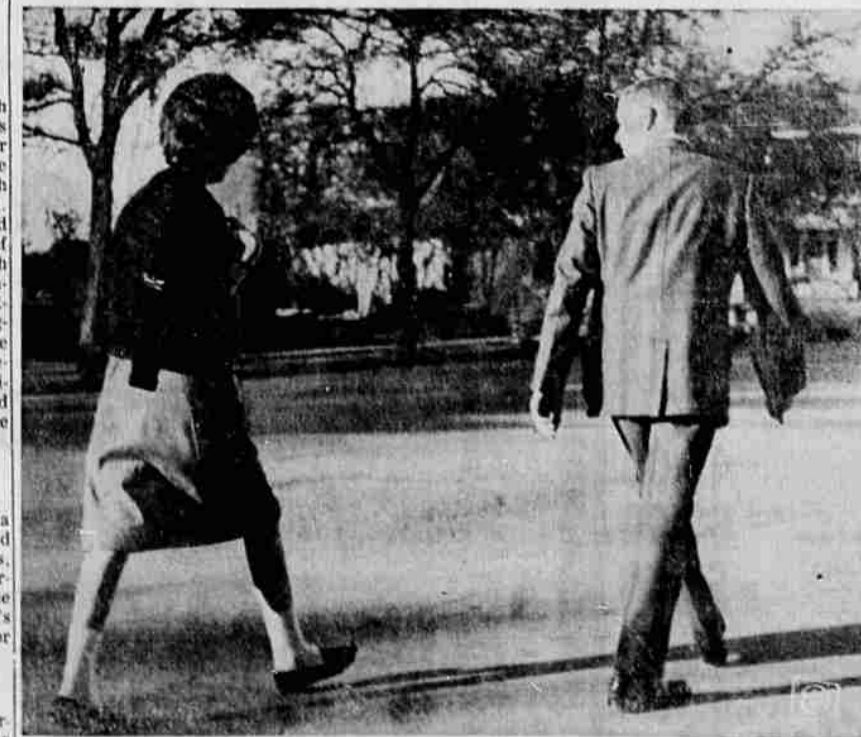
Patricia McGinty and Annette Oglesby were selected by the Sutherlin High School student committee as girls of the month for October and November, respectively.
