

# Boardman Space Park Project Up To Boeing

SALEM (UPI) — With Oregon's lease of the planned Boardman Space Age Industrial Park apparently an accomplished fact, the Boeing Company board of directors was expected to meet today and appropriate funds for initial development of the project.

H. C. Saalfeld, director of the state's Veterans' Affairs Department which now owns the 160,000-acre tract in northeastern Oregon, said "we have performed all the state's obligations."

Planning and Development Director Samuel H. Mallicoat, who has fathered the crisis-ridden project for three years, said "the state has met its requirements. It's now up to Boeing. We expect an appropriation to be authorized by the company's directors at their meeting today."

Loren Hicks, legal advisor to Gov. Mark Hatfield, said "the state has now completed its part, and the lease and attachments and title policy have gone to Boeing."

# Youth Dies Of Beating; Mother Held

AMARILLO, Tex. (UPI) — Airman Q.C. Henry A. Binning, 28, was deeply worried about the way his wife neglected or beat the couple's five children but he dared not seek help.

His pregnant wife, Mrs. Ella Mae Binning, 25, threatened to kill herself and all the children if he did.

She was particularly resentful of Marcus DeWayne, and Elizabeth Roxanne, both 5. Mrs. Binning thought her husband ran around with other women while she was pregnant with them.

The two children were born 11 months apart.

Saturday, Marcus got in an argument with the other children and Mrs. Binning beat him with a hammer. She also beat Roxanne.

Mrs. Binning called an ambulance but by the time the boy got to the hospital he was dead. Attendants said he had two broken legs, a fractured arm, bruises, and rope burns on his neck. He had teeth marks all over his body.

Roxanne, suffering from malnutrition, was reported in fair condition with a possible skull fracture, bruises and mutilated fingers and toes.

The couple's other children, aged 7, 2, and 1, were placed in the Randall County Welfare Home. They apparently had not been beaten, but all were suffering from malnutrition.

Justice of the Peace Bill Wilson ordered Mrs. Binning held without bond at the county jail at Canyon, Tex., south of Amarillo. She admitted the beatings and was charged with murder.

Det. Lt. Charles Hollis said Binning told him he had known about the beatings for a long time. He told Hollis "she threatened to kill herself and all the children if I told anyone."

# Sinatra Jr. Plans To Resume Engagement At Nevada Spa

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The kidnap case of Frank Sinatra Jr. appeared virtually wrapped up today and the 19-year-old prepared to resume his singing engagement at the Lake Tahoe gambling spa where he was abducted.

The FBI remained mum concerning the details of the capture of the three kidnaping suspects Friday and early Saturday, but recovery of nearly all of the \$240,000 ransom paid by Frank Sinatra Sr. was announced by the federal agency.

The young singer's manager in Stateline, Nev., said Sunday night Frank Jr. was en route back to resume the engagement. But his mother, Mrs. Nancy Sinatra, said earlier he would not reappear there until Tuesday night.

Early Sunday, Frank Jr. left his mother's exclusive Bel-Air home where he returned early last Wednesday morning after being released by the kidnapers. His father's Hollywood spokesman said the young man returned to his Hollywood apartment Sunday.

The families of the two 23-year-old suspects arrested for the Sunday night kidnaping prepared to "do everything possible" to help them.

The arrest of Barry Worthington Keenan, scion of a wealthy Los Angeles area family, and Joseph Clyde Amsler, 23, Playa Del Rey, Calif., were announced by the FBI shortly after midnight Friday.

The third, believed to have been the leader of the trio, John William Irwin, 42, Hollywood, was arrested in Imperial Beach, Calif., Friday morning and held by the FBI in nearby San Diego, Calif. He was expected to be returned to Los Angeles today.

All three were arraigned before dawn Saturday. Assistant U.S. Atty. Tom Sheridan said a federal grand jury charge was expected within three weeks. He said the multiple charges were expected to include kidnaping, conspiracy to commit kidnaping, possession of ransom money, interstate transportation in aid of racketeering and possible extortion.

All three were held in lieu of \$50,000 bail each although Keenan's family indicated they would post bond. Attorneys have been retained for both young men and were to have visited them Sunday.
