Seeing 52 Cards

Is Advantage

East wins the first trick with the ace of spades and returns a trump whereupon South is able to run off the rest of the tricks.

Had East simply led the ten of spades at trick two the story would have been entirely different. South would have had problems in every suit and would have probably wound up making either two or three hearts, but not any more, so East's lead at trick two cost his side at least three tricks.

In double dummy play declarer has the same advantage you readers have. He can see all the cards! Therefore he makes plays he would not attempt in a real game.

With that advantage he wins the second trick with his king of spades, leads a diamond to dummy's queen, cashes the ace,

last spade. Thus, South winds up losing one spade and two trumps and makes four odd.

Savings And Loan Raises Dividend

The Umpqua Savings and Loan Association today reported an increase in savings dividends from 4 per cent to 4 1/2 per cent for the semi-annual period ending Dec. 31.

Secretary-manager Stan Hermann said the board of directors, in their regular meeting Dec. 11, voted the increase in rate based on projected earnings for the semi-annual period.

An estimated record dividend of \$145,700 will be paid for the semi-annual period ending Dec. 31. This amount is based on the higher dividend rate of 4 1/2 per cent. Record earnings for 1963 are attributed to increased home lending volume at Umpqua Savings and Loan, which is indicative of the constantly growing demand for this service in this community, said Hermann.

Portland Will Host Optometric Meeting

Dr. Byron E. Woodruff of Roseburg, announced at the meeting in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana optometric associations in Portland the 12,000 member American Optometric Association would hold its first national convention in Portland in 1967.

The Portland meeting Dr. Woodruff attended was held to draft a proposed constitution and bylaws which would create a Northwest Council of Optometry. The new council would aim at pooling some funds, research projects and administrative procedures.
